The one thing you have to know about Robert is that he always has his trusty notepad and pen with him that he keeps in its front breast pocket. He amazes me that, in his communications with other people, he writes back and forth with them.

I call him the Blue Bunny because he



always wears his trademark blue shirt. See a picture of me and Robert. I think it is good that he wears that blue shirt so he can be noticed (within that one blink). If he wore camouflaged/army clothing, we don't stand a chance of catching speedy Robert! He'll truly be the Invisible Man! That is what I will think after his

retirement, that he is still around in spirit, wearing that new camouflaged/army clothing.

I'm sad (in a good way) because it won't be the same without Robert. Like I said, I know his spirit will live on in the halls of St. John School for the Deaf, St. Francis de Sales Seminary, and the Cousins Center. I'm happy for him because, now he can truly enjoy bugging his wife Patricia. I'm kidding. He can finally enjoy the retirement that he truly deserves after all the hard work, energy, strength, and speed that he wholeheartedly put into his work every day of his life. # A Loving Tribute to Rev. Gerald B. Hauser

Fr. Gerald Hauser was a longtime friend of the Deaf Community. He was an assistant pastor at St. John's School for the Deaf in Milwaukee from 1947 to 1950. He is one of the11 priests who are co-founders of the International Catholic Deaf Congress (ICDC) and attended the very first Inaugural Conference in Toronto, Canada in 1949. Today this is now known as the International Catholic Deaf Association (ICDA). He served as our chaplain for the Ephpheta Sodality of St. John the Baptist before it became a local ICDA Chapter #7 while serving at St. John's for about 3 years.



When Fr. Hauser left St. John's School for the Deaf, he still kept in touch with the Deaf Community. I first met Fr. Hauser when I was in grade school. Fr. Hauser was a close friend of my mother's cousin. My parents and I would drive to St. Peter's Church in Slinger to see him say the Mass and visit with him afterward. Fr. Hauser and Sr. Susan Staff, SDS (Sisters of the Divine Savior) traveled the world together. They often led groups of people on tours. Sometimes the deaf people would travel with the group. At one time he took 17 deaf people to Russia. I sure wished I had the opportunity to travel with him.

Over the years our paths crossed again when we invited him to attend the Ephpheta Sodality of St. John the Baptist's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Mass at the Cousins Center's Mater Christi Chapel on February 12, 2011. (Note: it was on this same date four years later that he passed away on the 104<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our Ephpheta Sodality.) He was in attendance for Mass celebrated by Archbishop Jerome Listecki. After Mass we had dinner and celebration. I was in awe to see our former moderators, future deaf priest and deaf permanent deacon with Archbishop Listecki blessing the stole we presented to each one of them. From 1947-1950, I admired the officers of Ephpheta for preserving the main points of Fr. Hauser's homilies. Such a priceless treasure we have to remember him by his preaching the Gospel to us.

In the past few years Fr. Hauser has encouraged us to plan a several Pilgrimages with the Deaf Community. He has sponsored all three trips we had. Our first trip to Green Bay was planned with the Sisters of the Divine Savior in memory of his good friend, Alvin Deinlein (who died in 2011). We went to the Shrine of our Lady of Good Help and also Green Bay Packers Stadium. Fr. Hauser was an avid sport fan and met many of the old Packer coaches and players. It was always nice to meet with him after our trips and talk about it. You could see his face glow!

Our sincere sympathy goes to Fr. Gerald Hauser's family and to Sr. Susan Staff, SDS.

I will miss him and his stories of wisdom he shared. I am blessed that he became a part of our Deaf community and we can treasure his memories for years to come.

May the perpetual light shine upon him. Rest in Peace, Fr. Hauser.

# Fr. Gerald Hauser Obituary

Fr. Gerald Bernard Hauser, 93, died Feb. 12. Born in Rubicon to Arthur and Julia Catherine (Schmitt) Hauser, Fr. Hauser entered Saint Francis de Sales Seminary, St. Francis, in 1934 and was ordained Sept. 29, 1945, by Archbishop Moses E. Kiley at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, Milwaukee.

Fr. Hauser began his priestly ministry as an assistant pastor at St. Leo Parish, Milwaukee, Oct. 10, 1945. He also served as assistant pastor, St. Kilian Parish, Hartford, 1946; assistant pastor, St. John's School for the Deaf, Milwaukee, 1947; assistant pastor, St. Catherine Parish, Milwaukee, 1950;

faculty member, Saint Francis Minor Seminary, St. Francis, 1951; director, Albert Cardinal Meyer Institute, the forerunner of the Office for Continuing Formation of Clergy, 1970; special assistant (development director) to the rector, Saint Francis de Sales Seminary, St. Francis, 1980. He retired from active ministry Dec. 31, 1987.

Fr. Hauser spent the majority of his priesthood, 51 years including his student years, at Saint Francis de Sales Seminary, St. Francis, as a faculty member, athletic director, director of alumni operations, editor of the Salesianum, director of the Cardinal Meyer Institute and director of financial development. He was also involved in continuing education for priests and others involved in the religious apostolate.

Throughout his career, Fr. Hauser was also a weekend parish help-out priest, including 20 years at St. Peter Parish, Slinger. He made numerous speaking appearances, and developed and led many domestic and overseas travel experiences for friends and benefactors of the seminary.

He was awarded membership in the Jerusalem-based papal Knights of the Holy Sepulchre Order.

Fr. Hauser, a talented and proficient multi-sport athlete, also scouted Major League Baseball professionally and assisted various major universities in recruitment of student scholarship athletes.

He continued serving charitable causes after retirement, including serving on the board of directors for Catholic Knights Insurance Society; initiating and developing two personal charitable Foundations, the Father Gerald B. Hauser Charitable Foundation and the Father Hauser-John Kegel Priesthood Scholarship Fund; and co-founding, with 11 international and American priests, the International Catholic Deaf Association (ICDA) in Toronto, Canada.

Preceded in death by his parents and two brothers, Paul and Richard Hauser, Fr. Hauser is survived by his sister Dolores (Robert) Weber of Rubicon; brothers Robert Hauser of West Allis and Arthur (Joan) Hauser of Cincinnati, Ohio; and sister-in-law Grace Hauser.

# What are you doing this Holy Week?

In the Catholic liturgical traditions for Holy Week, we remember and even re-enact events central to our faith. Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday. Holding palm branches, we envision Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. On other Sundays of the year, the congregation listens silently to the readings at Mass. On **Palm Sunday**, the priest, deacon, readers, and members of the congregation all have parts to read in the Passion narrative. The Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday and ends with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday. Mass on Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper. The priest may wash the feet of 12 people, reenacting a very humble act of Jesus as One who came to serve and prepare His followers to do the same. After Mass, an empty tabernacle left open,

the altar laid bare, and empty holy water fonts reflect the desolation the Lord's death would bring. The Liturgy of the Lord's Passion on **Good Friday** serves as a continuation of the Mass on Holy Thursday. There is no consecration of bread and wine on Good Friday. The faithful come forward in veneration of the Cross. Through day-long fasting and abstinence, we memorialize the suffering Jesus endured and express repentance.

After sunset on **Holy Saturday**, lighting of the paschal candle from a new fire on the vigil of Easter symbolizes Jesus, the Light who dispelled the darkness of sin. New members are welcomed into the sacramental life of the Church, as all of the faithful celebrate the salvation won through the Lord Jesus' life, death and Resurrection.
