

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Message from Gary

Two overlapping "Years"?

You may have heard that we are in the **Year of St. Joseph**. Back on December 8, 2020, Pope Franics commemorated the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as Patron of the

Universal Church. The pope published Patris Corde / With a Father's Heart, an apostolic letter reflecting on Joseph as beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father, a creatively courageous father, a working father, and a father in the shadows. At the same time, the Vatican issued a decree granting indulgences for the year, which runs Dec. 8, 2020 – Dec. 8, 2021.

Just a few weeks after holding up St. Joseph as an example, on Dec. 27, the Feast of the Holy Family, Pope Francis declared **a Year of the Family**, to begin on March 19, 2021 and run through June 26, 2022, the 10th World Meeting of Families in Rome. The start date of March 19 is the 5th anniversary of the Pope's issuing Amoris Laetitia / The Joy of Love, his apostolic exhortation on Love in the Family. Of course, March 19 is also the Feast of St. Joseph.

So, we have two overlapping Years, but clearly related, both focusing on family relationships, in a special way on the role of fathers, on the challenges of family life in our time, on the particular way in which family life reveals Love, and on Christian families called to be witnesses of God's love in the world.

We do not set aside other priorities for these Years, but we can take opportunities to supplement our ministries with special attention to family life and to the themes set out by Pope Francis. At the same time, we begin our archdiocese-wide focus on the **Gift of Sunday** (including Sunday as a day for families), and we attend to our own ongoing catechetical efforts.

The Gift of Sunday

Recently, Archbishop Listecki released The Gift of Sunday, a foundational document for a threeyear plan to reenergize our local Church, along with a study guide.

We will be holding **The Gift of Sunday Lenten Missions** / **Misión Cuaresmal EL Don del Domingo** on **Wednesday, March 3, 2021, from 7 to 8:30 p.m.** at 18 parishes throughout the archdiocese in English, Spanish, and American Sign Language. The Lenten Missions will be based on *The Gift of Sunday* Theological Reflection.

In addition to the Lenten Missions, a Lenten Prayer Card in English and Spanish is being made available to parishes and Catholic high schools to be distributed on Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent.

We are also working on a booklet that parishes and schools will be invited to hand out at Easter. Watch for more details in the near future about this booklet.

It is good to be prepared yourself, and to help prepare catechists and others who can help your parishioners understand how and why this familiar practice has been modified.
