- 3. Don't do something stupid, don't say something stupid


A little common sense goes a long way. I

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF DIACONATE FORMATION

DIACONATE FORMATION HAS GROWN IN MANY WAYS

It hardly feels like two years have passed since I became the Director of Diaconate Formation. Time flies when you are doing and loving the mission God has given

you through the Archbishop. We have a lot to look forward to and be thankful for. First, we have four men –Robert Mitchell, Kurt Peot, Peter Rebholz, and John Shaughnessy – to be ordained to the Order of Deacon, on September 12, by Archbishop Listecki at St. John the Evangelist Cathedral. Second, beginning on September 1, we will welcome 18 new aspirants to the formation program. Finally, on October 17, Bishop Haines will install 17 candidates to the Ministry of Acolyte.

As a Formation Leadership Team, Manuel, Charmaine and I are pleased with the growth God has entrusted to us. We are delighted to have provided some new support resources to assist the students in their discernment of

a diaconal vocation. These additional resources took the form of mentoring and tutoring; we have small group mentoring or assigned deacon mentors who committed to walking alongside candidates and/or their wives during formation. For those who needed some additional help with Theological Reflection, Fr. Lobacz graciously provided some one-on-one tutoring. It was great to have his services since our formation program uses the model he developed. It was affirming to hear of the men's steady progress. This last trimester we also added a study group led by Dcn. Henry Reyes to assist men who were finding challenges in academics. The program support we receive from pastors/parish directors, pastoral center staff, faculty, and the Order of Deacon has been tremendous. It is a village approach to discernment!

We look forward to our new formation year. We will continue to use a virtual classroom on Tuesday Evenings for Intellectual Formation. If the COVID-19 virus cooperates, we hope that Saturdays can be in person, though we will continue with an abridged class day. Of course, all this depends on whether the safe practices of the phase we are in can be adhered to wisely. We are grateful that technology has allowed us to continue forming the men and their wives, but we will all be delighted when technology is one of a variety and not the only strategy available to continue our mission to serve the parishes and the communities of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. I am grateful to the Executive council, Fr. Herda, Mark Barthel (and his department), Margaret Rhody, and most recently Mr. Bruce Varick who have been collaboratively supportive in making our virtual experience the best it can be. We will just have to see what the Good Lord has in mind, and always remember that we are never alone in our service to others.

HUMAN RESOURCES REVIEW

COMING SOON VIRTUALLY TO A PARISH/SCHOOL NEAR YOU!

Dear Pastors and Parish Directors,

As you may be aware, the Archdiocesan Parish and School Human Resources department has commenced conducting HR Reviews

of our parishes and schools. These reviews are intended to assist you in your ministry by ensuring compliance with applicable state and federal law, by suggesting low-cost, and yet effective ways to decipher and offer resources for common HR issues. The intention is to conduct a review with every parish and school in the diocese on a 3-year basis to ensure continuous improvement.

During these difficult days, it is more important than ever to be sure that the procedures that you have put in place to hire new talent, organize files, manage relations with your employees, and more are compliant with existing policies and best practices. Our HR Review has been successful in the past in assisting parishes and schools to make improvements in these areas.

However, in-person HR Reviews may not be a safe option right now. To address these safety concerns, the HR Review process has now moved virtual reviews.

The virtual HR Review employs the use of Zoom to facilitate communication between your administrator and myself during the review. We will prepare documents in advance to be shared online and make use of the screensharing feature to discuss and examine the helpful tools that we have available from our office.

In other words, it is highly likely you will be receiving a phone call or an email from me very soon to arrange a virtual review. We may be biased, but we believe this is a very exciting opportunity, both for your parish and for me! I understand that many priests have expressed that Human Resources is one of the more challenging areas of ministry. One of the best-kept secrets in the HR field is that having strong processes in place from the beginning of the employment relationship will save you an incredible amount of time

and stress when a tough issue pops up. What a better time than now to be sure that your processes are up to snuff?

Our process is designed for parishes and schools on all ends of the spectrum, from the HR experts to the beginners. No matter where your parish falls now, we can suggest low cost and simple ways to make small improvements that can make a big difference over time, without overwhelming your already busy schedule or distracting from your ministry. We have templates, guides, instructions, and Spark Notes that will allow you to save time and not have to reinvent the wheel.

COMPANIONS IN MINISTRY

Companions in Ministry (CiM) is an ecumenical support program for Christian pastors and ordained deacons in southeastern Wisconsin. The program engages participants in prayer, retreat days, plenaries, spiritual companionship and group discussions about clergy well-being. Small groups meet in person (as we are able) and online. CiM is funded by a grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. and based at Marquette University.

Small groups within the cohort meet

8-10 times a year and are facilitated by trained pastor-leaders. Cohort Three begins with an opening retreat on **September 22-23, 2020.** (The retreat may be a combination of in-person and online experiences.) Each cohort runs for two years.

Groups discuss themes related to clergy well-being, resiliency, thriving in ministry, self-integrity and happiness. In relation to these themes, participants explore other topics such as serving during a pandemic; serving in midcareer; serving multiple congregations; serving multi-cultural congregations; serving small congregations; serving as a pastor in central Milwaukee; specialized ministries; bi-vocational pastors; female pastors; seasoned pastors; and more.

Expenses are fully-funded. Participants receive a \$1,000 stipend upon completing the program. Group leaders receive a \$2,000 stipend. The deadline to apply is August 26, 2020. For information and to apply, visit marquette.edu/companions-ministry/.

SOCIAL MEDIA AND DIGITAL COMMUNICATION POLICY

The Social Media and Digital Communication Policy has been updated and went into effect on July 1, 2020. This policy replaces the Social Networking Policy. This updated policy covers

website administration, digital image and video usage, social media usage on behalf of parishes and schools, digital communication between minors and adults, and virtual interactions in ministry and work.

Several changes in this policy are new and may affect your parishes and schools. It is recommended to review your parish's and school's social media and digital communication policies and procedures to ensure they align with the updated policy. All clergy, employees, and safe environment certified volunteers must review the policy and complete the acknowledgment.

Your assistance is appreciated to support your parish and school employees and safe environment certified volunteers to complete this process through CMG Connect. Your Safe Environment Coordinator at your parish or school can assist your employees and volunteers with completing this process. An email has been sent out to all parish and school safe environment coordinators, school and parish business managers, principals, and directors of administrative services.

The updated Social Media and Digital Communication Policy is available in English and Spanish.

Clergy and Parish Directors will be able to sign the acknowledgment for this policy in one of two ways. You may choose whichever way will be most convenient for you.

THANK YOU

The Saint Michael's Priest Fund is generously supporting Senior Priests. At the end of last year, the fund made available \$500 grants for continuing education of any Senior Priest who applied. A total of 31 Senior Priests applied and the fund forwarded \$15,500 to the Office for the Continuing Education of Clergy. The Saint Michael's Priest fund continues to underwrite the Pandemic Assistance Program for Senior Priests that offers monthly grants of up to \$700 a month from now until December 2020. The board of directors of the fund understands that many Senior Priests have suffered financial difficulties since the pandemic began and want to offer assistance to those in need. COVID-19 REMINDERS

1. If a parishioner attends Mass and later discovers they have tested positive for COVID-19

Contact your local health department and make a report with the specific date and time the parishioner attended Mass. If your city/ town does not have a health department, contact the county health department. Follow their instructions. If proper protocols of social distancing and masks were followed, then you most likely will not need to shut down. It is best to notify the parish of the specific date and Mass that the person attended. Arrange for a thorough cleaning of the building before Mass is celebrated again. The parishioner involved must complete isolation period before returning to Mass or any parish activities.

2. If a staff member tests positive for COVID-19

Contact your local health department and make a report. Follow their instructions. The employee must not come to work and needs to be in isolation. If the staff person was in contact with other staff/ office members, it may be best to shut down the office and request that those who were in contact be tested. A thorough cleaning of the parish must be done. Notifying parishioners may be necessary if the staff person had contact with parishioners, but do not reveal the name of the staff member. The staff person should not return to the parish until a minimum of 14 days and having a negative test. If able, the staff member can work from home.

3. If a priest tests positive for COVID-19

Contact your local health department and make a report. Follow their instructions. The priest must isolate in their residence.

THANK YOU AND FAREWELL!



On June 25, we said "Thank You and Farewell" to RoseAnn (Gnadt) St. Louis and Deacon Al Lazaga, who retired on July 5 and June 30, respectively. Thank you, RoseAnn and Deacon Al, for your many years of hard work and dedicated service. May our Lord continue to bless you with good health and enrich this new chapter with wonderful opportunities and all the happiness retirement can bring.

Assuming the priest had contact with many people at the parish, the parish should shut down and parishioners should be notified. Anyone who had close contact with Father should consider being tested and self-quarantine. Arrange for a thorough cleaning of the parish buildings before the parish reopens.

4. If a priest has been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19

The priest should self-quarantine and be tested for COVID-19. The results may take a few days, so out of an abundance of caution, the priest should avoid contact with others and should do no public ministry until the test results are known. If positive test see #3 above.

5. If a staff member has a member of their household test positive for COVID-19

The staff member must self-quarantine and should consider being tested for COVID-19. The results may take a few days, so out of an abundance of caution, the staff member should avoid contact with others and work from home until the test results are known. Even after a negative test result, if the staff member continues to live in the same household with a person who has tested positive for COVID-19, abundant caution should be used and they should not return to the office for a minimum of 14 days.

COVID-19 spreads mainly among people who are in close contact (within about six feet) of infected individuals for a prolonged period. Spread happens when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks, and droplets are received in the mouths or noses of people nearby. The droplets can be inhaled into the lungs. Recent studies indicate that people who are infected but do not have symptoms are likely to play a role in the spread of COVID-19. Since people can spread the virus before they know they are sick, it is important to stay at least six feet away from others when possible, even if you, or they, do not have any symptoms. Social distancing is especially important for people who are at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19.

What counts as close contact?

- You were within six feet of someone who has COVID-19 for at least 15 minutes.
- You provided care at home for someone who is sick with COVID-19.
- You had direct physical contact with the person (touched, hugged or kissed them).
- You shared eating or drinking utensils.
- They sneezed, coughed or somehow got respiratory droplets on you.


