SUMMARY:

In a Vicar Log entry for April 21, 1986, reference is made to a conversation between Bishop Sklba and Father Krejci in which the Bishop states: "In response to my delicate question regarding the occurrence with younger people at Our Lady of Good Hope Parish (OLGH), he assured me that there had been no reocurrence and that the stresses in the ministry at St. Gall's did not seem to cause any problems in that regard." The records do not indicate how the knowledge of an "occurrence" came to the Vicar's office or if, indeed, it refers to the sexual abuse of a minor.

In June 1994, Father Derfus reported in a letter to the Archbishop an incident of sexual abuse of an adolescent by Father Krejci. The incident had occurred in the early 1980's while Father Krejci was assigned at OLGH. Father Derfus said he reported the incident to Bishop Brust at the time, insisted that Father Krejci receive psychological counseling, apologize to the boy and his parents, and take no more camping trips with adolescents. He reported that the incident was widely known in the parish at the time and he was not sure if any others came forward to the Archdiocese. There is no record in the Vicar files that indicates such reporting and there is no record of Bishop Brust's involvement.

In September 1994, the Derfus letter was sent from the Archbishop to the Vicar's Office for filing.

Father Krejci was sent for inpatient treatment in November 1994. He continued in various treatment programs until June 1996. At that time he was permitted limited, part-time ministry with supervision and monitoring.

Father Krejci admits to genital fondling of two adolescent boys (7th or 8th grade) while camping. An additional person has come forward to say that he, too, was molested. Father denies that report. The matter was sent the the DA and found to be beyond the statute of limitations. However, they did a summary investigation including contacting another individual who was allegedly molested. This individual states that on a camping trip with Father Krejci he awoke to find Father had taken hand and placed on Father's genitals. Both were clothed. Said "no" and the incident ended. The reported that Father Derfus knew of the incidents and talked to the boys separately. He could not recall if there had been parental involvement.

At some point in this process, there was indication that this was a case of "self-reporting" in 1994, but the review of the file does not support this interpretation.

NOTICE TO PRIESTS

At St. Therese Parish, Father Mike Krejci held a meeting to which all adult parishioners had been invited. At that meeting, he disclosed that he is one of the six priests in active ministry whose situation is being reviewed by the Special Commission to Study Allegations of Sexual Abuse. He explained that he had engaged in inappropriate touching of two teenagers about 25 years ago. After that occurrence, he had met with the parents and the teenagers involved and apologized. Neither family sought to bring charges.

In 1994, Father Krejci came forward to the Archdiocese to self-disclose this behavior and to seek help. He received extensive inpatient and outpatient therapy for a year. While in a special, supervised group setting, he continued outpatient treatment while working part-time in a secular employment and part-time in ministry. He was gradually permitted to assume active ministry in the Archdiocese.

In his statement, Father Krejci noted that he continues seeing a counselor, meets regularly with a monitor from the Archdiocese who submits written reports to the Vicar for Clergy. He stated that he does not live alone but with another priest who is informed of his situation. From the outset, there have been people at the parish where he has been assigned since being permitted to resume ministry who are informed about his history. He has no contact with minors without other adults being present.

Father Krejci acknowledged that he does not know what will happen over the next few months. He stated that he knows that, despite his desire to continue serving at the parish, this option may not be open to him.

Please keep all of these people and situations in your prayers.

This will inform you that the above named client is now a resident of our halfway house. We accept him on the recommendation of his primary therapist, Dr. of the Saint Louis Consultation Center. Dr. believed that Michael needed more structure in his life, if he ever hopes to deal effectively with his sickness.

The staff here interviewed Michael and it was agreed to take him on a probationary basis. If his performance matches his spoken wishes and hopes, then he should do very well here. At

least that is our hope for him.

Michael lives here with ten other men who all are in similar situations. It is a halfway house and therefore follows the Twelve Step tradition. Each man's daily activities are monitored for his own growth. There is a daily liturgy. Each of the men who can still offer the Eucharist take their turn as the principal celebrant.

Our staff tries to provide everything possible to enable someone who is trying to get well to do so. Each month, a progress report will be sent to you. In it we promise to be totally honest with you so that time and money are not wasted.

After knowing you these many years (all the way back to Latrobe), it is a pleasure to be in touch with you again. I wish the circumstances were a little more pleasant, but we live in strange times.

Please keep our men in your prayers and be assured for our

Mike is still struggling. He has great difficulty trying to sort out his feelings. He is a very impulsive man and wages a daily battle to control his inappropriate behavior. He admits this, which is good, but does not seem capable to then take the next steps, i.e., to find out how to help himself.

He can be easily distracted by external denial niceties and by preoccupation with food, gardening, etc. These are not bad in themselves, but serve to become comfort issues that are more pleasurable than trying to learn and acknowledge the truth about himself.

He is not able to define his own sexuality as heterosexual or homosexual and yet by his own admission, homosexual thought patterns have dominated his life for the past twenty years. Some of his sexual preferences are of a very dangerous nature. If he does not soon begin to deal with these fantasies, any hope of a recovery remains doubtful.

He has great difficulty relating to his therapist who is very demanding of him and he finds group very uncomfortable. I am not even sure that he has a good handle on his own anger and depression.

He defines himself as a "good priest," but this is only in a very external sense. His depth perception needs much attention if he is to enjoy any type of healthy recovery. Because of this, we monitor Mike very closely so that he will not hurt himself or another person.

Mike indicated that he was referred to the group for problems naming feelings and for compulsive masturbation. He related that he was somewhat apprehensive in starting in group, but also revealed that he has met other members at other groups. In addition, he expressed anger that a parishioner from his parish had accused him of financial mismanagement. Mike also related that a classmate visited one weekend and that he wanted to isolate after the visit ended. Finally, Mike revealed that he relied on group members in his recovery plan when he felt urges to engage in compulsive sexual behavior.

Mike is a new group member. We would like to see him use group time to more fully explore his emotions and to relate his difficulties.

Mike attended four of the last four scheduled therapy groups. Mike used one group session to process significant events in depth with group members, a step which shows increasing group participation.

Mike wrote a letter to a former work associate after asking for feedback from group members and members of his group at St. Louis Consultation Center. He is awaiting a response as this associate is out of town. In addition, Mike expressed concern about his future early in the month as he was nearing the end of his program at St. Louis Consultation Center. However, he received word later in the month that his Bishop suggested that he seek laicization after his program ended. He appropriately expressed feelings of sadness and anger in reporting his response to this information and role played expressing his feelings with another group member. Finally, Mike was able to identify emotional factors (anger, loneliness) that lead to sexual thoughts.

Mike made significant progress in relating his feelings and in disclosing information to the group this month. We would like to see him continue with this level of participation.

During the month of November, Mike made two trips away from our facility. The first trip was from November 9 - 13, 1995 to Minneapolis - St. Paul to stay with a married couple that he has known for some time. We were notified that his uncle had passed away and we called Mike to inform him of the situation. Mike stated that he would get permission from the Archdiocese to concelebrate the funeral Mass. The second trip was over the Thanksgiving weekend, November 22 - 27, 1995. He stayed at St. Anthony's parish in Pewaukee. It was necessary to delay his trip back to our facility for one day due to a snow storm on his scheduled day of departure.

Mike informed me that the Archdiocese is in the beginning stages of formulating a plan for his possible return to Milwaukee. We offer any assistance that is required to give an overall picture of Mike's recovery. Mike is currently pursuing activities associated with his career planning. He was offered a job interview for a position that coordinates volunteers for emergency services. Mike has decided to pursue the interview, while also seeking an eventual return to the diocese.

We will continue to monitor his progress and we will keep you informed of any changes. I take the opportunity to wish you a happy and holy Christmas.

I was informed by both Fr. Mike and his therapist that he would be leaving our facility to move into an apartment complex that is located in St. Louis on February 12, 1996. This move would cut down on his traveling time and would afford him more independence. There are others living in the complex that could provide support to Fr. Mike in this period of transition. After the meeting with his Vicar and his therapist, Fr. Mike thought that independent living would be beneficial to him before he returns to the Archdiocese in June 1996. He will continue with both individual and group therapy. This move is creating anxiety for Fr. Mike and it will put him in a more responsible position in his recovery. Fr. Mike also intends on obtaining part time work to fill his weekly schedule and to also raise additional money that could be put toward the cost of his treatment.

If it is the intention of the Archdiocese to place Fr. Mike back into active ministry, we would suggest that he would be strictly monitored and that there would be a detailed aftercare plan set in place. Relapse is always a potential, and both Fr. Mike and the Archdiocese need to keep this in mind regarding his future assignment. Fr. Mike was compliant while he resided at our facility and he followed all of our monitoring requirements. He worked hard at his recovery and we hope that he takes one step at a time and does not rush ahead of himself during his recovery.

I am writing to provide you with a report on the participation of Rev. Michael Krejci in the Aftercare Workshop conducted by the St. Louis Consultation Center on August 14-16, 1996. Information contained in this correspondence is being released in accordance with statutory requirements regarding confidentiality and may not be re-released without the express consent of Fr. Krejci. We recommend that these materials be destroyed after use and not be made part of a permanent record; they will be kept on file at the Consultation Center for a period of five years.

During the course of the workshop, Mike was seen by Ph.D., for an assessment of his status and needs. He also participated in a variety of group activities designed to assist him in examining the current state of his recovery. Information regarding Mike's status was obtained from a written self-evaluation, from an individual interview, and from the collective impressions of the professionals with whom he interacted during the course of the workshop. A written report from Dr.

Mike remained in individual therapy and in group therapy at the St. Louis Consultation Center after his discharge from the Intensive Outpatient Program in August of 1995. He returned to Milwaukee in June of 1996 to resume ministry. He related that his major activities since his return have been instituting appropriate therapeutic support and ministerial duties. Mike continued in individual therapy, spiritual direction, and Twelve-Step groups since leaving the Intensive Outpatient Treatment Program and since his return to Milwaukee. He was involved in the Step-down group at the Consultation Center before leaving St. Louis.

Mike engaged in weekly individual sessions with Dr. while in St. Louis. Family of origin issues, intimacy, sexual abstinence, and exploration of emotions were salient issues during this therapy. Since his return to Milwaukee, Mike interviewed three psychologists suggested by Liz Piasecki, then chose and engaged in therapy with Dr. once weekly. He has completed five sessions. He related that Dr. "has lots of experience in sexuality" and

"has worked with clergy." Mike indicated that he finds Dr. interpersonal style helpful, in that he pauses before responding to Mike, which has clearly identified Mike's tendency to question whether others are evaluating him negatively for thoughts and feelings.

With regards to spiritual direction, Mike met with Sr. SSND, after his discharge from the Intensive Outpatient Program. He described her as "remarkable" in assisting him to focus on his feelings and to take interpersonal risks. Since his return to Milwaukee, he has met with whom he knew before his treatment in St. Louis. He is in the process of setting up appointments with her after her vacation.

Mike was involved in Twelve-Step SCA groups and with the St. Louis Consultation Center's Step-down group after his discharge from the intensive program. His involvement at SCA groups was intense and showed considerable effort in working the steps to remain abstinent. He was an active member of the Step-down group in addressing family of origin, emotional, sexual, and relationship issues. Since his return to Milwaukee, Mike immediately joined a Twelve-Step SCA group and is in the process of developing a second group for members and himself. In addition, he is working to develop a Gay Priest Support Group with Dr. Piasecki.

Mike disclosed that his emotional status has been "sad with grief" in leaving therapy and support systems in St. Louis. He is discussing the transition with Dr. He has not experienced any symptoms of depression. Mike indicated that he was somewhat auxious when first meeting with Father Straub, but found him quite supportive in returning to ministry and with necessary treatment concerns. Similarly, he was auxious when parishioners first asked about his stay in St. Louis, but he indicated that he has effectively dealt with the auxiety and used assertive responses developed during his treatment at the Consultation Center.

No behavioral difficulties were noted. Mike indicated that he experienced some fantasy "sadistic (masochistic) conflicts in the morning," but has intervened by structuring his activity (e.g., arising from bed when awakening). Mike indicated that he has avoided areas where he previously engaged in anonymous sexual activity and has experienced no desire to visit those areas.

Mike remained in contact with friends in Milwaukee during treatment in St. Louis, made arrangements to meet with them before leaving, and has been in frequent contact since his return. An old college friend, Tom Venne with whom he lives, and Tom McGuine, a contact person from the Diocese, were all described as "very supportive." Mike also derives a great deal of support from Dr. Piasecki and from Twelve-Step group comembers in St. Louis and in Milwaukee.

Rev. Michael Krejci - Aftercare Report/Page Three

Mike was not involved in ministerial activities while in St. Louis and worked part-time at the Humane Society. He indicated that this job allowed the opportunity to develop social relationships with coworkers. Since his return to Milwaukee, Mike returned to ministry. He assists with weekend Liturgy and weekly Sacramental duties, and provides scripture study at St. Theresa. He is also part of the Adult Parishioner Committee dealing with Bible study and Liturgy at St. Anthony's. Mike revealed that he had some difficulties in taking on extra work when first returning to Milwaukee, but is now setting limitations in order to provide time for socialization and for support groups.


Mike appeared to make significant progress while in St. Louis in his treatment program by addressing family of origin issues, emotions, sexuality, intimacy, and assertiveness. He appears to be replicating his treatment program in Milwaukee on a less intense level. He appears to be intervening early in problematic behavior (e.g., overwork and fantasy) and to be establishing appropriate therapeutic and support systems.

Recommendations:

It is recommended that Mike continue with his current level of individual psychotherapy, spiritual direction, and support groups. It is helpful for him to develop additional support groups (Twelve-Step, Gay Priest Support Group). He appears to be doing so in conjunction with his treatment team. In addition, Mike may continue to evaluate the balance between work and socialization in order to inhibit feelings of loneliness which lead to maladaptive behavior.

Today I spoke with Dr. at the St. Louis Consultation Center where Mike is in						
outpatient treatment. We discussed the Archbishop's decision to encourage Mike to leave the						
active ministry. Dr. gave me an update on where treatment has progressed at this point.						
Dr. says Mike is to be discharged the middle of July. At this point he has not been						
sexually acting out. The clinical team does not believe this is sustainable in Mike's case, even						
though this is the first time in Mike's adult life he has not sexually acted out in public ways.						
Treatment has focused on an emphasis on external controls.						
Dr. emphasized that the long-term prospects for sobriety for Mike are not good. We agreed that when the Archbishop was going to be in contact with Mike to tell him of his decision regarding Mike's ministerial status, that St. Louis would be notified several days in advance in order to have some acting out and suicidal acting out precautions in place. We also discussed whether Mike could stay in the Wounded Brothers Project and transition out of the priesthood and find a job in the St. Louis area. If that is a decision that Mike and the Archbishop make, then Dr. will facilitate that transition.

I am writing to provide you with a final report regarding the participation of Rev. Michael Krejci in the Intensive Outpatient Program of the St. Louis Consultation Center. Information contained in this correspondence is being released in accordance with statutory requirements regarding confidentiality and may not be re-released without the express consent of Fr. Krejci. We recommend that these materials be destroyed after use; they will be kept on file at the Consultation Center for a period of five years.

On Tuesday, August 8, 1995, a discharge conference was conducted at which Michael's progress					
in the program was discussed and recommendations were made for ongoing care. Present for this					
conference were yourself,	SSJ, Ph.D., Sr.				
SSND, and myself. What follows is a summary of that conference.					

Following a brief introduction, Mike began by describing his experience in the treatment program. He said plainly at the outset that the program was hard for him. He found it especially difficult to deal with the emotional side of his experience and to be self-disclosing. He admitted that he wasted time at the outset by just being compliant with external expectations. He then described how he began to open up and be more genuine. He described his struggles with learning to express his feelings; he indicated that this was slow work but that it was actually happening in his life. He indicated that he was able to catch himself when he was engaging in empty intellectualization and is now able at times to stop such behavior. He described how easy it was for him to run away from his feelings and push them down; he indicated that he was better at recognizing his emotions and dealing with them more straightforwardly.

Mike went on to describe significant areas of work accomplished in the context of the program. He indicated that he came to terms with his sexual identity as a gay man. He described how he had always denied the possibility of actually being gay, despite a history of engaging in homosexual behavior. He described how helpful meetings of Sexual Compulsives' Anonymous (SCA) was in this process. He also described how it was helpful to be in contact with gay men who were living responsible lives. Mike also described his struggles with self-worth. He described the process of learning and owning what he needs as a normal adult human being. He described how he had always wanted to please authority and how this very significant issue in his life led to a way of operating. He described the underside of this feature as being a desire to rebel, a feature which coalesced around his sexual behavior.

Mike went on to describe how he was working to counter his dependency upon what he thought others' opinions of him were. He indicated that he found it helpful to live in the country at Wounded Brothers, indicating that this felt like going home to him, as he was raised in a rural environment. He found the setting serene, quiet, and safe; it provided him a place where it was difficult to act out impulsively. This impulsivity wasn't simply about sex but also about other forms of diversive acting out. Mike acknowledged that it was easy for him to slip into denial. Despite knowing for a long time that it would be unlikely for him to receive an assignment, he described the news conveyed several weeks ago as a huge shock. In this context, he described his struggles with abandonment. He described this experience in terms of deaths and departures in his life. He also described how in recent weeks he has felt abandoned by the Archdiocese. He described his struggles in this area as centering around his abhorrence of feeling alone, unconnected, and left out. He also described how easy it was for him to fantasize about a wide variety of things, indicating that he does not spend so much time fantasizing about sexual issues as he does about future job prospects. He noted how these fantasies were at times not grounded in concrete action. He also indicated that it was easier for him at present to communicate his needs and feelings to other people.

Mike acknowledged that he had attained a significant period of sobriety for the first time in his adult life. He indicated that he felt at home at Twelve Step meetings, especially SCA meetings. He also identified the important elements of his participation in SCA as sponsorship, telephone contact, and socializing with other individuals in the program. Mike indicated that he is in


possession of a written sexual recovery plan which he is following diligently. He acknowledged that he was at the beginning of serious Twelve Step work but had turned a corner. He described a decision taken on his own initiative to begin the problematic sexual behavior group that met weekly. He indicated that he found these external controls helpful.

Spiritually, Mike indicated that he felt closer to God. He described how he had never been able to ask God for help for himself, indicating that at present he was able to do that. He described the importance of silent meditation in his life at present, indicating that he feels <u>unconnected</u> if he does not have occasion to engage in it. He indicated that he prays the Office and attends Mass daily, indicating that the ritualistic and community prayer aspects of these activities are helpful to him.

Mike went on to describe his own assessment of his strengths and weaknesses. He discovered that he was a kind, generous, and caring man who was willing to do things for other people. He also described the shadow side of these strengths as being approval seeking and a tendency to buy friendship. He described himself as possessed of a sense of humor and playfulness, indicating that this at times led him to fail to take himself and his own needs seriously. He also acknowledged that in the past he has used humor to manipulate other people. Mike described his difficulties with anger, which he continues to find very troubling. He admitted that he still feels it is morally wrong to get angry but was struggling to face such feelings. He also described his difficulties in making a decision, indicating that he preferred to keep all of his options open and that he postponed responsibility for decision making. Finally, Mike described goals for himself. Despite his abhorrence of dealing with his emotional life, he underlined his goal of learning to live more successfully with his feelings. He also indicated that he wanted to be more self-disclosing and understand himself as a sexual being who happens to be homosexual. / Sexual sobriety/is a critical goal for him, as is the development of adult relationships with other people. He also expressed a desire to deepen his relationship with God. Finally, Mike indicated that he wanted to stay on in the program for a few more weeks to process his discharge and the transition. He also expressed a desire to continue therapeutic momentum in less intensive therapeutic modalities.


Dr. then shared her perceptions of Mike's progress from the perspective of individual psychotherapy. Dr. indicated that Mike had given a thorough and accurate description.

dealt with his sexual orientation and spiritual direction and that he had learned to ask for help in appropriate ways. She described Mike early on as being remote emotionally; as he learned to ask other people for help, however, he was also able to bring his whole self to his spiritual life. She described Mike as very much in process, dealing with issues of anger, sex, and hatred. She described him at the outset of treatment as having a dome over himself which closed off his innermost thoughts and feelings from others as well as from his spiritual life. She indicated that at present this dome was beginning to crack.

context of the program. One by one these were confronted. It was noted that because Mike was so successful in sidestepping his own level of pain and anxiety) it took a considerable force to engage him into the treatment program. Dr. affirmed the presentation Mike had made at the beginning of this conference, indicating that he had specified many of the issues in a realistic and objective manner, neither understating nor overstating his progress. Dr. underscored the continuing need Mike has for support as he pursues his recovery, no matter which direction his vocational life may go. He also affirmed the significant shift Mike had made in how he approaches himself, his spiritual life, and other people.

A general discussion then ensued in which various points of the presentations were discussed and clarified. Mike was able to share some of his emotional reactions to his relationship with the Archdiocese in recent months. Dr. Piasecki affirmed the growth she saw in Mike and indicated that the [question of assignment] was contingent upon final results of treatment efforts. Dr. Piasecki noted that abstinence from all sexual behavior was an absolute requirement of any possible consideration of his returning to ministry.

The clinical team then made the following recommendations for Mike's ongoing care:

- 1. Consistent with Mike's stated intention, it was recommended that he continue in the program for the next few weeks until such time as he can meet with the Bishop to resolve his current status.
- 2. It was recommended that Mike continue in individual psychotherapy to assist him in furthering the gains made in intensive outpatient care.
- 3. It was recommended that Mike make regular contacts with a spiritual director a part of his ongoing devotional practice.
- 4. It was also recommended that Mike continue his level of participation in Twelve Step meetings. At present he attends five or six meetings a week and has a sponsor. This was seen as an acceptable level for the transitional phase out of intensive outpatient care.

- 5. It was also recommended that if Mike stays in St. Louis he continue to participate in the problematic sexual behavior group, which meets once per week.
- 6. It was also recommended that Mike's recovery be monitored over a two-year period. Such monitoring is to be accomplished by his participation in bi-annual Aftercare Workshops to be conducted in St. Louis in January and August of each year. These three-day workshops will allow periodic assessment of his ongoing progress in recovery.

As you know, Mike did not dispute our recommendations and agreed to follow through with them. He expressed a desire to continue on at the Wounded Brothers Project for the near term. The staff supported this decision, as it would allow Mike to consolidate his gains in a less intensive therapeutic environment.

I am writing to provide you with an interim report regarding the participation of Rev. Michael Krejci in the Intensive Outpatient Program of the St. Louis Consultation Center. Information contained in this correspondence is being released in accordance with statutory requirements regarding confidentiality and may not be re-released without the express consent of Fr. Krejci. We recommend that these materials be destroyed after use; they will be kept on file at the Consultation Center for a period of five years.

As you know, Michael was referred for intermediate level treatment following upon an initial evaluation and primary care at River Oaks Hospital in New Orleans, LA. Results of the initial assessment and documentation relating to the course of primary care have been detailed in previous correspondence from the hospital. Since his admission to this program, Michael has been seen by Ph.D., in individual psychotherapy; by Sr. SSND, in spiritual direction; and by myself and Ms.

Overall, Michael's level of attendance at program activities has been good. He has attended all program activities and has shared information about himself and his history. At the same time, Michael's ability to engage the program on a meaningful psychotherapeutic level has been circumscribed. While the factors which have impeded Michael's growth relate to longstanding personality patterns, his involvement has been complicated by the persistence of his sexual acting out. Following your visit to St. Louis last week, Michael disclosed to the clinical team that he had acted out on a number of occasions since moving to St. Louis. The clinical team's response to this disclosure was to place Michael on probation in terms of his involvement in this program;

his continued participation here is contingent upon his absolute abstinence from engaging in sexual behaviors with other people. Prior to these disclosures, we stipulated that Michael transfer from DeMattias Hall to the Wounded Brothers Facility in Robertsville, MO, where, it was felt, he would be under stricter supervision. Michael agreed to move and he is currently living at Wounded Brothers. In addition, we have shared with Michael our reservations about his ability at present to engage celibate ministry in a safe way which does not allow the possibility of scandal. Michael understands this situation intellectually.

In this context, the focal points of treatment to date have been as follows:

- 1. Clearly the area of sexual compulsivity and inappropriate sexual behavior has been a main focus of treatment. Because of the duplicity manifested by Michael, he has not shared his sexual conflicts in an open or specific way. Even though he acquired specific skills to deal with sexual impulse control at River Oaks and even though he has attended twelve-step meetings around sexuality, he has not taken the necessary steps to inhibit what is a longstanding pattern of sexual acting out on his part. He has been confronted about this in both and group contexts; the net effect of these confrontations to date has been his ability to disclose more fully at the present time.
- 2. Accompanying the vicissitudes of Michael's acting out is his fluctuating mood. In large part, Michael's variable mood reflects serious impairment in his ability to recognize and use his feelings appropriately. Normal inhibiting mechanisims, such as guilt or remorse, do not appear to impede Michael's problematic sexual behavior. He tends to experience global and inchoate feelings of toxic shame. When these diminish as the trigger passes, however, he returns to a detached non-emotional stance. Assisting him in recognizing his mood states, dealing with his emotions, and learning to implement them in healthier, more adaptive ways is a focal point of treatment which is very much in process at this time.
- 3. Many of the issues with which Michael's struggles have their roots in his family of origin. While Michael has visited critical aspects of his development, he finds this work particularly

arduous. At the same time, because of his dishonesty in the program, dynamic work has been of limited value to him. In the longer term, such work will be important if Michael is to establish a healthy relationship with himself and with significant others in his life.


- 4. The personality features seen in Michael are clearly a principal area of focus. His capacity to relate honestly to others; his emotional insularity; and his ubiquitous tendency to deceive himself and other people continue to be confronted on a routine basis. It is admittedly painful work for Michael, as he has built a life around deception and misleading. At the same time, his success in sobriety is directly related to his ability to work more directly with these longstanding patterns of personality.
- 5. In a spiritual context, it must be said that Michael is also struggling. He is exploring alternative ways of engaging in spiritual practices and is attempting to formulate a more viable spirituality, one which is less intellectualized and more open to realistic considerations. As he has deceived his spiritual director as well as others with whom he works, this work is very much at a beginning point. Again, however, the fact that he has owned up to his duplicity holds some promise for him at this point.

As can be seen, Michael is having a difficult time in this program. While the intensity of his treatment has steadily escalated over the past two months, the results of these efforts have been a rudimentary level of disclosure. Decisive change in Michael's attitude, willingness, and capacities for self-control is indicated if he is to utilize the remaining time in the program in a helpful manner.

In keeping with our policy regarding information, Michael will have seen a copy of this report prior to its being sent. As treatment nears its end I shall be in contact with you to arrange a discharge conference.



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
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


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I am one of the six priests in active ministry whose case the Special Commission to Study Allegations of Sexual Abuse has been examining. Almost 25 years ago I engaged in inappropriate touching of a minor on two different occasions. I was wrong to have touched these two individuals as I did, but there was no further contact. Because I realized the wrongfulness of these acts I arranged to meet with the parents of these minors, explained what I had done and apologized to them and their teenagers. Neither family sought to bring charges or to file a civil suit. I took full responsibility for what I did then as I do today.

I met with the archdiocesan Vicar for Clergy and explained what I had done.

In 1991 I sought therapeutic help on my own for personal problems. I met regularly with a therapist for about three months.

In 1994, I again sought help, this time through the Archdiocese. I was referred to a psychiatrist at the Milwaukee County Mental Health Complex. I underwent psychological testing and met with him on a regular basis for five months.

In November of 1994, I went out of state for extensive inpatient and outpatient therapy. I was an inpatient on a mental health unit for four weeks. I continued in residential treatment for three months and then a group home for nine months. I completed an additional six months of outpatient treatment while working in part-time church ministry and at another job as well. I returned to Church ministry in the Archdiocese in July of 1996.

I want you to know that your children have always been safe here at St. Theresa, and they will continue to be so. The Archdiocese has asked me to work within the following guidelines and I have:

- 1) I continue to see a counselor on a regular basis.
- 2) I meet regularly with a monitor from the Archdiocese who submits a written report to the Vicar for Clergy.
- 3) I do not live alone. I live with another priest who knows about my past.
- 4) Since I have come to St. Theresa's there have been people here who are aware of my past history.
- 5) I do not do anything alone with minors. There are always other adults around.
- 6) I avoid places and persons who may be sources or occasions of serious temptations to violate sexual morality.

In addition, I use other tools to maintain a healthy balance in my life along with sexual sobriety:

- 1) I meet with two different 12-step groups that have a specific focus on sexual issues.
- 2) I meet monthly with a spiritual director.
- 3) I am a member of a priest support group that also meets monthly for a review of life.

I do not know what will happen over the next few months. In 1994 and more recently allegations were made against me which are not true. The earlier one was investigated and dismissed. The more recent one, from the same time period as the other incidents, is being assessed. What I have told you is the truth; about 25 years ago, I did act wrongly by touching two individuals. Touching them is all that occurred. I am very sorry for what I did. I'm also sorry that my actions now also affect you.

The Special Commission will be making its final recommendations in the Fall. I want to continue to serve in the ministry, and I would really like to stay here at St. Theresa. However, I also realize that this may not be possible.

Even if the parishioners are willing to have me remain at St. Theresa, there are other groups that will make a decision about my future here. Next week the Bishops of the United States will meet in Dallas to determine a national policy. What happens at that meeting will significantly influence any decision made by Archdiocesan personnel as they review my case. If the parish is willing to have me stay, the final decision will rest with the Archdiocesan officials and those with whom they consult.

I recognize that what I have said is difficult for everyone to hear. I ask for your understanding as I have asked for forgiveness from those I have harmed.

I also ask for your prayers. I will answer any questions you may have as best as I am able to.

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MEETING WITH PASTOR CONSULTORS

On Friday, March 7, 2003, I met with two of the pastor consultors, Father Gerry Britain and Father George Rebatski, to discuss issues affecting the continuation in the office of pastor of Father Michael Krejci. I informed them that I had extended the deadline by which Father Krejci was to present his rebuttal. We agreed that I would consult with them again on March 12, 2003. Due to a schedule conflict that consultation was moved to March 19, 2003. An additional consultation by telephone was conducted on March 25, 2003 to clarify a matter for the minutes.

The rebuttal that was presented by Father Krejci was reviewed with the pastor consultors. They noted that the arguments presented, mainly that the appointment to office had been made with knowledge of these previous admitted incidents, did not address the change in the current situation in the Church. Furthermore, they noted that the strongest arguments were more directly associated with continued active ministry of some type rather than removal from the current office.

Having considered the matter seriously, the pastor consultors advised that I proceed with the next step in the process and issue the decree of removal on the basis that his ministry has become ineffective (c. 1740).

Dear Archbishop Dolan,

Thank you for the extension to your initial deadline for me to prepare my response. I have now had the opportunity to review the file of documents provided to me by Barbara Anne Cusack, the chancellor. After doing so, I now understand how you are proceeding, however, I must respectfully disagree with the process.

I would note that Bishop Sklba and at least some others at the Archdiocese were aware of my situation since April, 1986, when I explained clearly to him what had occurred at Our Lady of Good Hope in the summer of 1979 and how I had dealt with things. There were no limitations placed on me at that time. Indeed, I became the administrator of St. Gall Parish a few months later. I subsequently also was made administrator of St. Boniface as well. When St. Gall and St. Boniface parishes were closed I did leave for psychological treatment as your preliminary findings indicate. With the Archbishop knowing my past, I was judged suitable to hold the office of pastor, and was assigned as such to St. Theresa Parish, Eagle, in June of 1999.

The past was dealt with in a just manner. I did not attempt to hide anything and I made a clear personal apology to all involved. It is unclear to me why justice now seems to demand more, including the loss of my office and even the seeking of my loss of the clerical state on the part of Archdiocesan officials. Since there have not been further instances of misconduct on my part, I fail to see why the penalty you desire to impose is the most severe.

I have served the people of St. Theresa Parish well. In the file presented to me, I note that there are two letters asking that I be removed, one from a married couple who are parishioners, and another from the mother of the wife of this same couple. While I know the mother from a previous assignment, she is not a parishioner of St. Theresa, and has been there only on Christmas Eve. The file also contains several letters of support. I know that both Bishop Sklba and Fr. Joseph Hornacek, the Vicar for Clergy, also received letters of support on my behalf since copies of at least some of these were sent to me while other people indicated to me that they had written. As you may know from Barbara Anne, Deacon David Zimprich, and Fr. William Kohler, at the sessions that were held at St. Theresa Parish, there was a great deal of support for me, and many people were desirous that I remain in pastoral ministry at the parish. There were other individuals who felt that I should leave, resign, or no longer be a priest. However, as the Parish Council President at the time said, "We can work this out." Even knowing what I had done, many parishioners were willing to have me care for them.

It was at the insistence of the Archbishop that I made public my past. It was indicated to me that if I did not publicly disclose what had happened twenty-three years ago, the Archdiocese would do so. When I asked Fr. Hornacek at that time about the possibility of some other kind of ministry in the Archdiocese I was told that I must make the disclosure at St. Theresa. He told me if I were not able to work there, I would not be able to work anywhere.

I have served the Archdiocese well in my almost twenty-five years of priesthood. Besides parish work I have always been available to offer my services for archdiocesan work, whether that has been writing, planning, mentoring, or working on committees or commissions. Even in these months of enforced limitations I have tried to be helpful by discreetly working through the written word to be of service to the Church. I have no desire to give up my office in the Church nor to leave the priesthood, as seems to be the desire of some officials.

I continue to hope that the Church will be willing to use the gifts that the Lord has given me. I trust that I will be able to exercise some ministry in service to the people of God, whether that may be in this country or in some other place in the world.

I understand that you are acting under the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People and its accompanying Norms. Still, I cannot resign my office since the consequences of my actions were dealt with justly in the past and I was judged suitable to become a pastor.

I thank you for your pastoral concern for myself and for the people of St. Theresa. I am comforted by the fact the new administrator, Rev. Mark Payne, will provide excellent care for the parishioners while we continue toward a resolution. I must respectfully decline your invitation that I submit my resignation despite the reasons that you present. Please be assured of my prayers as we seek God's guidance together.

REASONS FOR SEEKING THE REMOVAL FROM THE OFFICE OF PASTOR OF REVEREND MICHAEL KREJCI

1) Father Krejci was involved in sexual abuse of minors.

2) Father Krejci admitted to the facts in this matter while denying the number of individuals involved.

- 3) The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People and the accompanying Norms, provide that even one act of sexual abuse of a minor will result in the loss of the exercise of ministry. The exercise of ministry is essential to the office of pastor and parishioners have a right to stability in this ministry. Any continuation in ministry as a pastor under the circumstances would be ineffective.
- 4) Father Krejci's years of good pastoral ministry and service to the Church are not being discounted but there is no discretionary authority permitted the diocesan bishop that would allow Father to remain in ministry.

5) Under the provisions of canon 1740, removal from the office of pastor can be effected when a pastor's ministry becomes "ineffective for any reason." The specific provisions of canon 1741 exist by way of illustration.

6) The removal from the office of pastor will allow the parish community to receive a new pastor and move toward the healing they need.

Whereas the proposal to remove Reverend Michael Krejci from his office as pastor of St. Theresa Parish was made by letter on January 16, 2003 and repeated on February 6, 2003:

Whereas the principles and norms of canon law have been diligently observed in discerning and communicating this proposal, namely:

a) A canonical reason for removal has been determined, that is, his ministry has become ineffective (c. 1740) due to substantiated claims of sexual abuse of individuals while they were minors. Evidence of this reason has been gathered and placed on file at the Chancery, a summary of which follows:

Father Krejci admits to genital fondling of two adolescent boys (7th or 8th grade) while camping. An additional person has come forward to say that he, too, was molested. Father denies that report. The matter was sent to the DA and found to be beyond the statute of limitations. However, they did a summary investigation including contacting another individual who was allegedly molested. This individual states that on a camping trip with Father Krejci he awoke to find Father had taken this person's hand and placed on Father's genitals. Both were clothed. The individual said "no" and the incident ended. The individual reported that Father Derfus knew of the incidents and talked to the boys separately. He could not recall if there had been parental involvement.

At some point in this process, there was indication that this was a case of "self-reporting" in 1994, but the review of the file does not support this interpretation. Father Krejci has not withdrawn his admission.

- b) The required consultations with two pastors, Reverend Gerald Brittain and Reverend George Rebatzki were held on December 27, 2003 and March 19 and 25, 2003.
- c) Reverend Michael Krejci has had opportunity to inspect the acts and has done so.

d) A rebuttal has been offered in opposition to the removal, summarized as follows:

Because these past incidents were known to archdiocesan officials at the time that Father Krejci was appointed to the office of pastor, it is unjust that the situation now be brought up again and action taken. Father makes additional statements that are more relevant to his continuation in active ministry than the removal of pastor process.

e) This rebuttal, considered by the Archbishop and his two pastor consultors, has been found insufficient to dissuade the proposal for the following reasons:

There is no substantive argument germane to the matter at hand, namely the removal from the office of pastor. The issue addressed is more relevant to a continuation in active ministry which is a separate and yet-to-be-addressed matter.

Therefore, I, the undersigned Archbishop of Milwaukee, in virtue of my pastoral office and in conformity with the Code of Canon Law, hereby decree the removal of the Reverend Michael Krejci as pastor of St. Theresa Parish, effective immediately upon communication of this decree by the Very Reverend Joseph Hornacek, Vicar for Clergy, at which time his former office will be declared vacant.

Moreover, Reverend Michael Krejci is advised that if he has just cause to lodge recourse against this action, it may be proposed to me or to the Holy See within fifteen available days.

Your Excellency Montalvo,

We belong to St. Theresa's Parish. It is a small parish in eagle, Wisconsin.

The Milwaukee Archdiocese made Fr. Michael Krejci tell the parish of his past. He has admitted to inappropriately touching two teenagers in 1978 when he was associate pastor of Our Lady of Good Hope Parish. This is the parish where my husband and I grew up and were married. Fr. Michael Krejci has also been diagnosed as a sex addict. He has a set of guidelines the Milwaukee Archdiocese has asked him to follow to keep our children safe.

The guidelines include an on site monitor. The on site monitor was our lay parish director who retired 3 years ago and is no longer on site to monitor Fr. Michael Krejci.

Fr. Michael Krejci is to live with another priest; he is not to live alone. During the school year Fr. Michael Krejci spends two nights a week sleeping at the parish rectory with no supervision.

He is to do nothing alone with minors. There is to be another adult present. There has not always been another adult present when Fr. Michael Krejei has interacted with some children of our parish.

His insistence on staying on at the parish after he told us about his past has divided the parish. Our parish had a feeling of oneness. We will need much time to heal. We cannot heal as a parish if Fr. Michael Krejci stays on as our spiritual leader. Fr. Michael Krejci's actions are what have divided the parish.

Touching minor children in an inappropriate manner is sexual abuse. It is wrong weather it is today or over 20 years ago.


We are concerned that our Auxiliary Bishop Richard J. Skilba will allow Fr. Michael Krejei to stay in the parish even though the bishops have decided that any priest with any offense should be removed.

We teach our children to respect their bodies and the bodies of others. How can we have a spiritual leader who has not done this teach our children and teens? How can we tell our children that an adult touching them is wrong when our bishop's lack of action sends a different message? What message is being sent to us?

Our 11-year-old daughter says that she now has problems respecting Fr. Michael Krejci as a spiritual leader. She has made the statement that he says one thing but does

another. The best way to teach our children is by example. What kind of example is this for our young believers?

Please remove Fr. Michael Krejci from St. Theresa's Parish so we can begin to heal. We want to feel like we are one with our parish brothers and sisters. It feels like a war with people being forced to take sides on this important issue. Fr. Michael Krejci refuses to step down and let the healing process begin. Please help our parish.

Your Excellency,

Rev. Michael G. KREJCI, a priest of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, accused of sexual abuse of a minor, has presented a recourse to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith against the administrative measures taken by Your Excellency in his regard, which he claims are contrary to the dispositions of Canon Law.

So as to examine the present recourse, I ask Your Excellency kindly to forward the complete acts of the case which should include the following data:

- 1) a copy of Your Excellency's decree;
- 2) indications as regards the notification of the same decree to the priest in question;
- 3) a copy of the priest's request for revocation of your decree together with a copy of your reply to the same;
- 4) the essential details of the case: exact kind of delict/s alleged; date (at least approximate) of the same; the victim's age and sex; whether the offense is a one-time action or has it been repeated; whether the accused priest constitutes at present a risk for minors in his ministry; whether there is a risk of recurrence; whether there are symptoms of psychological problems; whether he has undergone evaluation in a specialized institution; his precise ministerial situation (with special reference to his sustenance).

Any further comments Your Excellency may have concerning the case would be greatly appreciated.

It has come to my attention that we need to be clearer regarding the purpose of your time in St. Louis and your ministry status. In pondering how best to proceed with interim decisions regarding your care and ministry, I must bear in mind both my responsibility toward the good of the whole community and respect for your individual rights. Given the reasons you have been asked to participate in the program with St. Louis Consultation Center and to reside at the Wounded Brothers Center, there is no authorization for you to pursue any ministry while you are there.

At this point I have determined that some necessary and prudent precautions must be taken regarding your current exercise of ministry. This action is not to be understood as a final conclusion or decision. Rather, it is intended for the good of the community and to safeguard your reputation from any allegations of misconduct while your treatment is underway.

In response to the pastoral needs of the Christian community as well as my fraternal care for you, and in virtue of my authority as diocesan bishop, I formally place upon you the following obligations:

- 1) To refrain from all unsupervised contact with minors;
- 2) To cease use of alcohol with or in the presence of anyone under the age of 21;
- 3) To avoid all persons, places and situations that, from past experience, have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 4) To refrain from exercise of any and all public ministry including the celebration of Eucharist in other than a private setting with only another priest or priests in attendance; the celebration of any other sacraments will require my explicit permission in each case; until further notice the faculty to hear confession is revoked.

These obligations will remain in place for the duration of your stay in St. Louis and until formal notice of their withdrawal.

I expect that you will continue to cooperate with the process that is underway. My prayers are with you and all concerned.

After meeting with Tom Kerstein on Tuesday, July 8, I thought that I would write you asking for some clarification regarding my status in the Archdiocese. In talking with Tom, I was given to understand that a full-time assignment is not available to me at the present time. As I understand it I am still on a kind of rehabilitative status in the eyes of the Archdiocese.

When Carrol Straub visited me in St. Louis in January, 1996, one of his intentions was to see whether I was ready to return to full-time ministry with an eye toward serving full-time at St. Theresa Parish in April, 1996. At the time, in consultation with my psychologist, I said to Carrol that I did not feel ready for a full-time assignment in April, but that I would be ready to return to the Archdiocese in July, 1996, to accept a full-time or part-time assignment. I accepted the assignment of assisting priest at St. Theresa and part-time associate at St. Anthony.

During the past year I have worked hard on my own healing and reintegration into the Archdiocese. I meet weekly with Dr. monthly with Deacon Tom McGuine, and monthly with my spiritual director, Sr. SSND. I am working both at St. Theresa and at St. Anthony. It is a gratifying experience working at these two places. After a year, as I have begun to accept more responsibilities, it does begin to feel like a full-time assignment. However, my salary is part of account 46 with a large deduction for room and board.

I would like some clarification as to the length of time that I will be in this special status. Is my return to regular status in ministry based on a review of some kind, or on the passage time, or on my willingness to accept a full-time position somewhere? If it is based on a review of some kind, what information do you require and from whom to assist you in reviewing my situation at some future date? If it is based on the passage of time, what is the length of time that you envisage?

Thanks again for all you've done. I felt settled after talking to Carrol in March, but in the past few weeks things seem a bit mixed up for me and so I thought that I would check it out with you. I would like a sense of where things are headed. I'm free to stop in to see you or Tom Kerstein after July 20, or you can drop me a note, whatever is convenient for you.

Dear Mike,

I know this is a very difficult time for you, as it is for so many of us, but please be assured that you are in my prayers. As the Archbishop of Milwaukee, I must address the spiritual wellbeing of all my people, yourself included. So, I thought it might be good for me to let you know my thoughts and reflections at this time as we attempt to bring some clarity and resolution to a very painful situation.

To begin, I want you to know that I believe that the <u>Charter</u> and <u>Norms</u> developed by the U.S. Catholic bishops provide needed structure and direction to this very difficult problem in the Church today. However, until the Holy See responds to the <u>Charter</u>, we all find ourselves in a state of limbo. Still, some clarification in your situation can be offered. I appreciate your willingness to step aside from your responsibilities at St. Theresa Parish in response to the request from Bishop Sklba to do so. Although it was no doubt very painful for you to do, such a move was truly in the best interest of all the concerned parties. Your cooperation reflected your concern for the people at the parish.

While we all await the Holy See's response to the Norms, I would not want to create any false expectations about future priestly ministry. Without pre-judging any situations, given the substance of the allegations against you, I cannot foresee ever authorizing your return to active ministry, nor would I be able to recommend you to another diocese or religious community. In other words, I consider your situation to be such that I do not see how you could remain in the office of pastor. Therefore, I am asking for your resignation so that you and the parish can move

As you consider this request, I am sure that financial issues come to mind. So, I would ask you to see Father Joe Hornacek for clarification about how we might be able to assist you. You have given valuable years of service to the Church and deserve support. Furthermore, given the realities at hand, you might consider beginning a transition to the lay state, and might even want to request laicization. In this regard, Father Jim Connell in the Chancery Office can answer your questions and help you with the process. In the interim, I need to reiterate the importance of your not exercising any priestly ministry, other than celebrating Mass privately, and not publicly presenting yourself as a priest. I know that you have obtained the services of a canonical advisor. I encourage you to maintain that relationship.

Many of you have written me of your anger, hurt, and confusion over Father Michael Krejci's situation, and I have read your letters with care. I am sorry for all the anxiety and disillusionment that all of this has caused. These are days of great suffering for the whole Church, myself included. As a people of faith and hope, we pray that the Church will be stronger from what we have learned through these difficult times of purification.

Many have questioned why, in obedience to Jesus, we cannot forgive those priests who have abused. I reply: we do. We forgive those priests who have been guilty of this crime and sin, once they admit it — as most do, painfully and admirably — ask for mercy, and repent. We know God forgives them; we must forgive them too; and I hope they can forgive themselves. Forgiveness, however, does not eliminate the need for those accused to take responsibility, to be held accountable for their behavior. In this regard, the words of our Holy Father and the *Charter for the Protection of Children* from our American bishops are clear. We do forgive Father Krejci. We acknowledge that he served your parish to the best of his ability. We want to stay close to him and offer him support. But, we must take very seriously the duty of assessing fitness for any future assignment in pastoral ministry. All professionals — teachers, physicians, nurses, counselors, for example — are held to such high standards. Priests can be no different. The offenses were serious and substantiated. If we are firm in our resolve to protect children and restore trust, we must be able to assure our people that no priest who has ever abused a minor is now assigned.

I realize this time of transition may be unsettling. You may be wondering what the future holds. Just as the Archdiocese continues to care for Father's material needs, so we are making every effort to provide for your pastoral needs as well. It may be several months before we can resolve all of these matters. The reason why we have for the time being only provided a temporary administrator is that we need to be sure that the canonical rights of all involved are being respected. I have great pastoral concern for our priests and want them to receive all their rights within canon law. Once these issues are resolved, we will be in a better position to answer some of your questions about how the parish will be served in the future.

I pray every day for Father Krejci, for those who may have suffered because of his behavior, for you, and for Father Roy Mateljan, who has so generously offered to be of service during this time of transition. I ask for your patience, understanding, and prayers during these difficult times. I am confident that the Church is being made stronger as we suffer through this turmoil.

Thank you for your December 16th letter. I will do my best to reply.

The list on the Archdiocese of Milwaukee web site is a list of the names of diocesan priests of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee who have been (or would be if they were still alive) restricted from all priestly ministries, may not celebrate the sacraments publicly, or present themselves as priests in any way, in line with the assurances given in the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People.

I agreed to the listing the names of priests, after extensive consultation, for four major reasons.

- 1. Protecting children is our primary concern and obligation.
- 2. By releasing this information, the Church of southeastern Wisconsin reaffirms its commitment to seeking, reaching out to, and encouraging any victims/survivors of clergy sexual abuse of minors who have yet to come forward to do so, knowing that they will be believed.
- 3. We want to reassure our people that any priest in service to them is without any substantiated allegation, and to stop rumors and conjecture.
- 4. We again demonstrate the promise of the Church in southeastern Wisconsin to be open and candid. To obtain forgiveness and rebuild trust, our commitment is to remain open, accountable, and vigilant.

The names are not prominently displayed on the web site and a visitor to the site needs to do some searching to locate the information. I have checked with our webmaster who tells me that after the initial publicity about the posting of the names, there has been very few "visitors" to that particular web site page. At this point, I do not envision a time when these names will be removed from the archdiocesan web site.

Following the recommendation of the Priests' Personnel Board and in accord with Canons 539-540 of the 1983 Code, you are hereby appointed temporary administrator of St. Gall Parish, Milwaukee, until a new administrator is appointed. This appointment is effective July 1, 1986.

As temporary administrator you come under the provisions of Canon 540 which is quoted here in full:

- \$1 The parochial administrator is bound by the same obligations and has the same rights of the pastor, unless the diocesan Bishop prescribes otherwise.
- §2 The parochial administrator may not do anything which could prejudice the rights of the pastor or could do harm to parochial property.
- §3 When he has discharged his office, the parochial administrator is to give an account to the pastor.

Note that you have the responsibility for the Pro Populo Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation; you are authorized to sign checks on all parish accounts to cover ordinary expenditures and to meet payroll obligations. Please note that in keeping with Canon 540, §2, no extraordinary changes are to be made. Urgent matters should be referred to the Archbishop.

Thanks, Mike, for taking on this additional task for the good of the Church. Your willingness to do this is greatly appreciated. Hope you are having a good summer.

- Has Father updated himself theologically in the last few years?

- Is there any evidence that Father is alive and growing in other areas besides theologically?

- What does Father do for intellectual nutrition?

- Has Father acquired any hobbies in the last few years?

Michael attends a two week session at Notre Dame each summer. He has also taken part in a week-long workshop on pastoring in black Catholic parishes. At Notre Dame he takes graduate courses for credit so that he will be challenged to clarify his thoughts as he works on a paper. He feels that he has not done as much reading in theology these last years, and especially in liturgy. This might also have to do with the fact that he is not as closely involved with the liturgy committee as he had been in the past.

He continues to subscribe to several literary magazines, reads several novels a year and also attends the Milwaukee Repertory Theater.

SECTION II: FAMILY

- Have there been any significant family changes since Father's last review?

- If his parents are still living, is there any large concern about their health or future plans?

Have any brothers or sisters made any significant life changes?
Does Father spend too much or too little time with family members?

His father has now retired, but his mother is still working. He gets to see them on Sundays when everyone is at home. There is nothing significant in this area.

His brother has divorced and now remarried outside the church. This has been a bit of a concern. He feels he could easily obtain an annulment but has not done so as yet. His brother and wife worship regularly. Michael occasionally urges him to pursue the annulment. Their relationship is still good.

SECTION III: HEALTH

- Have there been any positive or negative changes in Father's health in the last few years?
- Has Pather had a check-up?
- Does Father require medication?
 How about a dental check-up?
 Weight gain or loss?

- What about alcohol or substance abuse?

Michael's health remains pretty good. He has no serious problems. He has gained some weight in the last few years and is making an effort to control it. He takes no medication, except for his allergies when the season calls for it.

SECTION 1V - VII: ASSIGNMENTS IN MINISTRY

- If Father has been transferred, does he wish he hadn't?

- If Father hasn't been transferred, does he wish he would be?

- Has Father been passed over for assignments that were open listed?

- What is Father's main satisfaction where he is?

- What is Father's main complaint?

- If there is a school, what does he think and feel about it?

- How is life at home (in the rectory or wherever he lives)?

Currently he is "temporary" administrator. We talked about this and he wonders why this has remained such. He was made administrator when John Schreiter left with the hope that someone else would come to St. Gall's. This has not occurred and he realizes it is unlikely to take place. He does wonder whether there was sufficient effort to find someone for St. Gall's. It appears it might have been the intent to let it ride. He has come to accept this.

He finds two great sources of satisfaction at St. Gall's. The first is the good spirit among the people. In a small congregation it is possible to develop this and he especially senses the concern people have for each other.

His second source of satsifaction is the team. He finds a great source of support from the people at St. Elizabeth parish. They work together as a team and it is a great experience.

His main source of disatisfaction is the adminsitrative part of the job. He had an especially rough two weeks previous to our meeting. The administrator of the learning center resigned. There had been tensions between this person and the team member who was her liason to the rest of the team. He and Mel (from St. Elizabeth's) had to ask the team member to give up this area of responsibility. He is also aware that the administrator lacks some of the necessary qualities to be able to run the program adequately.

One area that has improved greatly since he wrote his biographical update is his living situation. Currently the youth minister and two other young men are living in the rectory with him. This has been a great opportunity for fellowship and has answered his need for a better living situation. The youth minister is a blind man and this has also caused Michael to deal with some feelings or biases. He is very happy to have these people with him.

SECTION VIII: OTHER MINISTRY

- Has there been any increase or decrease in Father's extra-parochial ministry?

- If so, do you see these as reflecting changes in his life?

- Are these changes essentially healthy?

Currently Michael assists the Office of Youth Ministry with their summer week-long Christian Leadership Training Institute. He finds this exciting and is now sharing his role as spiritual director with a member of his team. This appears to be good for him and is currently his only extra-parochial involvement. There are, however, plenty of opportunities that are part of ministry at St. Gall's—the district meetings which are quite frequent in the inner city; the Board for the Central City Schools.

I certainly see a balance in Michael's life here.

SECTION 1X: SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP

- Can you detect any shift in the direction of Father's spiritual leadership?

Do you see the change (or lack of it) as healthy for him and his parishioners/colleagues?
 If there has been a change, do you see it as due to age, wisdom, some conversion experience, etc?

In the adjectives Michael used to describe himself, intellectual became prayerful. I see this as a sign of growth and maturity. He also is much more comfortable asking people about their prayer life. Michael was described by those who responded to the questionaire as dedicated, generous, relating well to people— a person with unlimited energy (with an added caution that he does not burn-out).

One area that Michael is well aware of and something he will always struggle with is the area of administration. He admits he is not a good administrator, but has fallen into this responsibility. He is taking a day long session being offered on pastoral administration, but he readily admists this is not sufficient to make him an administrator. He would prefer not to do this. In this area he needs to learn to share responsibility better and to delegate responsibility. This is a goal of his. One reason he might be a bit wary to delegate is some past experiences in which he delegated, but the person(s) did not really do their jobs and he ended up having to do it anyway. Yet he his willing to keep trying.

He also tends to ignore or run away from a heavy situation. He recognizes this in himself and the fact that he is aware of it should help him grow in this area.

From our conversation, as well as from the responses, it is apparent that Michael is deeply loved and respected, and that he is a truly pastoral person, an asset to the central city as well as the Church of Southeastern Wisconsin.

SECTION X: LIFESTYLE

- If there has been what you perceive as a substantive change in lifestyle, is it predicated on any of the things already discussed, eg. transfer from a suburban to an inner city parish, a change in health status, a conversion experience, etc.?

- Has the ratio of his priest friends to his lay friends changed noticeably?

- Does he seem burnt out or jaded iin his lifestyle?

Michael has never been a 'high living" person. I am sure there have been adjustments to his moving into the inner city. His biggest concern at the time that he wrote his review was the dislike of living alone. This has been remedied in the fact that he has the youth minister and two other men living with him. This helps by bringing in rent and also allows him the companionship he needs. It is apparent this is working well. Working hours of the various people prevents them from being together a great deal, but there is the support of having someone else in the house.

There was some concern about "people living in the house" registered in the comments from parishioners. He indicated that one of the men in the house will need to be encouraged to move on in the next few years to gain his own independence. The primary complaint would have had to do with a 16 year old boy who lived there temporarily. It was an attempt to provide a different environment for him. It was discovered that he was stealing from the house and it seemed others were aware of it before Michael. Also, Michael did not have concrete evidence. Once he was certain, he asked the young man to leave.

In a parish where there are many single-parent, fatehrless families, it seems the strong male role model that the parish priest can offer is significant.

Michael maintains his friendships as he always has. He still gets together with classmates on a regular basis.

SECTION X: LIFESTYLE (cont.) Spiritual Development:

- Do you get the notion that he is actively working on his spiritual life through a director, through prayer, etc.?
- Does he seem completent and in some form of spiritual netherland?
- Doe he seem depressed to you, and is this blunting his spiritual growth?

Michael certainly is a spiritual person. He has continued to be a part of the Jesus Caritas fraternity and uses this as the main part of his spiritual formation.

As I indicated earlier, he is a good prayer leader. One complaint was that he is sometimes late. In terms of meetings this might be his overextension and lack of delegation (which he hopes to work on as one of his goals). He indicated that when it comes to starting mass on time, it is more difficult. People have asked that he begin on time and he has begun doing this. There is, however, a difficulty. Because they have the gathering space at the entrance of the church many come and stand around talking, having a cup of coffee. When he begins on time, many of the people are still in the gathering space. The situation is not a serious one, but to come to some kind of a middle ground in this might be difficult.

All in all, Michael appears very upbeat to me.

SECTION XI: THE OTHER YOU

Check the emotional tone of the old responses to the present ones.

- Which seem more optimistic and growthful?

- Are the five adjectives more positive or less positive?

- Are the goals more or less realistic?

- Are the goals more in the direction of growth or remediation?

I find the adjectives Michael has used very positive and upbeat. His goals are realistic and have some of both qualities—growth oriented and remedial.

He is still working on his previous goal of being overextended. it is still troublesome for him, especially until people begin to see others than the priest having to be at "certain places" or doing "certain things." I think this is a cultural thing we all face.

Two of his new goals—losing weight and getting exercise and calling forth leadership are more remedial than growth oriented. Yet to bring out more leadership would also be a growing in the way Michael functions. The third goal, sabbatical, would be growth oriented.

The three goels to be worked on for the next three to five years are:

Goal 1:

I need to do more regular exercise and lose some weight.

Michael is very serious about this, he admits he has not exercised as much in this weather. The bike trail is close by and in smmer he can bicycle a great deal. He also cited an example about making an agreement with a young man who watches too much TV. He will bike two hours a week and the other person will give up two

hours of TV.

Goal 2:

I would like to get better at including people in activities and calling forth leadership among parishioners rather than doing things myself.

Goal 3:


I want to go on sabbatical. Michael received word that his sabbatical to Taize has been approved for 1991.

Summary:

(Areas not covered earlier in the form; more salient points of the periodic review.)

My interview with Michael was very uplifting. I sense a deep sense of commitment to ministry. As he said, there are sometimes when one wonders what it is all about. Michael sees himself staying at St. Gall's for a few years. He indicated he would like to return there after St. Gall's, maybe for three more years.

When I asked him if there was anything else he would like to speak about or comment upon, it was that he wished the periodic review would happen more frequently. His last one was nine years ago. He feels it should be done more frequently.

As an expression of support for Tom Venne and his ministry, I promised myself that I would revisit some of the periodic review of the past few years. Toward that end I found myself rereading the summary of your conversation with Charlie Wester back in January of 1990.

Obviously, much has changed since that time and the goals which you set for yourself, namely, to obtain more regular exercise and lose some weight, to include people in activities more frequently and call forth more leadership from parishioners, and to go on sabbatical in 1991. They probably have all been achieved. You continue to strike me as a generous, energetic young priest with a great deal of faith and charity. You stand in the midst of a fluid human and social context as a beacon of stability, care and compassion. I suspect that the biggest challenges for you continue to revolve around the way in which you exercise your own unique type of administration; if you can figure out a way to limit your commitments, a better and healthier sense of planning and satisfaction for each activity would be experienced. Another challenge will be the maintaining of a healthy balance between finding your house companions as peers or exercising some quasi-parental relationship to them as younger individuals whom you mentor.

In any case, you have my encouragement and my gratitude for all those things which you do so well at St. Gall's. May the graces of Pentecost sustain you always.

- 1. You will continue in individual and group therapy as directed by the Vicar for Clergy.
- 2. You will have no unsupervised contact with minors in your ministerial assignment or in any other ministerial duties which may be assigned or assumed by you.
- 3. Contact with minors outside of your ministerial assignment is limited to your family members.
- 4. You will have no overnight guests at your place of residence. Exceptions to this rule will be rare and must be cleared in advance with the monitor appointed by the Vicar for Clergy or by the Vicar for Clergy himself.
- 5. You will avoid all places and persons who have been sources or occasions of serious temptations to violate sexual morality.
- 6. You will continue your participation in regular spiritual direction and your Jesu Caritas group.
- 7. You will cooperate with the monitor appointed by the Vicar for Clergy regarding oversight of compliance with these restrictions and conditions for ministry.
- 8. You will be obedient to the directives of the Archbishop regarding any further specifications which he might impose or request concerning your participation in treatment, ministry, and/or your personal life.
- 9. Review of these restrictions and conditions for ministry will occur in June 1997. It is your responsibility to initiate that review with the Vicar for Clergy.

I have read and have been explained the conditions of ministry established by the Vicar for Clergy. (Page One) I have also received a copy. I agree to abide by these instructions. I also have read and received a copy of the Monitoring Program for Priests dated April 1996.

Dear Bishop Sklba:

I received the copy of the letter you sent to Rev. Michael G. Krejci, pastor of Saint Theresa Parish, in Eagle, Wisconsin. Father Krejci had previously contacted me and asked me to act as his advocate, a position which I have accepted. Thank you for furnishing me with a copy of your most recent correspondence.

I have a few concerns, however.

First, I am not clear as to what canonical process is being followed in your actions against Father Krejci. It appears that you are either following a penal process and placing him on leave according to c. 1722; or are seeking to remove him as pastor according to cc. 1740-1747.

If it is the former, I see no indication of a prior investigation having been conducted (c. 1717), a discussion with two or more judges or experts in the law (c. 1718), or decrees concerning a judicial penal process (c. 1721), or removal from ministry (c. 1722). If you have documentation of these things having occurred, I would appreciate having a copy of such material.

If it is the latter, I see no indication that the matter has been discussed with two pastors chosen by the presbyteral council (c. 1742). I presume that in the conversations Father Krejci mentions in his letter to you of June 22, you tried to persuade him to resign the pastorate (c. 1742), which he has asked you to postpone pending his return from vacation. But the prior step seems to be missing.

Second, your appointment of a parochial administrator seems to be rather premature. There is no indication that you have decreed that the prescriptions of c. 539 apply in this case. That is, you have not established that "the pastor is prevented from exercising his pastoral office in the parish due to captivity, exile, banishment, incapacity, ill health, or some other cause." Unless Father Krejci is prevented from exercising his ministry for some reason, you cannot appoint a parochial administrator. If you are claiming that you are invoking c. 1722 and removing him from ministry during the course of a penal process, you must also demonstrate that you have followed cc. 1717-1721.

Third, if you believe you have begun a penal process, your statement that you will continue Father Krejci's salary and benefits "until you are able to find some further source for that basic necessity of life in our world," appears to indicate that you have already judged the case, found Father Krejci's actions gravely imputable to him, and have decreed his dismissal from the clerical state. I do not believe this respects the canonical process as outlined in cc. 1717-1728. Furthermore, dismissal from the clerical state cannot be decreed, according to c. 1342. Therefore, a trial must be held.

Fourth, if the justification for your actions are the Norms proposed by the USCCB in June, I would remind you that application of such norms in your diocese is canonically indefensible. The Conference is not competent to establish such norms without a mandate from the Holy See and without a subsequent *recognitio*. As diocesan administrator, you would not be able to establish these norms as particular law for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, since this would be in violation of c. 428.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, since the case involves sexual misconduct with a minor, it must be referred to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith according to the 2001 Norms issued by that same Congregation (commonly called *Graviora delicta*). The Holy See has reserved this crime to itself, making the diocesan bishop incompetent to handle such matters without a mandate from the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith.

Therefore, in order to prepare an adequate defense of Father Krejci's rights, I need to know the answers to the following questions:

- (1) What canonical process are you following in removing Father Krejci from his ministry as pastor?
- (2) Why has this matter not been referred to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith?

I would appreciate a response as soon as possible so that I can advise Father Krejci of his rights in this matter and suggest the ways in which he might defend his rights.

Dear Father Lagges,

Your letter of concern about the situation of <u>Father Michael Kreje</u> arrived just as I was preparing to leave on an out-of-state trip for two weeks. I wanted to give my response the serious attention required of the situation. Therefore, I delayed my response until my return.

First of all, I want to express my gratitude to you for your willingness to assist Father Krejci in ensuring that his canonical rights are protected and that due process is observed. These are difficult days for all of us. I know that Michael is feeling caught in the maelstrom of current and unrelenting attention to the issue of sexual misconduct. He has conducted himself well throughout this difficult time.

The current situation of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, as a vacant see, further complicates this situation and inhibits us from acting with the dispatch and deliberation all would desire. The formal processes that will need to be undertaken in Michael's case are still pending. I am well aware that the first stage will need to be the application of the removal of pastor process. However, I have been presented with the canonical opinion that, as an administrator and not a diocesan bishop, I am not free to invoke that process. Secondly, Michael has not been placed on formal administrative leave under the provision of c. 1722 nor has any formal penal process been instituted.

Father Krejci remains the pastor of St. Therese Parish. However, it was my best judgement, in consultation with the College of Consultors, that having him remain physically present at the parish during this interim period could serve no good purpose for him or for the community. There was a growing perception that decisions about his continuation in that parochial ministry would be the result of a sort of popular referendum. The "sides" were being drawn and the letter-writing campaign, to us locally and to the Nuncio, had begun. Remaining at the parish under the constant glare of media attention and growing divisions would not have been personally healthy for Michael either. Therefore, I recommended to him that he vacate the parish until we could resolve the situation.

It remains my best judgement, that the provisions for determining that a pastor is prevented from exercising his pastoral function, under the broad category of "some other cause," have been met and that, therefore, a parochial administrator is needed (c. 539). The ongoing disruption of the parish community appears to be sufficient in this case to constitute a "cause." Because Michael had done so much to help build the community of the parish, I could not see that he would want to contribute to its divisions and factions by ongoing physical presence. He had given all indications that this prospect was not what he wanted.

We will continue to maintain Father Krejci's full salary and benefits which are his, by right, as pastor. The fact that the Archdiocese is now providing the funds for this purpose should not be misconstrued as a tacit removal from office. Other pastors under special circumstances are also paid directly by the Archdiocese.

Finally, I have been awaiting counsel from my fellow bishops as to their application of the norms of *Graviora delicta*. Some indications have been given that bishops will turn over to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, all cases of abuse of a minor, regardless of when the alleged offense occurred. Other indications are that the prescribed period of prescription (ten years from the time the minor has completed his eighteenth year of age), as stated in the special norms, is to be observed. We are also awaiting the results of a study of the relationship between these special norms and the indults previously granted to the Conference. When these clarifications have been made, we will proceed accordingly.

I hope this additional information is helpful to you in fulfilling your responsibilities.

Dear Mike,

During the past month I had the opportunity to meet with you and each of my brother priests who stepped aside from active ministry at Bishop Sklba's request in 2002, and who continue to hope and pray for a just resolution to this painful transition period. I promised to remain in communication with you as helpful and necessary.

Archbishop Dolan sent you a letter January 16, 2002, asking you to voluntarily submit your resignation for the pastoral welfare of the parishioners or to respond by February 5, 2002, with reasons for choosing not to do so. I believe a follow-up letter from the Archbishop will be sent to you this week.

A couple different proposals were suggested by way of attempting to resolve the "situation." After careful study of these proposals and computation of their potential cost to the Archdiocese, after further reviewing the history of what was offered in similar cases in the past, what your canonical rights are, and what the archbishop's canonical obligations are, the following plan was approved by Archbishop Dolan:

- 1) If a priest elects voluntary laicization, we would offer what has been our practice, if not policy, for more than a decade, namely \$10,000 when the petition is submitted and \$10,000 when a definitive response is received, regardless of the contents of the response. We would offer, in addition, and new to our practice, minimum support during the time the case is in process. That minimum support would be the monthly amount a pensioned priest receives. During the processing of the case we would also provide some outplacement assistance. This assistance could consist of payment for services from a cateer counseling office, such as the one at Marquette or Stritch. These services provide the individual with information about how to "translate" their skills from one career to another. We could then offer three sessions of outplacement assistance which provides help with resume writing, interviewing skills, etc.
- 2) If the priest does not want to seek voluntary laicization but would rather have the penal process imposed, we would have an obligation of minimal support from the time he loses office until the case is complete. During the time of the trial, which could be up to a year, we would provide a monthly subsidy at the level of a pensioned priest. At the conclusion of the trial, if there is a penalty imposed of dismissal from the clerical state, your canonical obligation of support ceases but some small amount (obviously less than the \$20,000 above) could be given in charity.

3) In all instances we would maintain the priest on our health insurance for one year at our expense. He would then be free to ask for an additional six months of coverage but at his own expense. This coverage would cease as soon as he had employment providing this benefit.

While this plan may not be exactly what you hoped for, it is a genuine effort to respond justly and equitably.

Your Eminence:

In response to the request for data regarding the removal from the office of pastor of Reverend Michael G. Krejci, I am enclosing the *Acta* from that case.

In addition, in accord with the norms of Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela, I am submitting for your consideration the fact that Father Krejci has been accused of multiple acts of sexual abuse of minors. The summary of these allegations is enclosed. Father Krejci has admitted that a number of these acts of sexual assault occurred. He has denied one case. We were in the process of compiling this material for submission to the Congregation when your letter of July 10, 2003 arrived.

Over the years, efforts were made to provide spiritual and psychological interventions that would rehabilitate Father Krejci. With a gradual readmission into ministry and in a monitored setting, it was thought that he could continue in ministry. However, in light of the statement of the Holy Father that there is no place in ministry for a priest who has abused a minor and as a consequence of the USCCB Charter and Norms, it is clear that he will never be able to assume any public ministry.

As we have reviewed the various files, it is clear that when he did engage in sexual abuse, he also abused his office both to gain access to vulnerable boys and to elicit the trust of their parents. Our new found awareness of the severity of damage caused by sexual abuse at the hands of clergy makes it impossible for us to ignore this situation.

Given the nature of the alleged and admitted sexual abuse, along with the serious abuse of office, I have pondered long and hard to arrive at an opinion about the most appropriate action to be taken. In order that justice may be made manifest and healing of the victims and the Church may proceed, I am asking that Your Eminence allow this case to proceed through a canonical penal process and that you advise us if the Congregation will call the case to itself or assign it to our local Tribunal personnel. We stand ready to draw on the services of canonists who have been specially trained for these processes by the most competent Monsignor Charles Scicluna. If such is your disposition, I humbly request a dispensation from prescription as well as a sanation of any procedural errors that may have occurred during the years this case was under investigation. The severity of the offenses is such that it is my opinion that these requests are justified.

I look forward to your further instructions in this matter.

Thank you for accepting some additional cases for review and investigation. In each case, the District Attorney has advised that prosecution is not possible because the statute of limitations has expired.
Enclosed are materials relative to the following cases:
1) Father Michael Krejci – Father previously admitted to inappropriate contact with minor boys. (A copy of a summary on his ministry assignments and this admission is enclosed.) He was sent for inpatient treatment and his counselors advised that there would be no danger to the community if he were assigned to a ministry position. He was gradually reinstated into ministry with restrictions and with monitoring.
The Eisenberg Commission reviewed his files and determined (prior to the Dallas meetings) that it would be possible for him to remain in ministry provided he did a full disclosure to his parish and parishioners did not raise serious objections. A summary of the notes on that process as well as his statement are also enclosed.
An additional alleged victim, came forward and Father has adamantly denied this latter claim. Intake reports and follow-up actions are enclosed as well. Father Krejci has asked for the adjudication process and hong with someone he says can support his allegation, have been informed.

Dear Archbishop Weakland:
My name is a 1 am 36 years old and live in WI with my wife and three children. In 1979 when I was in 7 th grade at Our Lady of Good Hope School on Milwaukee's north side, a priest attempted to molest me during a camping trip. He grabbed me from behind and forced his hands down the front of my pants, I had to physically punch him to get him off of me. This was witnessed by one of my friends as well. A few weeks later the same priest took a group of my friends camping and attempted the same thing on a number of kids. As a result, I believe the pastor of the parish sent the priest to counseling and he later returned to the parish. Eventually he left for a different parish, St. Galls.
The recent publicity of similar incidents has prompted this letter, I fear he will do this again and the victim may not be strong enough to fend him off. The priest's name is Michael Krejci and he works at St. Theresa Parish in Eagle WI. The pastor at that time was Kenneth Derfus and I am sure he can recount the events more accurately than I have described them. I would appreciate any kind of response you can give me regarding this matter. I can be reached a at home or during the day in my office at I appreciate your time and trust in your judgement.

On March 7, 1998, in reviewing notes of conversations throughout the prior week, I noted a phone call from Dr. Liz Piasecki who advocated return to full assignment for Fr. Krejci in view of the nature of his self-incrimination and the extensive therapy received in order to sort out the many issues he raised. She stated that Psychologist supports her opinion completely.

February 24, 1999 Mike was in to report that Mariangela Pledl was retiring as Parish Director of St. Theresa, Eagle, in June, and wondered how that would impact on his role as Assisting Priest there. He wondered what the Archbishop had in mind for St. Theresa and for him, but volunteered that if a priest would be assigned to St. Theresa, he is interested. Vicar states that the Archbishop has agreed to have Mike assigned to St. Theresa provided he continue to be in residence with Tom Venne at St. Anthony, Pewaukee. On March 25, 2002 Fr. Krejci called to report that he had committed himself to a series of 10 articles on "Commuter Spirituality" for InSpirit and I counseled him to back out of the commitment as soon as possible because as he agreed the initial decision was bad judgment, given his responsibilities on the edge of building and all the other circumstances in our society at this point in time.

He asks the Vicar to be present for a special meeting of the full parish council on 5/29 and Vicar agrees to do so.

The Review Board's role is rather clear regarding review of allegations. They make recommendations about fitness for ministry. Therefore, in this case, they would not be involved. I would inform them, out of respect for their position in the diocese, but they would not have to act on it. I can prepare a statement for the Archbishop to place in the file stating that the investigation verifies that there was an attempted but not completed act of abuse (using the language of the report). I agree that this would not be a case to move to mediation. If this were the only case, we could not take any canonical action against the priest (but I would <u>not</u> say that to BAC

I have not had contact with for several months, but presume I will need to let him know the outcome of investigation. At issue here is not whether Krejci will be permanently removed from ministry, as this has already occurred; does the Diocesan Review Board play a role in reviewing an investigator's finding and placing it in a priest's permanent personnel file? I may be OK with describing the event as an attempted advance which was blocked and did not rise to the level of abuse. I don't know if he's looking for compensation; if he inquires I guess I'd reiterate the offer for therapy and deny him access to mediation because although sexual abuse may have been attempted, it did not occur. I'd like to be prepared to answer all of questions about what will happen with this report before I talk

On November 3, 1994 I joined Archbishop Weakland and Dr. in meeting with Mike at the Medical College

Later that same day I joined the Archbishop, Attorney Matt Flynn and Dr. Piasecki in an additional meeting with Mike. The following day I met with Mike in order to clarify several issues, namely that he ask one of the other Team members to take a Sunday Mass at Catholic Parish West as a clear signal he is not part of the new transition team. I authorized his participation in a Funeral for one of the long-standing parish members of St. Gall's Parish on Sunday evening, November 6, 1994 and encouraged him to develop a list of preferred locations for residence upon moving out of St. Gall's Parish with an eye toward living situations which could provide some supervisory structure as well as space for storing his modest possessions while in treatment. Among those under initial consideration were Our Lady of Lourdes Rectory, Meyer Hall or some other rectory resource in the City. I also confirmed that effective November 1, 1994 he would be receiving salary and health benefits through Account #46 as others without assignment.

On April 27, 1995 I received a phone call from Mike's parents, and (members of Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary Parish in Franklin), who expressed great concern over Mike's extended absence and lack of communication with them. I explained the need for some degree of respect for Mike's own sense of confidentiality and placed the matter in the larger context of general mid-life reassessment issues. I suggested that they express their concern clearly without nagging and await the right time for Mike to share some of the questions with which he is currently concerned.

On May 24, 1995 I met with Ken Derfus who reiterated the restrictions which he immediately invoked at Our Lady of Good Hope Parish upon first hearing any hint of allegation, namely the request that apologies be given to the parents of the 7/8th Grade students involved, that all camping trips with children be discontinued and that immediate counseling be obtained. With the supervision which Ken exercised very carefully subsequent to the initial expression of concern, he was confident that due discretion had been in place from the beginning.

On June 9, 1995, I spoke with Liz Piasecki about Mike Krejci. Mike will be released in July from St. Louis. The long-term prospects for Mike not acting out are not good. Consequently it is necessary for us to sit down with Mike personally and reflect on his future. I will ask Archbishop Weakland whether he is so inclined. We need to be in contact with Mike about his future before he is discharged. If we want his resignation from ministry, we could ask him to stay in the Wounded Brother program where they would work with him as far as transition out of ministry is concerned. On July 27, 1995, Mike Krejci contacted me with questions about his salary. I explained that, although he completed Form 1 for the Priests' Compensation Plan requesting Stipend Offset and Professional Expense Reimbursement, he is not entitled to those because of his status as "Not Assigned". He indicated that he has been receiving the Professional Expense Reimbursements and Stipend Offset through the end of June 1995, although his status was changed in November of 1994. He said that when he left the parish for treatment, no one told him that his finances would be altered. He said that he averages 3000 miles a month for group therapy sessions and has reported that monthly through the end of June when he sent the Professional Expense Reports to the Finance Office. He also asked that, if he can't have the Stipend Offset, could he receive Mass stipends and have Mass there. offered 5 times a week there and he can arrange to concelebrate the Mass. I told him that I would discuss all of this with Bishop Sklba and with Wayne Schneider. On 7/28/95, I talked to Wayne Schneider and referred him to the information we sent to the Finance Office 11/1/94 which showed that Acct 46 would only pay salary and insurances as he was "Not Assigned". Wayne will look into the situation of '94-'95 payments.

On 8/2/95 I consulted Bishop Sklba about the professional expenses (mileage) and Mass stipends which Mike was requesting. He said that no money should be collected from Mike because of the Finance Office error of 1994-95 in this case. He approved our reimbursing Mike for his mileage because of the distance to his therapy. Wayne Schneider recommended our charging the mileage to therapy costs rather that professional expenses so the policies are followed. The Mass Stipends could be sent if we were assured that Masses were only in accord with the letter of restriction. On 8/3/95, Mike clarified in a letter and a phone call, that Masses were offered at the Wounded Brothers house at which only the brothers were present; no one else attends. Barbara Anne Cusack will send Mass stipends for a maximum of 6 weeks.

On August 2, 1995 in the absence of Fr. Carrol Straub, I met with Sr. Kathleen to review the financial support being provided to Michael during his time of treatment. In recognizing that he was paid the stipend offset during the first six months of 1995 through office error, I determined that no effort should be made to seek repayment, but rather that extra amount should be considered as part of support for learning new occupational skills, and directed that the stipend offset payment not be continued in this new fiscal year beginning July, 1995. Because of his driving back and forth to therapy I approved a mileage component to his professional expenses and stated that he could receive stipends from the Chancery pending the resolution of his status.

On August 5, 1995 I spoke with Ken Derfus who assured me that he had shared the background of concern regarding Mike Krejci's ministry. This was particularly helpful since the three of them had been working together at Good Hope and Jerry Rinzel personally knew some of the families involved.

On August 7, 1995, in preparation for her visit with Mike Krejci of 8/8/95, Liz Piasecki asked for the total figure to date which we have paid for Mike Krejci's therapy. In discussing this matter with Liz, she indicated that the \$850 per diem arrangement with River Oaks Hospital never changed even after the diagnosis difficulty altered the insurance coverage concerns. The WPS review committee determined, after a review in April at my request, that the charges would be treated only as outpatient charges, not as inpatient, and therefore the maximum they would allow was \$1800. Consequently, since that maximum was spent at River Oaks and since the benefit year is from 10/1/94-9/30/95, WPS will not pay any of the St. Louis Consultation Center outpatient costs. I contacted River Oaks about the refund we have been expecting from them. On 8/10/95, Donna at River Oaks Hospital called and said that they will be sending a reimbursement check to us.





Dear Father, Parish Director,

At the May 22, 2002, meeting of the Priests Council, I, as Vicar for Clergy, promised that hereafter I would send out a summary report of whatever public statement was made the previous day in a given parish concerning our clergy, and their current status because of any allegations or other significant history.

Last evening, at two different parishes, important meetings were held about which you will want to be informed. The first was at St. John the Evangelist in Twin Lakes and the other at St. Theresa in Eagle.

At Twin Lakes a "town hall meeting," which had been announced at the Masses last weekend, was conducted by diocesan staff. The purpose of the meeting was to address allegations of sexual abuse that have been made about Father George Nuedling, now deceased. Toward the end of 1986, there had been one report of sexual abuse of a minor brought to the attention of the Archdiocese by a man who recounted a 30-year old incident in West Allis. The man asked that Father be confronted. Father was confronted and acknowledged that the incident had occurred during the years he had been abusing alcohol. Father was ordered to cease immediately any unsupervised contact with minors and to begin therapy. The man who had asked for the confrontation was informed it had occurred and he did not seek any further action.

In1993, a 43-year-old man who did not want to use his full name made a phone contact with Project Benjamin. He reported having been sexually abused by Father Nuedling in West Allis around 1963 or 1964. He wanted to make the report so that he could be assured that someone knew. Father resigned his pastorate and went into retirement when confronted with this second report. He died in January 1994.

In the last year, two other reports were made about abuse that occurred in West Allis. In the last month we became aware that there could be multiple victims in Twin Lakes during the many years (1968-1993) he was pastor there. We had not previously considered this possibility since the abuse reported from West Allis had been attributed to untreated alcoholism and we had never before had any victims reporting from Twin Lakes. We also received word that Father's gravesite had been vandalized in recent days. With this additional development, it was deemed appropriate to bring these issues into the open and have a meeting to address the concerns of the community.

The purpose of the meeting last night was to provide accurate information and to offer support. Notice was made that we are prepared to have other victims come forward so that we might assess their needs and provide therapeutic assistance if requested.

At St. Theresa Parish in Eagle, Father Mike Krejci held a meeting to which all adult parishioners had been invited. At that meeting, he disclosed that he is one of the six priests in active ministry whose situation is being reviewed by the Special Commission to Study Allegations of Sexual Abuse. He explained that he had engaged in inappropriate touching of two teenagers about 25 years ago. After that occurrence, he had met with the parents and the teenagers involved and apologized. Neither family sought to bring charges,

Father Krejci came forward to the Archdiocese to self-disclose this behavior and to seek help. He received extensive inpatient and outpatient therapy for a year. While in a special, supervised group setting, he continued outpatient treatment while working part-time in secular employment and part-time in ministry. He was gradually permitted

to assume active ministry in the Archdiocese.

In his statement, Father Krejci noted that he continues seeing a counselor, and meets regularly with a monitor from the Archdiocese who submits written reports to the Vicar for Clergy. He stated that he does not live alone, but with another priest who is informed of his situation. From the outset, there have been people at the parish where he has been assigned, since being permitted to resume ministry, who are informed about his history. He has no contact with minors without other adults being present.

Father Krejci acknowledged that he does not know what will happen over the next few months. He stated that he knows that, despite his desire to continue serving at the parish, this option may not be open to him.

Please keep all of these people and situations in your prayers.

- 1. You will continue in individual and group therapy as directed by the Vicar for Clergy.
- 2. You will have no unsupervised contact with minors in your ministerial assignment or in any other ministerial duties which may be assigned or assumed by you.
- 3. Contact with minors outside of your ministerial assignment is limited to your family members.
- 4. You will have no overnight guests at your place of residence. Exceptions to this rule will be rare and must be cleared in advance with the monitor appointed by the Vicar for Clergy or by the Vicar for Clergy himself.

INVESTIGATION PROCESS:

As part of its review of files in past cases of alleged sexual abuse of minors, the records of Father Kreici were reviewed with the following results.

In a Vicar Log entry for April 21, 1986, reference is made to a conversation between Bishop Sklba and Father Krejci in which the Bishop states: "In response to my delicate question regarding the occurrence with younger people at Our Lady of Good Hope Parish, he assured me that there had been no reoccurrence and that the stresses in the ministry at St. Gall's did not seem to cause any problems in that regard." The records do not indicate how the knowledge of an "occurrence" came to the Vicar's office or if, indeed, it refers to the sexual abuse of a minor.

In June 1994, Father Derfus reported in a letter to the Archbishop an incident of sexual abuse of an adolescent by Father Krejci. The incident had occurred in the early 1980's while Father Krejci was assigned at OLGH. Father Derfus said he reported the incident to Bishop Brust at the time, insisted that Father Krejci receive psychological counseling, apologize to the boy and his parents, and take no more camping trips with adolescents.

He reported that the incident was widely known in the parish at the time and he was not sure if any others came forward to the Archdiocese. There is no record in the Vicar files that indicates such reporting and there is no record of Bishop Brust's involvement.

In September 1994, the letter was sent from the Archbishop to the Vicar's Office. Action was taken to confront Father Krejci with this information. Father Krejci confirmed the contents of the letter. He was sent for the first of a series of evaluation and treatment programs.

Father Krejci was sent for inpatient treatment in November 1994. He continued in various treatment programs until June 1996. At that time he was permitted limited, part-time ministry with supervision and monitoring. After several years under this provision for limited ministry, he was assigned pastor to St. Theresa Parish in Eagle, Wisconsin with the same restrictions and monitoring in place.

Father Krejci admits to genital fondling of two adolescent boys (7th or 8th grade) while camping. An additional person came forward in May 2002 to say that he, too, was molested. Father denies that report. The matter was sent to the District Attorney and found to be beyond the statute of limitations. However, they did a summary investigation including contacting another individual who was allegedly molested. This second individual states that on a camping trip with Father Krejci he awoke to find Father had taken the youth's hand and placed on Father's genitals. Both were clothed. The youth said "no" and the incident ended. The youth reported that Father Derfus knew of the incidents and talked to the boys separately. He could not recall if there had been parental involvement.

In the course of the review of Father Krejci's situation, an independent Commission, acting as a review board for diocesan policies and past decisions, studied this case. Father Krejci was informed of this review and signed a release allowing access to his files. The recommendation of the Commission was that Father should either withdraw from his assignment or make a public disclosure to his parish. He chose the latter.

Once the USCCB Charter and Norms were issued, the situation changed and Father was asked to voluntarily step aside from his parish while the Archdiocese studied the application of these norms to his situation. When it became clear that Father would fall under this new policy, it was recognized that the first canonical action needed was to invoke the removal of pastor process. That process was completed and a decree of removal issued. That decree is now the subject of recourse.

CURRENT RISK: It is difficult to assess the current risk. Father Krejci had been placed under agreed upon restrictions prior to the issuance of a formal precept. One provision was that he have no unsupervised contact with minors. There have now been several reports and individuals are willing to testify that this restriction was not observed and he was seen in the company of minors without a supervising adult present.

PSYCHOLOGICAL EVALUATION: Father Krejci underwent several psychological evaluations and treatment programs. He released their findings to his ecclesiastical superiors. The results of these evaluations are as follows:

September 1994 (Milwaukee Mental Health Center): Sexually preoccupied with sexual fantasies fueled by use of sexually explicit material; impulsive, with poorly integrated sexuality; obsessive—compulsive tendencies centering around sexual gratification.

November 1994 (Medical College of Wisconsin): Sexual compulsivity and violation of boundaries; Antisocial Personality Disorder with Narcissistic and Passive Aggressive traits

February 1995 to April 1996 (Recon / St. Louis Consultation Center, Missouri): Individual and group therapy to address above-noted problems.

CIVIL AUTHORITY'S ACTION: The District Attorneys of Milwaukee and Fond du Lac Counties have reviewed the cases and determined that the criminal statute of limitations has expired and they are unable to prosecute.

CURRENT STATUS:

RESIDENCE: Father Krejci has been in residence at the rectory at St. Anthony Parish in Pewaukee. The pastor is fully knowledgeable of the facts in this case. Father Krejci was asked to move from the rectory due to concerns about the proximity of a parish school. He was to be provided room and board at a diocesan facility but he refused to move.

SUSTENANCE: While this matter is the subject of recourse, Father Krejci's support is being provided by the Archdiocese in the same amount he would have received in the office of pastor. He has been maintained on the archdiocesan health, medical and dental insurance as well. Since contributions to the priests' pension fund have continued, he will be eligible for pension funding when he turns 68.

Your Eminence:

On July 30, 2003, a response was sent regarding your inquiry about the above-captioned cases. In both situations, accusations of grave delicts have been made against both priests by multiple victims. Using the prescribed canonical process, both were removed from office as pastors. Exercising the right of recourse against removal, they both submitted petitions to the Congregation. In our response, we included the information we had about the delicts as well as our opinion on appropriate disposition of the cases.

Presently, we cannot assign pastors to the two parishes affected while the recourse is still pending. Therefore, I am writing on behalf of the pastoral needs of these two parishes. Two excellent priests are serving their needs well as pastoral administrators but they desire the stability that would come with having pastors assigned. Such assignments would also assist the two communities in their needed healing. I am also writing out of concern for the very concrete needs of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, Both priests are receiving their full salaries and benefits as pastors since the recourse is pending. The Archdiocese has had to assume this financial burden since the parishes would be incapable of providing for their administrator and pastor at the same time.

I understand that the volume of work at the Congregation has increased dramatically without the corresponding augmenting of staff. However, I am requesting that, at least, the recourse portion of these cases be expedited. Both priests would still be supported but the amount of subsidy would be adjusted. Each has other sources of income as well.

Thank you for any consideration you are able to give to this request.

MEETING WITH PASTOR CONSULTORS December 27, 2003

On Friday, December 27, 2002, I met with two of the pastor consultors, Father Gerry Britain and Father George Rebatski, to discuss issues affecting the continuation in the office of pastor of Father Michael Krejci. I informed them that there had been incidents involving the sexual abuse minors which had been admitted. I did not provide the details of the preliminary investigation findings in order to preserve as much of Father's dignity as possible. I did inform them that the incident took place some 20 years ago.

I explained that, while he has served well as a pastor, the new national norms, approved by the Vatican affect his ability to continue in ministry. The pastor consultors were informed of the pastoral effort to obtain a resignation from office.

The pastor consultors inquired about the support he was receiving and what outreach there had been to him. They were also informed that he had the services of a canonical advisor.

Having considered the matter seriously, the pastor consultors advised that I proceed with the next step in the process and formalize the request for resignation.

As I mentioned in my previous correspondence, I have grave reservations about the wisdom of your continuation in ministry. In virtue of my pastoral duty to provide for the care of souls, it is my unhappy task to inform you that I am seriously considering your removal from the office of pastor of St. Theresa Parish.

We have sound reason to believe that there is canonical cause for your removal, which can be demonstrated by certain evidence. The major reason for such action involves past actions on your part which, in our current context, are gravely detrimental and disturbing to ecclesial communion.

After preliminary investigation and consultation with two pastor consultors, I am asking you to submit your resignation to me within fifteen (15) days, that is, by February 5, 2003.

If you do not submit your resignation as requested, please supply in writing your reasons for not doing so within the same fifteen (15) day period.

I believe it is to your best interests and to the good of the parish that we look in making this request. It is to your advantage, as well as that of the people of the parish whom you love so much, to submit your resignation voluntarily rather than experience a more arduous closure to your assignment at St. Theresa Parish.

What further steps might be taken is, I know, under consideration between yourself and Father Joe Hornacek. I encourage that dialogue to continue as we determine how best to assist you in transition.

I write regarding the case of the Reverend Michael G. KREJCI, a priest of your Archdiocese who has been accused of the sexual abuse of minors and has presented a recourse to this Congregation against the administrative measures taken by Your Excellency in his regard.

After having carefully examined the present case, I wish to inform you that the cleric's recourse has been rejected and this Dicastery hereby grants a derogation from the law of prescription, as requested by Your Excellency, and authorizes you to initiate a penal judicial process according to the norms of Canon Law as well as those of the motu proprio Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela. Priests holding the licentiate in canon law are able to serve on a local Tribunal apart from the Supreme Tribunal of this Congregation. In order to assist you further, a copy of the motu proprio is enclosed.

At the conclusion of the process at first instance, Your Excellency is kindly asked to forward to the Congregation the Acta of this case. The tabulated summary, according to the enclosed example will be helpful too.

Furthermore, this Dicastery has decided to confirm the ministerial restrictions that Your Excellency has already imposed on the cleric.

At this time, I have received information which appears indicative of the fact that a serious offense against the morals may have been committed by the REVEREND MICHAEL KRECJI. On the basis of this information Father Krejci has been accused of:

> A delict against morals, namely: the delict committed by a cleric against the sixth commandment of the Decalogue with a minor below the age of eighteen years. (Can. 1395 §2 and cf. Graviora Delicta, May 18, 2001)

Due to the seriousness of this information and by virtue of canon 1717, I hereby decree that the prior investigation of a penal process be opened and that a cautious investigation be undertaken concerning these allegations and Father Krejci's imputability in order to determine subsequent steps unders the norms of canon 1718.

In addition, I hereby appoint the Reverend Philip Reifenberg, Promoter of Justice, to serve as auditor, with the direct assistance of the Very Reverend Curt Frederick, Vicar for Clergy, and I direct them to conduct, on my behalf, an appropriate investigation into the facts and circumstances of this matter and the related question of Father Krejci's imputability in accord with the norm of canon law.

Having thoroughly studied all of the files given to me concerning the various allegations of sexual abuse against Reverend Michael G. KREJCI, a priest of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and having been duly appointed Promoter of Justice of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee Tribunal for this matter, I petition you, the Most Reverend Timothy M. Dolan, Archbishop of Milwaukee, to convene a Tribunal of three priest judges to receive this *libellus* in the matter concerning, Reverend Michael G. KREJCI. I present this *libellus* for the purpose outlined, and in accordance with cc. 1501 and 1504 of the Code of Canon Law.

There are multiple accusers and multiple allegations in the case against the Reverend Michael G. KREJCI. This petition is based on information gathered by diocesan staff since the time of the first allegation was brought against Michael KREJCI in 1979.


The preliminary investigation file includes the following:

- the Victim's assistance file related to Fr. KREJCI,
- Fr. KREJCI's seminary file,
- Fr. KREJCI's clergy file,
- the Archdiocese of Milwaukee's monitoring reports related to Fr. KREJCI
- and the Office of the Archbishop and Auxiliary Bishop's files related to Fr. KREJCI.

Some of the most important evidence against Fr. KREJCl from these files includes:

documenting an admission by the accused of sexual abuse involving a minor in 1978 and 1989 (Acta, p.17). (Throughout the acts, there are several other references to additional admissions of "inappropriate touching" made by Reverend KREJCI—including a public admission to his parish which was documented in the Milwaukee Catholic Herald);

Given the aforementioned, I ask you, Archbishop Dolan, to consider the following allegations and proceed with a penal trial, as allowed for under the norms provided by the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF), against Fr. KREJCI.

Reverend KREJCI has publicly expressed that he has sexually abused minors while he was ordained. Specifically, he has admitted, "inappropriate touching of a minor on two different occasions." Having said that, on June 17th of 2003, Reverend Michael G. KREJCI has denied one of the allegations against him when he indicated he did not sexually abuse, nor did he attempt to sexually abuse,

As there were four allegations referred to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, and it authorized a "penal judicial process" against Reverend Michael KREJCI, I propose the following doubts for the Joinder of Issue be established:

1. Is the Reverend Michael KREJCI guilty of offending against the sixth commandment of the Decalogue with a

currently unnamed victim (hereafter referred to as), John Doe A, who had not completed his sixteenth year of age at the time of this offense (CIC, c. 2359, §2; CIC, C. 1395, §2)?

- 2. Is the Reverend Michael KREJCI guilty of offending against the sixth commandment of the Decalogue with a currently unnamed victim (hereafter referred to as), John Doe B, who had not completed his sixteenth year of age at the time of this offense (CIC, c. 2359, §2; CIC, C. 1395, §2)?
- 3. Is the Reverend Michael KREJCI guilty of offending against the sixth commandment of the Decalogue with Mr. who had not completed his sixteenth year of age at the time of this offense (CIC, c. 2359, §2; CIC, C. 1395, §2)?
- 4. Is the Reverend Michael KREJCI guilty of offending against the sixth commandment of the Decalogue with Mr. who had not completed his sixteenth year of age at the time of this offense (CIC, c. 2359, §2; CIC, C. 1395, §2)?

When considering all of these allegations against Fr. KREJCI, along with his admission of "inappropriate touching of a minor on two different occasions," the other allegations of sexual abuse of a minor against Fr. KREJCI become more credible—as there is a consistent pattern of abuse with adolescent boys. All of the accusations involve young males ranging in age from 10-11 years old. All of the abuse alleged includes: attempted genital fondling and actual genital fondling.

Finally, based on my review of the acta of the preliminary investigation, there should not be any reduction of imputability applied to Fr. KREJCI, since it appears thus far that no extenuating factors were present which would reduce it.

In accord with the particular law presently in force for the application of a penalty for this delict, Norm 8 of the USCCB Essential Norms, which states, "When even a single act of sexual abuse by a priest or deacon is <u>admitted</u> or established after an appropriate process in accord with canon law, the offending priest or deacon will be removed <u>permanently</u> from ecclesiastical ministry, not excluding dismissal from the clerical state, if the case so warrants (CIC, c. 1395 §2)."

In this case, I recommend that the Reverend Michael KREJCI be dismissed from the clerical state as proof of the delicts against Reverend KREJCI's include his own admission (c. 1536,2) and since it is also clear that he used his priestly office to gain access to minors so he could sexually abuse them. Finally, it is important to laicize

Reverend Michael KREJCI, as he is not an offender who has been consistently found to be unlikely to reoffend.

Mike was experiencing some difficulty with therapy in the past couple of weeks. He addressed the residents at our weekly house meeting concerning this issue. He asked for their support and if they could share with him some insights regarding the therapy process and if they had any personal experiences to share with him. He provided the staff with his weekly schedule of the therapy and meetings, which we have placed in his file. Mike was placed in our halfway house in order to be strictly monitored while he was receiving therapy. We provide him with a safe which led him into treatment.

Mike has adjusted well to our halfway house and is getting along quite nicely with the other residents. He puts in his fair share of work around the house and attends all our scheduled meetings. He has worked with another resident planting a garden behind his place of residence. We continue to monitor him closely while he is attending his outpatient therapy program.

Thanks for your recent letter concerning Mike Krejci. Mike wrote me a very distressful letter and I could see he was quite upset. In the meantime, Dr. Liz Piasecki has been in St. Louis and was able to visit with Dr. Mike himself will be coming here in mid-September.

I had been receiving constant reports and I felt that Mike was not making much progress and that, therefore, the possibilities of any kind of reintegration would be minimal. Dr. Piasecki tells me now that the feeling is that he has been making some progress and that perhaps after a longer stay at St. Louis we could begin some kind of reintegration. I do believe, though, it would be helpful for Mike to take some kind of vocational training program in the event that continued ministry in priesthood does not work out for him.

I certainly am looking forward to my sabbatical coming up in January. I want to take advantage of it to get a little rest and to do a lot of thinking and praying. I was at St. Vincent in early June and thoroughly enjoyed my week there. I believe, though, I will have to make another monastery my headquarters, as I would get too involved in so many things if I stayed around St. Vincent.

- 2) I became administrator of St. Gall Parish in June, 1986, not St. Boniface. I was appointed administrator of St. Boniface in July, 1993.
- 3) On November 3, 1994, I restated what I had done in 1979 and which I had previously disclosed to the Vicar for Clergy in 1986. Since my assignment had ceased when St. Gall and St. Boniface parishes were closed on October 31, 1994, I voluntarily left for treatment.
- 4) I received treatment for sexual issues. I did not receive treatment for drinking and do not have a problem in that area.

How often I have debated writing this letter, but always excused myself believing that you must certainly be aware of it.

I am referring to a single (?) episode of adolescent sexual abuse by Fr. Mike Krejci while he was an associate at Our Lady of Good Hope in the early 80's. As pastor I dealt with it at the time insisting that he gets some psychological help, apologizes to the boys and their parents and no more camping trips with young boys. Bishop Brust was also aware of it. Maybe it was only a single aberration and never happened again, but dozens of kids in the seventh and eighth grade and at least one teacher, she reported it to me, knew about it. I don't know if any of them ever reported the abuse to the Archdiocese during these past dozen years.

While he was assigned to St. Gall's with no school, I was less frightened.

I bring it to your attention now only because of a caual conversation I had with his father, who lives in Muskego and we bumped into each other at the post office yerterday. His dad told me that Hike was considering going to either of two parishes with schools, -St. Kilian(Hartford) or St. Anthony (Pewaukee) after he finishes of St. Gall's. I would be very worrisd about young boys again, a serious danger for Mike and the Archdiocese if that were to happen.

I feel better now; if you want to know more, you'll need to ask me.



One of whom was Father Michael Creici. He was an administrator at St. Therese in Eagle. There were people on staff and also the trustees of the parish knew that there had been admitted allegations in the past. And so he was put under that kind of monitoring situation.

When the responsibility was completely mine, and I don't want to suggest, you know, inappropriateness before, but when it was completely mine, I wanted to clear issues as promptly as I could. So I remember calling Michael and saying, Michael, I don't know what — that was shortly after the Dallas meeting, and I remember saying, Michael, I don't know what the final canonical implications may be of this. I'm asking you to leave St. Therese until we can sort this out. I made that commitment to myself and also to the Conference of Bishops at the Dallas meeting which I attended not as auxiliary

bishop but as administrator of the Archdiocese. I'm 1 asking you to move away. 

PRECEPT

In response to the pastoral needs of this Christian community, in virtue of my authority as diocesan bishop (c. 381, §1), and in accord with the provisions of canon 49, I formally place upon Reverend Michael Krejci the following obligations:

- 1) To refrain from all contact with minors, vulnerable adults, and other persons or categories of persons who have proven to be occasions of temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 2) To cease until further notice all public ministry including the celebration of Eucharist; Eucharist may be celebrated in a private setting alone or with only another priest or priests in attendance; the celebration of any other sacraments will require my explicit permission in each case;
- 3) To avoid all places and situations that, from past experience, have been occasions of serious temptation in the area of sexual morality;
- 4) To cease any and all activities and relationships that may be described under the broad category of pastoral counseling;
- 5) Until further notice the faculty to hear confession is revoked;
- 6) To refrain from clerical attire or identification in public.

The reasons motivating this decree are the allegations of sexual activities in violation of the obligation of clerical celibacy (c. 277, §1). These restrictions are seen as necessary and prudent precautions and will remain in effect for three months from this date or until notice of their revocation. Any violations of this precept could result in penal action and this decree shall serve as canonical warning to that effect.

This decree shall be executed by means of its communication to Reverend Michael Krejci by postal delivery.

With this brief letter I wish to respond to the three questions which remained unanswered during our conversation on January 13, 2003.

First, you asked what kind of information could be released by the archdiocese to future employers regarding a priest in your current situation. After conferring with Matt Flynn, Rick Tank, and Barbara Anne Cusack, I can say that the archdiocese would certainly state the time from your ordination to the present during which you were in the employ of the archdiocese. Personally, I would counsel you to be as candid and open with your future employer about your past background, and would recommend that you do not seek a reference letter from me. I would find it very difficult to know exactly how much to say especially if there were any possibility of your working with youth in the future.

Secondly, you asked whether or not the archbishop would pursue a penal process if a priest does not voluntarily seek laicization. The archbishop has no choice but to send each case to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. This is required by the United States Bishops Conference Norms. That is precisely why we are urging each priest in your situation to seek voluntary laicization.

Thirdly, you asked whether or not the term "pension" used in the Code regarding removal of a pastor is different from our own diocesan provision for a pension plan. The word "pension" as used canonically is somewhat different in that if because of circumstances a priest does not qualify for payment under our pension plan, the archbishop would be required to provide some minimal support (pension).

Mike, hopefully the above information is helpful to you as you continue to plan for your future. You remain in my thoughts and prayers; know that I remain willing to be of any assistance or support that I can to you.

Select Krejci Sexual Abuse Intake Reports

5/1/02 Sexual Abuse Intake Report (regarding writer of 4/23/02 letter) documenting abuse that occurred on a camping trip in 1979 while survivor was 12-13 years old. Krejci put his hands down the front of the youth's pants. Fr. Derfus had a meeting with some kids and their parents resulting in Krejci leaving for treatment.
