Director's Report:

The Class of 2014 finally made it through their formation! On Saturday, September 6, 2014 seven men were ordained to the Diaconate at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist by Archbishop Jerome E. Listecki, Archbishop of Milwaukee. Concelebrating was Auxiliary Bishop Richard J. Sklba, a longtime supporter of the Diaconate in the Archdiocese. And what a celebration it was!

The music by the Archdiocesan Choir was amazing. The whole atmosphere was one filled with energy, excitement, reverence and the Holy Spirit. 40+ deacons vested and sat together as the Order of Deacons, praying for their new brothers and also there to welcome them into the Order of Diaconate. A large number of the ordained deacons' wives

were also present to join in the prayer and the welcoming of the newly ordained, their wives and families. A good number of priests were also there including the pastors of the newly ordained who had supported these men through their four years of formation. Family, friends, relatives, and others

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were also in attendance, filling the Cathedral.

Archbishop Listecki called the newly ordained "His lucky seven." He did so as there were seven men and one of the readings was from the Acts of the Apostles with the calling, naming and ordaining, "laying on of hands," of the first seven deacons. He also gave an inspiring homily.

Someone was recently overheard saying, "The Synod is over. What's next?" It is incumbent on the

deacon community to let people know the Synod is not over. Tell people in your gatherings with them. Tell them in your homilies. Tell them why it isn't over. To do so, read the Synodal Declaration titled *Filled With the Holy Spirit*. It can be found on the Archdiocesan website.

The Synod involved months of preparation. There were parish meetings and discussions. Then there were district meetings and discussions. Finally some 500 people came together at the Cousins Center for the 3 day Synod (June 6-8, 2014). All toll some 15,000 people were involved in the process at some point or throughout. This is a fantastic amount of people, hours upon hours, ideas and input. It was a tremendous, observable reflection of the living Church in southeastern Wisconsin.

Recall the mantra of the Synod? "A New Pentecost." Throughout the process hundreds,

thousands of people prayed for the Synod and its success. Truly the Holy Spirit was at work the whole time, just as he was at the original Pentecost. Unlike the Synod of 1987 which ended and was pretty much "put on the back shelf," the Synod of 2014 continues to be filled and guided by the Holy Spirit. The entire staff at the Cousins Center had a half day meeting on September 16th to look at the Synod, the Synodal Declaration, and most importantly how to keep the findings of the Synod alive and in motion. How could we as staff

and parishioners of our parishes keep the spark alive and work to see the recommended changes are implemented?

As deacons, don't think it is over. Don't fall behind the curve by moving on as if nothing happened at the Synod. The Synod was called for by the Holy Spirit long before it was announced by Archbishop Listecki. And if that is a fact, the Holy Spirit didn't intend it to be just a few moments in time. Rather, an ongoing, Church renewing and life giving entity begun by Jesus Christ, guided by the holy Spirit, and carried forward through the leadership of the

archbishop. Don't let 15,000 people's "sweat and blood" go unused. Don't let the Spirit's work be placed on a shelf.

Don't forget to make it a regular practice to attend your district meetings. Sharing prayer, ministry and life with your brothers is priceless. You will also learn what the latest news regarding the diaconate is.

Does a brother or sister Episcopal Deacon live in your area? Invite them to come and attend your district meetings. Those districts that have done so have been enriched by their shared prayers and input.
