Don't Second Guess the Urge to Share

Colleen Smith, author of *Catholic Stewardship – Sharing God's Gifts*, tells this story:

"Even the smallest act of sharing can make a difference. I remembered that one summer day when slicing a cold watermelon. From my kitchen window I could see the thermometer's reading of nearly 90 degrees by 9 a.m.

I heard the usual Friday morning roar as the lawn crew arrived with their mowers, blowers and edgers. These deeply tanned guys show up each Friday during mowing season, covered in dust and grass clippings. I know from experience that mine is not an easy job given my corner lot and the fairly steep banks on which my house sits.

Then it occurred to me how delicious and how welcome a slice of cold watermelon might be to these young men on a morning so hot and getting hotter.

I hesitated. I wondered what they might think. Would they consider it some sort of bribe? Was it improper? Would they grow suspect? Maybe they don't even like watermelon, I considered. Maybe they're allergic.

Then I caught myself. How frequently we censor altruistic instinct, fearing rejection, fearing misunderstanding, fearing *something*. The nonsense of this line of thinking struck me. Who doesn't like a cold slice of watermelon on a hot summer's day? I grabbed two slices and two paper towels. Based on their response, the pink fruit might have been gold ingots, so appreciative were they, so astonished. That small sharing – the giving and receiving – made my day, and perhaps theirs."

The next time you feel the urge to share, do it!

Summer is a time of vacation trips, summer camps, yard work and people on the go. This summer, take some time to truly relax and reflect. To know the sacred, we must slow down and pay attention. **This summer, spend some time in quiet prayer. It's the ultimate relaxation technique!**





Coming to an understanding of stewardship as a way of life is a very personal experience. Some of us change our perception of stewardship little by little. Others experience a conversion moment; a significant event that reshapes our stewardship response.

Many Catholics throughout our archdiocese share the gift of their real life stewardship stories with fellow parishioners; stories that teach, encourage and inspire all of us as we continue our growth as faithful stewards.

The following example tells the story of one family's devotion to attending weekly Mass.

Mass... it's a Family Affair

I believe that my husband and I have strived to become better parents at taking the formation of our children's Catholic faith a little more seriously. We are fortunate to have a phenomenal school to partner with in the faith formation for three of our children, and also a great Christian Formation program, which has guided our oldest son tremendously.

We cannot, however, take these resources for granted. We must nurture these children of ours at home with a prayer life, setting examples of Christian behavior and most importantly, attend Mass every Sunday - no matter what sporting event, club opportunity, and/or social engagement we may have on a particular weekend. Our busy schedules sometimes require us to go at separate times so that everyone gets there. Occasionally, we need to find a nearby parish (we have four in our cluster) that has a more suitable Mass time. We believe if we are to call ourselves Catholic parents, we need to take the time to receive God's gift of the Eucharist every week and give thanks for such a gift!

We travel as a family quite a bit and never miss the opportunity to attend Mass in a different city. Whether exploring caves in Kentucky, taking in Disney World in Florida, far away from home in another country like Mexico, or simply camping in the northwoods of Wisconsin, we go to church. Why? We need to receive the Eucharist!

Our youngest son will be receiving First Holy Communion this year. He is so excited to finally receive this gift after all the years of watching us, that I am happy to say he will be very comfortable in saying aloud, "Amen!"



Everybody who practices authentic Christian stewardship has a moving, magical story. It's important that we tell our stories, not only to convey them to others, but also to reinforce them for ourselves. It's all too easy, once a miraculous moment has passed, to forget about it or to write it off to coincidence.

Reflect upon a time in your life when you have extended yourself, risen to the occasion, gone above and beyond the call of duty – and been rewarded in ways you could not have imagined. Tell your story to someone or write it down. Intentional Disciples share their stories as a way of bringing Christ to others. *So - what's your story?*

<u>The 3 "Cs" of Successful Stewardship;</u> Stewardship Committee, Comprehensive Plan, Good Communication

Building a stewardship culture in a parish does not happen by chance, by accident, or by wishing things would "get better". The Parish Pastoral Council Norms approved by Archbishop Liskecki in May of 2012 call for *Stewardship* to be among the standing commissions of the Pastoral Council. And, successful parishes are seeing the fruits of a comprehensive stewardship effort (increased participation, revitalized ministries, growing financial support) because they began at the beginning - by developing a good Stewardship Committee. This seminar session will address topics including:

- Do we really need another committee? (Only if you want to be successful!)
- Where does the stewardship committee "fit"? (Who and Where.)
- What does the committee do and not do? (*What and How*.)
- We have an Evangelization committee. Do we need Stewardship too? (*Yes, and they can work together.*)
- Comprehensive planning (A map to guide you on your parish journey.)
- Communication: techniques, tools, methods to spread the Good News. (Being heard through the clutter.)
