## From the parish staff perspective - are we ready for visitors?

Parking spaces near the door are purposefully left open and signed for visitors.
Greeters are trained to be gracious hosts; offer information and answer questions in addition to a nod or handshake at the door.
Resources are provided to assist and guide parents and children with worship.
There are cards provided in the vestibule or pews inviting visitors to leave contact information and comments.
When a new person/family registers, they receive a "new member" packet of information: a welcome letter from the Pastor, Mass times, upcoming events, parish ministries, faith building groups, volunteer opportunities.
New members are offered a tour of parish facilities.
Orientation sessions are held for new members. They should be warm, friendly and inviting!
A letter from the Pastor is sent welcoming each new member/family.
Newcomers have many opportunities to become part of one or more parish ministry/study/ formation groups.
A personal contact (phone or visit) is made with each new member/family within 2 weeks after registration.
Parish committees and ministry groups are eager to embrace new members.
Youth are invited to serve in liturgical ministries. They can serve as lectors, cantors, ushers, choir members, etc.



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## As a Parish Ambassador I help to create a culture where Hospitality is truly our joy!

How to easily embrace the call to be Parish Ambassadors - ready and poised to be truly hospitable:	
	Be excited about the mission of your parish and tell others about the parish and its ministries.
	Each visitor at Mass is greeted by at least one person other than the Pastor or Greeter.
	Before Mass make eye contact with visitors, introduce yourself and welcome the visitor to the parish.
	Encourage the presence of children at Mass. They are the future of our Church!
	Bring a guest with you to Mass or a parish event at least once a year.
	Be friendly to youth and make an effort to know their names and engage them in conversation.
	Visit with others after Mass - notice and reach out to include those who are not engaged in the conversation.
	Invite visitors to join you in the fellowship area after Mass – introduce them to other parishioners.
	Seek to learn about the needs and interests of visitors/guests.
	Help build a good first impression into a lasting relationship.
