The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith has received the documentation you sent regarding the **Reverend Michael Charles BENHAM**, a priest of your Archdiocese who has been accused of sexual abuse of minors and concerning whom Your Excellency has requested dismissal from the clerical state *ex officio*.

After a careful study of the present case, I wish to inform you that this Congregation is of the mind that Your Excellency should approach Rev. Benham one last time in order that he might freely request the grace of a dispensation from the obligations of the Priesthood, including celibacy.

Furthermore, having also taken into account the fact that since 1980 no other accusations of sexual abuse have been brought against the cleric, Your Excellency, after having imposed a penal remedy on him (cf. can. 1348), may wish to consider allowing Rev. Benham a limited form of ministry within the diocese. This concession would only be permissible upon a favourable psychological evaluation of the said cleric and such ministry should not bring further scandal to the faithful nor risk to minors.

This correspondence is concerning the matter of Reverend Michael Charles Benham. His case was originally submitted for consideration in April 2004. Enclosed are copies of the original request and a newly formatted reporting form.

Since the submission of this case, I have met again with the victim and there have been protracted mediations sessions finally arriving at an out of court settlement being paid fully by the Archdiocese. As a sign of repentance, since he has admitted the truthfulness of the charges, Father Benham has been asked again to submit a request for voluntarily laicization. He refuses to do so. He likewise has refused to make any offer, even a minor symbolic one, of compensation to the victim. I have recently learned that, despite being bound by precept not to perform any public ministry, he celebrated a funeral Mass. He indicated that he did not seek permission for this action because he knew it would be denied.

Father Benham is aware that he will never be able to serve in active ministry again. A timely conclusion to this case would be best for all involved.

Thank you for your consideration in this matter. If there is anything further that is needed, please do not hesitate to inform me. I look forward to your further instructions in this matter.

Your Eminence:

This correspondence is concerning the matter of Reverend Michael Charles Benham. As you will see in the attached documentation, he was accused of sexual abuse of a minor and has admitted that these allegations are true. He is prepared for whatever decision the Church will make in his case but is not willing to apply for voluntary laicization.

Given the nature of the alleged and admitted sexual abuse, along with the serious abuse of office, I have pondered long and hard to arrive at an opinion about the most appropriate action to be taken. I have met personally with the victim in this case and believe the negative impact this abuse has had on his life, even fracturing family relationships. In order that justice may be made manifest and healing of the victim and the Church may proceed, I am asking that Reverend Michael Benham be dismissed ex officio from the clerical state. Whatever financial needs he may have can be negotiated in justice. He is vested in the pension plan and will be eligible for benefits. He will also be assisted with transition expenses.

If the judgement of Your Excellency is that this case should proceed to a dismissal by decree of your Congregation, I would cede to that judgement. Furthermore, if it is your judgement that this case should proceed through a canonical penal process, I humbly request a dispensation from prescription as well as a sanation of any procedural errors that may have occurred during the time this case was under investigation. While only one victim has come forward at this time, the frequency of the admitted offenses and the young age of the victim are such that it is my opinion that these requests are justified. I look forward to your further instructions in this matter.

PRECEPT

In response to the pastoral needs of this Christian community, in virtue of my authority as diocesan bishop (c. 381, §1), and in accord with the provisions of canon 49, I formally place upon Reverend Michael Benham the following obligations:

- 1) To refrain from all contact with minors, vulnerable adults, and other persons or categories of persons who have proven to be occasions of temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 2) To cease until further notice all public ministry including the celebration of Eucharist;
- 3) To avoid all places and situations that, from past experience, have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 4) To cease any and all activities and relationships that may be described under the broad category of pastoral counseling;
- 5) Until further notice the faculty to hear confession is revoked;
- 6) To refrain from clerical attire or identification in public.

The reasons motivating this decree are the allegations of sexual activities in violation of the obligation of clerical celibacy (c. 277, §1). These restrictions are seen as necessary and prudent precautions and will remain in effect until notice of their revocation. Any violations of this precept could result in penal action and this decree shall serve as canonical warning to that effect.

This decree shall be executed by means of its communication to Reverend Michael Benham by Very Reverend Joseph Hornacek.

Thanks for your thoughtful letter of June 25, 2004.

I am grateful for your concern for Michael Benham - - a solicitude I share - - and for your stress on the necessity of mercy and forgiveness.

Just last week, eight victims of sexual abuse by the same priest - - not Father Benham -- met with representatives of the archdiocese. Their major pain was not so much the horror of their abuse, but rather that it was done to them by a priest whom they contend was already known as an offender who had still been reassigned by the archdiocese.

I have pledged that will never happen again.

When I visited Elkhorn to deliver the sad news, a very considerate gentleman made the exact observations you expressed in your correspondence. He concluded by asking, "Couldn't you reassign him somewhere?" Before I could reply, his wife chimed in, "But, honey, you're asking Archbishop Dolan to do exactly what Cardinal Law did - - reassign an admitted offender."

I can certainly forgive Father Benham; we know the Lord will; some people have; I hope he has forgiven himself. You have - - thank you for that inspiration. The question is not mercy; the question is reassignment. That we cannot do.

Your letter was caring, thoughtful, and respectful. Thank you. I have struggled with the same questions you ask.

- 4. Any additional comments and information regarding possible future consequences would be beneficial.







I hope this letter finds you in good health at the beginning of this New Year and pleased with the degree of success you enjoy in your ministry at St. John Nepomuk Parish.

The Personnel Board notes that you will have completed your 6th year this Spring in your first appointment as Associate Pastor at St. John's. You are aware, I am sure, that the Term of Office Policy (cf., Clergy Manual II-29) requires that an Associate Pastor transfer after 6 years of service in his first or second appointment; and while it is true that the Term of Office Policy allowed every Associate to set his first term from the date the policy was approved by the Archbishop in 1980, the spirit of the policy implies that priests like yourself not remain in the same assignment for the maximum number of years allowable.

Therefore, Mike, after conferral with Father Joseph Janicki, Vicar for Priest Personnel, the Board recommends that you plan to transfer from your current assignment in June, 1982, even though you previously set your term for 1987. I write to you now in order that you may take sufficient time to reflect on the wisdom of this recommendation and to plan accordingly. I trust that the confidence which you have gained from the good work you have accomplished to date will serve to encourage you to be open now to sharing your priestly ministry in another parish of our Archdiocese. One of our Board members will personally contact you to discuss this in February.

Thank you for your continuing good work in the ministry and your cooperation with the Board on this matter.



Reverend and Dear Fathers:

Several weeks ago you sent Father Benham a letter suggestingto him that he consider accepting a new appointment. He showed me the letter and we discussed it together.

Several years ago, when you had each of us make you aware of our future plans, Father and I talked of ours. I told him that when I come to my fortieth anniversary in the Priesthood, I would like to retire from active duty. The date of that anniversary comes up in 1984. Father thought that he would like to stay on at St. John's until then. He hasn't changed his thinking as of now.

Father Benham came to St. John's as a newly ordained priest and during his years here has been developing new programs. He started a CYO for our young people and is now in the process of developing a two year program of instructions for the Sacrament of Confirmation. It still has a year to go. I think he should be allowed to finish that.

It would be a source of great relief to me if I did not have to worry about going through the trauma of changing associates in these last two years of my active priestly life. The tempo of this parish is very fast. We have so many activities going on that I could not possibily manage alone. Father and I have gotten along together very well. While we do not officially call it a Team Parish" it probably is and works better than many who do call it a team.

In the light of the above, would you, please, leave the personnel at St. John's as is? Thank you.

Dear Archbishop Weakland,

I write to you at this rather late date to request that you consider my request for an extension of my term of office as pastor of Saint Charles Borromeo in Burlington,

I felt disinclined to make the request at the time of the publication of the Spring open listing because of the burden that you were bearing subsequent to last year's situation in Plymouth. It was my hunch that you did not need yet another exception to consider, nor did I think that it was my prerogative to expect one. I resolved to respect the integrity of the term of office policy and to find the will and wisdom of God in it.

Because of my present needs I find that this year's open listing choices are rather limited for me. These are needs that I have relative to my state in life as a recovering person and someone who is under regular medical supervision as an insulin dependant diabetic.

While AA related recoverng groups are to be found throughout the Archdiocese, participation in my home group is an important component in my recovering today.

Where my medical needs (diabetes management) are concerned, while they could be supervised by any competent endocrinologist, I would prefer not to have to change doctor, nurse practitioner and medical supervision at this time.

I referred above to pastoral reasons. Those of course have to do with the feelings expressed by the leaders of the parish and staff who attended Fr. Kohler's listening session on February 15th. Perhaps he could inform you of them more precisely but there eseems to have been a consensus expressed that I be retained in my present position. While I find the consus to be both gratifying and affirming, I also know that no priest or pastor is indespensible. A large measure of concern voiced on the 15th has to do with a hoped-for expansion of facilities project. Pending the necessary approvals and permissions, our parish is hoping to renovate the former convent and build an activity center as we have outgrown our present facilities. The parish staff and leadership are fearful of the appointment of a pastor who would not promote nor support such an undertaking.

I read with interest your recent "Herald of Hope" reflection regarding the life of the Monk in the marketplace. If I may presume to add my own thought to it, I have always understood my own promise of obedience as the obligation

Priest Leaves Active Ministry as a Result of Substantiated Allegations of Sexual Abuse of a Minor

MILWAUKEE – Rev. Michael C. Benham, pastor at St. Patrick Parish, Elkhorn, has left active ministry due to a substantiated allegation of sexual abuse of a minor.

In November 2003, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee received an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor against Rev. Benham. The incident in question occurred more than 20 years ago. In accordance with archdiocesan policy, the intake report was immediately referred to the Racine County District Attorney's Office.

During the second week of January 2004, the intake report was returned to the Archdiocese from the District Attorney's Office, stating no action could be taken because the statute of limitations had expired.

Following archdiocesan policy, Fr. Benham was notified of the allegation and he substantiated the allegation. Fr. Benham was asked to step aside from active ministry on January 24, 2004.

The steps taken by archdiocesan staff members follow archdiocesan policies, which are consistent with those established as a result of the implementation of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People. Once an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor by a clergy member is substantiated, the clergy member is no longer allowed to function in active ministry.

"The sexual abuse of a minor is a crime we take very seriously in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee," said Archbishop Timothy M. Dolan. "Our first priority is the care for the victim in this case. This case is an indication that the system we have in place to handle allegations of sexual abuse of a minor is working. No one ever wants to have put these kinds of policies in motion. However, It is reassuring to know that our system and policies that are in place to protect children and young people do indeed work."

Dear Members of the St. Patrick Community:

I write to you today with a very heavy heart and imagine that you have confusing emotions after learning that Father Michael Benham will no longer serve as your pastor.

The sexual abuse of a minor is a crime that we in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee take very seriously. That is why I joined the parish this evening to celebrate Mass and to share this information about Father Benham with you first hand. As your leader and shepherd, it is important that I am with you for the good times and for the bad times.

The Catholic Church worldwide has suffered from the tragedy of sexual abuse of minors. Of course, that suffering is much closer to home when the issue affects our parish community. As we have worked our way through this scandal over the last two years, there has been much anger, sadness, confusion, hurt and even hope. I'm sure that you will be experiencing these emotions over the next several months.

Since coming to the Archdiocese, I have dealt with parishioners whose leaders have been asked to leave active ministry. I have been asked why, in obedience to Jesus, we cannot forgive these priests who have abused young children. My response is: we do forgive these men. We know God forgives them; we must forgive them too; and I hope they can forgive themselves.

Forgiveness, however, does not eliminate the need for those accused to take responsibility and to be held accountable for their behavior. In this regard, the words of our Holy Father and from the United States' Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People are quite clear. We do forgive Father Benham. We acknowledge that he served your parish community to the best of his ability. We want to stay close to him and offer him our support.

All professionals – teachers, physicians, nurses, counselors, for example – are held to high standards. Priests can be no different. The offense was serious and substantiated. If we are firm in our resolve to protect children and restore trust, we must be able to assure our people that no priest who has ever abused a minor is in active ministry.

I understand that the coming days, weeks and months may be unsettling. You may be wondering what the future holds for you and your parish. We are making every effort to provide for your pastoral needs. Father Benham cooperated and has agreed to step aside from active ministry, in accordance with archdiocesan and national policies. For now, Father Paul Daniels will serve as temporary administrator of St. Patrick's Parish. We want to be sure that we take the time necessary to determine how best to meet the sacramental and pastoral needs of your parish community.

I will keep all members of your parish and school community in my daily prayers. I ask that you pray for all involved. Our Church will be made stronger as we suffer through this turmoil. May you find God's strength to help you through this most difficult time.

Please excuse the delay in responding to you. I attempted to contact the victim when the initial letter was received, and I never received a call back. When you contacted me last week, my memory was not stirred by the descriptions you gave me. However, in reviewing the sexual abuse intake report, I do recall reviewing this matter. Our determination was that based upon the date of the allegations from 1976 through 1980, that this matter is not suitable for prosecution due to the statute of limitations. I had never received contact back from the victim. If I do receive contact, I will notify you. Please perform any investigation you consider appropriate. It will not be interfering with any law enforcement efforts on this end. The only factor that would change my mind would be if Father Benham was out of the state for a significant period of time upwards of 15 to 18 years, during the pendency of these matters, that may move this within this framework of the statute of limitations. If you receive that information through your investigation, please contact me. I will again reconsider.

Your Eminence:

This correspondence is concerning the matter of Reverend Michael Charles Benham. As you will see in the attached documentation, he was accused of sexual abuse of a minor and has admitted that these allegations are true. He is prepared for whatever decision the Church will make in his case but is not willing to apply for voluntary laicization.

Given the nature of the alleged and admitted sexual abuse, along with the serious abuse of office, I have pendered long and hard to arrive at an opinion about the most appropriate action to be taken. I have met personally with the victim in this case and believe the negative impact this abuse has had on his life, even fracturing family relationships. In order that justice may be made manifest and healing of the victim and the Church may proceed, I am asking that Reverend Michael Benham be dismissed *ex officio* from the clerical state. Whatever financial needs he may have can be negotiated in justice. He is vested in the pension plan and will be eligible for benefits. He will also be assisted with transition expenses.

If the judgement of Your Excellency is that this case should proceed to a dismissal by decree of your Congregation, I would cede to that judgement. Furthermore, if it is your judgement that this case should proceed through a canonical penal process, I humbly request a dispensation from prescription as well as a sanation of any procedural errors that may have occurred during the time this case was under investigation. While only one victim has come forward at this time, the frequency of the admitted offenses and the young age of the victim are such that it is my opinion that these requests are justified. I look forward to your further instructions in this matter.

Dear Michael,

I acknowledge your letter of February 18, 2007.

While appreciating the explanation you kindly gave, I must be clear and firm in renewing the rescript against you: *you may exercise no public ministry as a priest, nor present yourself as one*. This means any public Mass, the sacraments, or public prayer.

We have stated to this community that there is no priest against whom there has been a substantiated allegation of sexual abuse of a minor who is publicly exercising priestly ministry. Your admitted actions make it inaccurate for me to state that.

This has also caused confusion among the faithful of your former parish, and will thus probably necessitate a published clarification from me. I doubt if you will welcome this; I certainly do not look forward to it.

It also raises a question about whether you properly understand the nature of "a life of prayer and penance," which must be of weight in the Holy See's eventual decision about your status as a priest.

For the record, although, during our visit in November, I do recall you telling me of visits to the sick (not as a priest), I do not remember you mentioning anything about a Mass with a small group of people. I would have asked you to stop.

While I can prohibit no one from exercising the corporal and spiritual works of mercy, I can restrict one from doing such as *public priestly ministry*.

I owe you this frank clarification and reminder.

I have read your memo regarding Fr. Michael Benham. I can appreciate what he has been through and how he has suffered for his actions 26 years ago. No doubt he continues to suffer mentally, emotionally and physically. I am glad he no longer contemplates suicide. I know from working with other priests in his situation that finding employment is extremely difficult, i.e., Frs. Michael Krejci and Ronald Engel. I can also sympathize with the problems that he faces based on the limited financial resources available to him. I don't think anyone wants to see someone lose their home.

I would be happy to meet with him to offer company and concern. However, I am wondering why this support wasn't mandated and/or begun long before now.

That said, what about the physical, emotional, mental and probably spiritual damage he did to his victim(s)? What financial burdens were levied upon them because of his actions? How hard was it for them to face their family and friends and at what cost? Has the crime against their person(s) cost them the careers and employment opportunities that may have been available to them if their meeting Fr. Benham had never occurred? What about the financial burden to the Archdiocese in providing therapy, monetary settlements and costly attorney's fees to our attorney's and the victim(s) attorney's? What about the scandal that he has brought to the victim(s), their families and to the Church of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, and particularly the faithful at St. Patrick in Elkhorn when he had to be removed and the reason made known? What about the toll his actions have taken on the person(s) of other people such as those involved in the mediation sessions with his victim(s)?

Fr. Benham is 56 years of age. Based on current statistical information he can easily be expected to live for at least another 20+ years. This would perpetuate the Archdiocese's financial outlay to him for all those years. The Archdiocese would have to pay him a salary as well as his insurance premiums. Both of those amounts will continue to escalate.

I am sympathetic to your inclination of allowing Fr. Benham to lead a life of prayer and penance versus the loss of the clerical state. However, I do not agree. I would recommend in favor of laicization.

As you are aware, I have delayed a long time in making a decision about the future of Michael Benham.

The most recent communication from CDF suggested that I might ask him one more time to request voluntarily a return to the lay state. It also asks that, given the long time (26 years) that has passed since the abuse, I might consider allowing him a "limited form of ministry in the archdiocese. ... upon a favorable psychological evaluation . . . that such ministry would not bring further scandal to the faithful nor risk to minors."

The first option - - laicization - - Michael is unwilling to do. The second option I would never be willing to do.

Based upon this, Barbara Anne prepared a letter for CDF dated October 20, 2005, asking CDF to laicize Michael ex officio.

I never sent the letter, and have been mulling over the case since then.

Last week, I visited Michael at his home in Burlington. We concelebrated Mass and had a lengthy conversation. This very fruitful and moving visit only confirmed my observations about him, which have come from correspondence and telephone conversations since his removal from all ministry:

- 1. Michael has true remorse for his past abusive actions.
- 2. He lives a textbook "life of prayer and penance:" daily does he offer Mass and prays the liturgy of the hours; he considers himself a priest to the core and, while he realizes that he will never again publicly exercise his ministry, he still longs to live as a priest in seclusion and silence.

- 3. His health is fragile: he has advanced diabetes, much emotional stress, and is a recovering alcoholic. He was close to suicidal after his removal from office, but is much more stable now, thanks to counseling.
- 4. He has tried to find employment. Because he is honest about his past, he has been unsuccessful.
- 5. He continues in sobriety and in his program.
- 6. His financial state is shaky, and he would not make it without the insurance and minimal subsidy from the archdiocese. He will probably soon have to sell his house.

My strong inclination is to allow Michael Benham to live a life of prayer and penance. I would very much appreciate your thoughts.

Thank you for consulting on the Benham case. I appreciate your desire to bring this matter to resolution as well as your care and concern for Michael. There is probably no one here who minimizes the pain that abusers suffer when their actions result in their removal from ministry.

Although Michael has apparently expressed remorse to you, I have not seen that remorse translate into action. The victim in this case requested a token amount of money as a gesture of recognition of the harm he had caused; Michael has consistently and adamantly refused to do so. You and I have both met — on multiple occasions — with and been witness to the terrible effects the four years of abuse beginning at age 11 has had on him. This was not a one-time incident of indiscretion. There have to be consequences to actions. I do not doubt that an all-merciful God has forgiven Michael but an all-just God will also probably require some purgation for these actions. We are not asked to judge those larger questions. We need only look at the temporal effects of Michael's actions and we know that they have caused serious and deep wounds for

Michael's life of solitude is made possible because we are paying his subsidy and could be doing so for the next 10 years until he is eligible for pension. Even beyond that subsidy is health and dental insurance with continued payments even after he reaches pension age. I am not sure how we can justify this as "good stewardship" of the resources people have entrusted to us. Thus far, we have limited the application of a life of prayer and penance to those of extremely advanced age or with very serious illness. I believe this practice should be continued. How do I honestly look a victim-survivor in the face in mediation and say we are acting consistently with Pope John Paul II's statement that "there is no place in the priesthood for those who would harm a child"? I have been able to speak frankly when asked how we are handling the perpetrators; I would not feel I could do so going forward if we take this step backward.

I can appreciate that Michael's finances are strained. But what about those of the Archdiocese? How many more people are we going to have to terminate because our finances have been so adversely affected not only by settlements but also by paying unassignable priests? What about the adverse financial effect of the long-term damage to victims-survivors as we have seen with

When all is said and done, my desire would be to continue our present policy on the limited use of prayer and penance and to re-submit a petition for laicization in this case.

It is only appropriate to summarize in writing for you the information you and I have discussed by phone on multiple occasions last week. As you yourself have noted, it has been a lot for you to process all at once. I continue to be concerned about your well-being during this period, and I hope you have connected with a therapist as we have discussed. I am sorry that we did not talk a few days ago when I called back at the time you requested. I will, of course, respect your wishes about contact, but please know that I would like to provide you resources and support at this difficult time.

After the report of sexual abuse you gave me on November 3, 2003 was eventually returned by the Racine County District Attorney's office, Fr. Michael Benham was confronted with your report of full body massages, which you indicated started the summer before sixth grade and continued through eighth grade graduation. Michael Benham acknowledged the truthfulness of your account. As I told you, he believes it occurred a couple years later than you do, but this is irrelevant to the overall situation.

He was immediately removed from all ministries. It was important to reach you before this was publicly announced. You and I finally succeeded in reaching each other on Monday, January 26, and I explained to you that announcements would be made on the upcoming weekend. We also clarified that I am available to return your calls at any time that you request.

I also explained to you your eligibility to seek restitution through the new Clergy Sexual Abuse Mediation Service. We clarified that you can pursue this individually, and do not have to be part of a group. I encouraged you to focus on immediate priorities of connecting with a therapist and getting yourself through the period of publicity before focusing on mediation and restitution.

I trust that you are aware of how personal information about you got into the newspaper; we have not nor will we release any personal information about you. I did want to let you know that I received a call suggesting that some of your former classmates may have identified you.

I remain concerned about you Please know that the Archdiocese of Milwaukee would like to assist you and your family with healing and restoring wholeness.

This correspondence is concerning the matter of Reverend Michael Charles Benham. As you requested, we have approached Father Benham one additional time to ask that he seek voluntary laicization as a sign of repentance for the repeated sexual abuse of a minor, offenses which has admitted took place. Once again, he has stated that he is unwilling to so do.

Given the seriousness of the offenses and the length of time over which they occurred, I do not see any way that Father Benham could be restored to any ministerial position without grave scandal. As we are all aware, assurances from psychological evaluations in the past have not safeguarded the Church's good name nor have they protected against civil liability.

In this present situation, therefore, I would reiterate my original *votum*. In order that justice may be made manifest and healing of the victim and the Church may proceed, I am asking that Reverend Michael Benham be dismissed *ex officio* from the clerical state. Whatever financial needs he may have can be negotiated in justice. He is vested in the pension plan and will be eligible for benefits. He will also be assisted with transition expenses.

If the judgement of Your Excellency is that this case should proceed to a dismissal by decree of your Congregation, I would cede to that judgement. If it is judged that an administrative penal process would be appropriate, I am prepared to conduct one upon your authorization. Given his recent response, I have no reasonable hope that Father Benham would participate in a penal trial.

In an audience granted on 27 August 2008 the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI decreed that the Reverend Benham is dismissed ex officio et pro bono Ecclesiae from the clerical state and is, moreover, released from all obligations of the Sacred Priesthood, including that of celibacy. Any censures under which he may be labouring are remitted by this decree.

Your Excellency is asked kindly to inform him of this decision according to paragraph 7 of the enclosed decree. A signed and notarized copy of the decree should be returned to this Dicastery at your earliest convenience.

LAICIZATION RESCRIPT - UNOFFICIAL TRANSLATION Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith

The Supreme Pontiff Pope Benedict XVI

having heard the opinion of his Eminence the Cardinal Prefect of this Congregation concerning the serious actions of the above named presbyter of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee (Milwaukee, USA), with the proper documentation having been sent and finding this final decision to be beyond appeal and not subject to recourse,

has decreed

for the good of the Church that the penalty of dismissal from the presbyterate be imposed.

This same presbyter is also granted a dispensation from all of the obligations connected with sacred Orders in accord with the following consideration:

- The dismissal and dispensation take effect at the very moment of the decision of the Roman Pontiff.
- The decree of dismissal and dispensation are to be communicated to the presbyter by the competent Ordinary and no one has the right to separate those two elements. Indeed, further, it carries with it, insofar as it is necessary, absolution from censures.
- 3. Notice of the granting of the dismissal and dispensation is to be inscribed in the baptismal register of the aforementioned presbyter's parish.
- 4. With regard to the celebration of a canonical marriage, the norms set down in The Code of Canon Law must be applied. The Ordinary, however, should take care that the matter be discreetly handled without pomp or external display.
- 5. The ecclesiastical authority, to whom it belongs to notify the priest, should earnestly exhort him to take part in the life of the People of God, in a manner consonant with his new mode of living, to give edification, and thus to show himself a most loving son of the Church. At the same time, however, he should be informed of the following points:
 - a) the dismissed presbyter automatically loses the rights proper to the clerical state, as well as ecclesiastical dignities and offices; he is no longer bound by the other obligations connected with the clerical state;
 - b) he remains excluded from the exercise of the sacred ministry, with the exception of those functions mentioned in canons 976 and 986, §2, and, as a result, he may not give a homily nor is he able to hold a directive office in the pastoral field nor to exercise the function of parochial administrator;

- c) similarly, he may not discharge any function in seminaries and in equivalent institutions. In other institutions of higher studies, which are in any way whatever dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not exercise a directive function;
- d) in those institutions of higher studies which are not dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not teach any discipline which is properly theological or closely connected with the same;
- e) in institutions of lower studies, which are dependent upon ecclesiastical authority, he may not exercise the function of teaching a discipline which is properly theological. A dismissed and dispensed presbyter is held by the same rule in teaching Religion in an institution of the same kind not dependent upon ecclesiastical authority.
- 6. The Ordinary of the dismissed presbyter, in keeping with required prudence, must care that scandal not be given to the faithful. This pastoral care of the Ordinary is most important if danger of abuse of a minor, although remote, is at hand.
- 7. Notification of the dismissal and dispensation can be made either personally or through an ecclesiastical notary or through registered mail. The dismissed priest ought to retain a signed copy of his reception and acceptance of this dismissal and dispensation and also its regulations, but if he does not it does not impede the effect of this decree.
- 8. At an opportune time, the Ordinary is to send a brief report to the Congregation on his completion of the notification, and, if there is any wonderment on the part of the faithful he is to provide a prudent explanation.

All things to the contrary notwithstanding.



Since the removal of your priestly faculties, the archdiocese has been providing you with monthly sustenance, pension benefits, and health insurance.

As of October 1, 2008, we can no longer send you a monthly sustenance check. We will continue to cover your health and pension.

The archdiocese is in serious financial difficulties. We recently had to let over twenty cherished lay employees go. The main reason we are in such straits is, as we have publicly stated, because of the towering expense of dealing with the results of the crisis caused by the clergy sexual abuse scandal. Many wonder how we can continue to pay the offenders. I find myself asking the same. I wish we had the money to continue to do. We do not.

AGREEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE

. 1

This Agreement and Mutual Release (hereafter "Agreement") is made by and between (hereafter and all of its affiliated entities, schools, and parishes, including, without limitation, St. John Nepomuk Congregation (hereafter "Archdiocese").

has advised the Archdiocese that he was sexually abused by

Michael Benham (hereafter "Benham"), a priest of the Archdiocese, when

was a minor. Benham has admitted that this report is accurate.

and the Archdiocese entered into mediation to achieve reconciliation and restoration, to address issues of concern to both sides, to further prevent sexual abuse of minors and to enhance Church practices in this regard, and to otherwise resolve and settle all disputes between them.

Accordingly, the parties to this Agreement wish to resolve and satisfy all claims of any nature that has against the Archdiocese, and all of the Archdiocese's employees, agents, insurers, officers, directors, affiliates, and assigns, including, without limitation, all members of the Roman Catholic clergy and all parishes, schools, and any person or entity affiliated with the Archdiocese, arising from the sexual abuse of by Benham without the necessity of further proceedings or expense of any nature, and all

parties wish to generally release one another from all liability for any claims that may exist to the date of the signing of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, any claims for sexual abuse of by Benham.

So, in consideration of the mutual promises made here, and other valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties to this Agreement agree as follows:

- 1. The Archdiocese agrees to provide with \$50,000. These funds shall be used at own discretion.
- 2. The Archdiocese agrees to provide payment for the professional services of a counselor, psychologist, psychiatrist and/or other mental health provider as deemed necessary and appropriate for and his immediate family members (i.e., parents, siblings, spouse and children) to address issues regarding this abuse. The Archdiocese shall make payments to the counselor for reasonable costs, billed at the counselor's usual and customary rate. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement, the Archdiocese's therapy payments owed under this provision shall be based upon treatment plans submitted by each individual and his/her counselor. This clause is not time-limited.
- 3. The Archdiocese agrees to request of Benham that he provide a monthly payment to Up until Benham either agrees to the request, or declines it, or alternatively, affirmatively instructs the Archdiocese not to contact him any longer regarding the matter (or alternatively, the Archdiocese becomes subject to any legal obligation not to contact him any further), a routine request, such as monthly, will be made by a representative of the Archdiocese to Benham for this purpose. The Archdiocese shall not be liable for any failure or refusal by Benham to respond to the

Archdiocese's requests, or of any refusal or failure by Benham to agree to such a plan or to provide such payment.

- and the Archdiocese will each bear their own costs and any attorney's fees associated with the settlement, and there will be no payment from the Archdiocese to other than that specifically enumerated in these paragraphs.
- 5. In return for the payments set out above, and for the mutual promises contained herein, releases and forever discharges the Archdiocese, and all of the Archdiocese's employees, agents, officers, directors, affiliates, insurers and assigns, including, without limitation, all members of the Roman Catholic clergy, and all parishes and schools, including, without limitation, St. John Nepomuk Congregation and any person or entity affiliated with the Archdiocese of Milwaukee from, and covenants not to sue them for, all claims, causes of action, charges, and demands, whether in tort, contract, or otherwise, of any nature that he may have had at any time up to and including the date of signing of this Agreement, including, without limitation, any claim of any nature arising from the assault, injury, whether physical or mental, or any other activity by Benham.
- 6. The Archdiocese hereby releases and forever discharges from all claims, demands, and causes of action of any nature that were in existence up to and including the date of the signing of this Agreement.
- 7. This Agreement supersedes all prior understandings and agreements between the parties, and constitutes the full agreement of the parties. No change to this Agreement shall be enforced against any party unless it is in writing signed by both

parties. The Archdiocese shall continue rendering and fulfilling the terms of this

Agreement when successors assume offices currently held by archdiocesan officials.

8. The undersigned represent and warrant that each has read the foregoing Agreement; had an opportunity to discuss it with a lawyer; and fully understands its terms; voluntarily, freely, and without coercion signs the Agreement; and that Dr. Barbara Anne Cusack is an authorized representative of the Archdiocese and is duly authorized to execute this Agreement and Mutual Release.
