Success in Post-Pandemic Planning Efforts!

He is risen, indeed!

I wish you a very blessed Easter season and hope you had the opportunity to celebrate Easter Sunday with those you haven't been able to see very often, or at all in the past year, given the COVID pandemic.



Easter presents a season of prolonging the joy of the resurrection, overcoming gloom and darkness, and providing light of hope. The Springtime of Easter is a time for new beginnings, a time to plan for life in a new way.

As the gloom and darkness fade, we contemplate how we can share new beginnings with others, including those who weren't able to attend Easter Mass celebrations, or haven't returned to Mass yet. You might be strategizing plans for your post-pandemic come back to Mass, contemplating the two questions Rich Harter posed in our January newsletter to help rebuild your parish community:

"What new things will we do to build and rebuild communal relationships of trust, belonging, and friendship?"

"What new things will we do to help people discover and rediscover that Jesus is Good News for their lives?"

But there may be a bigger question looming. How do I begin planning to answer these questions? One way is to review or revisit the Disciple Maker Index survey results for your parish.

Results for the survey, administered last spring, present a high-level view of personal observations, attitudes, and desires of participating parish members, and can provide your parish insight into opportunities for mission and vision, spiritual growth for parishioners, and engaging in making disciples.

St. James Parish in Franklin, after reviewing their survey results, identified adult faith formation as one major opportunity for growth. For many parishioners, the weekly homily had become the primary (and in some cases the only) learning experience for ongoing adult faith formation. The challenge was to expand and build on previous adult formation programs at the parish. The survey was a clear affirmation of this initiative.

"DMI results support our ideas of how to grow faith formation," said Fred Hang, Pastoral Associate at St. James. "During this past year there has been an increase in people signing up for Zoom sessions compared to in-person sessions of the past," Hang said. "Perhaps the isolation of COVID contributed to the hunger for

more connection and faith-building so we took this opportunity to build upon this silver lining. The numbers keep increasing."

The use of technology was definitely a factor in the growth he witnessed. "With COVID, we needed to learn how to Zoom. Many were reluctant to use it and had fear of technology. But by fall, more people were used to using Zoom and found a comfort level with it." Last fall, St. James had 20 people sign up for a bible study session and that number increased by more than a third for the Lenten series this spring on how to live the Gospel. "I think we'll have to keep the Zoom possibility," Hang explained.

Hang also discovered that parishioners had a great interest in social teachings and social justice. With Zoom sessions, he was able to book national and international speakers very economically, without having to pay their travel expenses. Other topics of Zoom sessions have included marriage enrichment and grief and loss.

He follows up with past participants to find out what they learned and what they got out of the sessions. After the series on marriage enrichment, he learned that nearly 90% of participants came from outside the parish.

Post pandemic, parishioners are eager to resume "Lunch, Laugh & Learn" sessions - designed for retired parishioners. Held midday during the week, it is an opportunity for shared feasting (potluck) and the lighter side of Gospel living. "The month of May will bring our first in-person adult formation gathering in over a year with "A Pilgrimage with Mary." This four-part series involves video, small group discussion, and devotions at our outdoor shrine," explained Hang.

Any challenges? "Now the big thing is marketing, so people know the programs are here." Hang plans on incorporating the St. James website and Facebook page in his promotions.

Highlights from March 13, 2021 Archdiocesan Pastoral Council (APC) Meeting

The Council met with Archbishop Jerome Listecki via Zoom. These were the items discussed and the actions taken.

- Gift of Sunday Pete Burds (<u>burdsp@archmil.org</u>), Director of Evangelization, Susan McNeil (mcneils@archmil.org) Lay Ministry/Synod Implementation Director, and Randy Nohl (nohlr@archmil.org), Director of Synod Implementation, presented the new initiative that stresses the importance of Sunday and how to live it. This work was started before COVID but took on greater importance with the pandemic. The main outcomes of the initiative include: 1) return to Sunday, 2) renewal in the understanding of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, and 3) rededication of Sunday as a day of worship, reset, and renewal. Check out the Gift of Sunday web page to download The Gift of Sunday Theological Reflection and Personal Study and Group Discussion Guides. Other information and sources are also available there. The initiative will be a movement covering several years. A rough timeline is in place through 2024. We want people to see Christ as the center of life. The core of discipleship is to live Jesus throughout your life, integrate your faith into your daily life so that the faithful: 1) see in a new way everything via Jesus, 2) live the gift of Sunday, and
- 3) live as a joyful disciple of Christ.
- Synod Anniversary Date The date has changed and will now be Friday, October 22, 2021, and will be repeated on Saturday, October 23. Bishop Hying is confirmed for October 23.
- APC This advisory body has a significant voice. Combined with the Priest Council, it provides advice to the archbishop. It has been the creator of movements within the archdiocese, including the Evangelization Summit, which in turn became the source for the synod. Its ideas generate forwardthinking.
- Seminary Six transitional deacons and four priests will be ordained this year. Currently of the 54 men in the seminary, 44 are for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Our number is much higher than other larger dioceses. We have a richness of faith in the archdiocese that we must foster, engender and embrace so that we do not lose it.
- **Statue** A 9-foot bronze statue of Mary Mother of the Church will be placed in front of the Pastoral Center in June.

The next meeting of the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council will be held on Saturday, June 19, 2021.


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

Office Services of Missionary Planning and Leadership

The Office of Missionary Planning and Leadership serves parishes in the following ways:

- Provide vision and training for centering a parish on mission
- Provide training to equip leaders for missionary leadership
- Provide coaching on organizational best practices and teambuilding
- Provide strategic missionary planning for parishes
- Walk parishes through the Building Commission proxy process
- Provide parishes with MissionInsite "Big Data" reports
- Walk with leaders through mergers, multi-parish configurations, and transitions
- Provide norms for parishes on Pastoral Councils, Finance Councils, and Parish Committees
- Provide manuals and training to Pastoral Councils, Finance Councils, and Trustees

Status of Updated Pastoral & Finance Council Appendices

As of April 7, 59 parishes have submitted both updated appendices, and 17 parishes have submitted one of the two Council appendices. **KUDOS to all who have already submitted their appendices**.

Reminder: *All parishes* are required to submit updated Pastoral Council and Finance Council appendices. This is an important responsibility of the parish. Every parish is a public juridic person, therefore, every parish is mandated by canon law to have a finance council.

Please return your updated pastoral and finance council appendices to the Office for Missionary Planning and Leadership as soon as possible. At the beginning of May, we will be calling parishes that do not have these required documents on file.

Important to note:

- <u>Use the updated template</u>, which has the updated Archdiocesan logo.
- Multi-parish communities may have a combined Pastoral Council and, therefore, a combined Pastoral Council Appendix. However, since a finance council is mandated by law, each finance council needs a Finance Council appendix.
