Funny how people scramble to get a front seat at a concert, but scramble to get a back seat at the church service.


Funny how we cannot fit church special events into our schedule with our yearly planner but we can easily schedule other events quickly.

Love One Another March 5, 2013

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past Sunday, a local television crew came to the Cathedral to interview me. They asked me the usual questions: "Archbishop, when do you think that the conclave will begin?" "How long will it take the cardinals to make their selection?" "Who do you think will be elected pope?" However, the one really interesting question was, "What effect will the new pope have on the Archdiocese of Milwaukee?" Well, I guess he could change the archbishop. That would be one immediate effect!

Seriously, the new pope will cause excitement. There will be a scramble to get to know him. He will be an immediate celebrity. In 1977, a cardinal from Poland gave a lecture at the Catholic University in Washington, D.C. on Thomistic Phenomenology. Only approximately two dozen people attended the presentation. If you had been in attendance, you could have spent an hour personally discussing the merits of this philosophical approach. A little more than a year later, that Polish cardinal would be elected Pope John Paul II. No one cared about his subject matter and you'd consider yourself lucky to get within a hundred yards of him, as millions thronged to see the new pontiff. Many people, who never had an interest in Eastern Europe, tried to learn as much about Poland as possible.

Whoever becomes the new pope will generate an interest in him, and in the country, region or city of his origin. If it's Cardinal Dolan, St. Louis will be declared a national shrine city, and if it's Cardinal Harvey, Milwaukee will become the Catholic center of the United States – if not the universe. The bottom line is, the next pope will offer his vision that will help to shape the Church for the next decade.

There are those that will hope that the pope will make the Church more relevant by becoming more in tune with the secular world. I don't believe that it's the Church's mission to become more relevant to the world but, rather, to transform the world ("He was in the world, and the world came to be through him, but the world did not know him" John 1:10). The message of the Gospel is the good news of salvation. It calls believers to be countercultural – to live not just for themselves, but to live for others. Believers are called to live as witnesses to the sacrificial love of Christ and transform the world as we LOVE ONE ANOTHER.




