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# Message from Gary

## Catechesis and the Reception of Holy Communion

This year, I have received various questions about how we receive Holy Communion. When did we start bowing before receiving? I did not do that as a child. During the pandemic, we are not

receiving from the chalice. Do we receive "less"? Are there any rules for Communion or do parishes just do it their own way?

As we strive to invite our people back to Mass, and as we catechize first Communicants and young catechumens, I thought it might be helpful to offer brief responses and a few handy resources.

When did the bow of the head before receiving Communion become part of the ritual? This was introduced in 2011 with the revised edition of the Roman Missal, that is, at the same time the English responses and prayers at Mass were revised. Here is a simple brochure issued by our Office for Worship during that time of renewed catechesis: Distribution & Reception of Holy **Communion and Posture During Mass.** 

Did you know that our walk to Communion itself is important? It is more than just getting ourselves to the front of church. It is a liturgical Procession, demonstrating our unity as the Body of Christ and symbolizing the pilgrim Church. Actually, all our actions during the Communion rite are significant, from processing forward to returning to our place. Here is a Reflection on the Reception of Holy Communion at Mass that may be helpful in preparing yourself to catechize children and their families.

What about standing or kneeling, receiving in the hand or on the tongue? "The norm established for the Dioceses of the United States of America is that Holy Communion is to be received standing, unless an individual member of the faithful wishes to receive Communion while kneeling. . . The consecrated host may be received either on the tongue or in the hand, at the discretion of each communicant." Both these directives are from the General Instruction on the Roman Missal #160 and are repeated in other sources.

Our reception of Holy Communion – with the gestures, prayers, postures and song that surround it - is to convey our unity in Christ. We respect differences in practice (within the guidelines, of course). But when we catechize, it is not necessary to teach all the options or exceptions. We are forming for unity and introducing young people to liturgical participation with its common actions. With children in particular, it is usually more effective to present one way of receiving, so they can feel confident in what they do, not be confused, and can feel they belong to one Body in Christ. If you serve a community of families with differing practices, you may have an added challenge as you work with parents, priest, staff and catechists to craft the best way to form children and their families in that same spirit of unity.

If our children do not receive from the chalice, are they receiving less? During the pandemic, we have not been receiving from the common chalice. I have heard some people question this, thinking that children, especially at their first Communion, will be missing something. For some adults who always had the opportunity to receive from the chalice and have heard that "the sign of communion is more complete when given under both kinds," it may have felt like a loss to receive only under the form of bread. If there is discussion about this in your parish, you can remind parishioners that Jesus is fully present – Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity – under the

form of bread alone or under the form of wine alone. This is called the doctrine of concomitance. The US Bishops explain this in the Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion under Both Kinds #15.

Finally, who may receive Holy Communion? This question often arises at celebrations when people invite relatives and friends, some of whom are not Catholic or not practicing the faith. It might be good to review the explanation from the US Bishops in their Guidelines for Reception of Communion.

Some will say that these details are not the most important part of our catechesis on the Eucharist. I certainly agree that there is much more we have to offer. A personal relationship with Jesus, a sense of belonging, knowledge of the Real Presence, and all other aspects of formation are vital. But the goal of this catechesis is the actual receiving of our Lord in Holy Communion. And the practice of reverently receiving Communion is itself formative.


