

Covid-19 Consent Form

To help give guidance and clarity to parishes, families, and volunteers engaged in catechetical ministry this year, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, in consultation with Catholic Mutual Group, has created the *COVID-19 Pandemic - Student/Family Statement of Operations, Understanding, and Consent for Religious Education* form. This document seeks to inform all involved in Religious Education of the health risks associated with in-person ministry this year along with expectations for families to maintain the health of the entire Religious Education community.

Any parish resuming in-person Religious Education in Fall 2020 is expected to use this form and obtain signed copies from each family/student participating in Religious Education programs.

To assist you in implementing this form, recommended procedures and answers to frequently asked questions have been created. Should you have further questions, please do not hesitate to contact Gary Pokorny or Doug Ulaszek.

Catechetical Sunday

Catechetical Sunday will be September 20, 2020. This year's theme: "I Received from the Lord what I also Handed on to You." The theme focuses on the very nature of catechesis, that is, sharing with others the new life in Christ which we ourselves have received. To be a catechist is not merely to teach religious facts, nor is it to share my personal philosophy and opinions, but to pass on what has been entrusted to me - the gift of faith, a living relationship with Christ, and the means to encounter Jesus in and through the Church.

When St. Paul writes, "I Received from the Lord what I also Handed on to You," he continues by reminding his readers of the central gift of the Eucharist. This year, we too must focus our energies on handing on what we have received, in particular, inviting our families and parishioners to return to the Eucharist

The US Bishops offer online resources - including articles, podcasts and videos on the theme and on the Eucharist.

Commissioning Catechists? Depending on circumstances, it may not be possible to celebrate a Commissioning as you may have done in the past. But it is still important to offer some form of public recognition of catechists, whether in a newsletter or bulletin, at Mass, in a video, or some other way. Even without a formal commissioning, invite your parishioners or your program families to pray for the catechists. And, of course, you can use Catechetical Sunday as a time to name and recognize the indispensable role of parents in the faith of their own children.

Sunday: A Joyful Obligation

After months without the regular celebration of Sunday Mass, and then a summer of gradually returning to Mass while putting precautions in place, it is now time to prepare and invite our people to return to Sunday Mass and to make the Eucharist a regular part of their lives and their family routines. In the coming weeks and months, Archbishop Listecki will lead us in a joint effort as an archdiocese in this return to Mass and to keeping Sunday as the Lord's Day.

The Catholic Comeback

The Catholic Comeback is the archdiocesan guide for returning to parish operations and ministry. In the form of a matrix, it lists all sorts of parish activities, sacraments, and programs. Last week, Archbishop Listecki announced the dispensation of the obligation to attend

Sunday Mass would expire on September 14. Based upon that announcement, the decision has been made to move to PHASE 2 of the Catholic Comeback Matrix, also effective September 14. View the updated matrix - the matrix changes for Phase 2 highlighted in red.

The most significant change in Phase 2 is that attendance restrictions are limited only by the number of people that can be accommodated in church with effective social distancing procedures. Grade Specific Curriculum in this challenging year

During this year when many of our normal routines are disrupted and we are busy re-inventing faith formation, it is good to return to the basic goals of catechesis for children. For this, our Archdiocesan Grade-Specific Religious Education Curriculum is a handy resource. The Curriculum lists learning expectations for grades 4K through 8th. It is available in Spanish and English. Expectations for each grade are listed on two pages each, making it easy to provide as a handout to parents or catechist. Learning expectations are divided into four areas corresponding to the pillars of the Catechism, followed by a list of characteristics of the child at that grade level. The characteristics remind a catechist or parent of the development and capacity of the child, which shapes what and how the child will learn and appropriate the faith. The four pillars, as in the Catechism, demonstrate that catechesis includes knowing Jesus Christ, encountering Christ in the liturgy, living as a disciple of Christ, and praying with/in Christ. This can be a useful instrument to share with parents and with your catechists, to remind them just what we are aiming at in our formation programs and in the formation that takes place within the family. For parents, it's best to share the particular pages for the grade(s) in which they have children.

What's new in the 2018 Edition of the Curriculum?

For any readers who have not looked at the curriculum is recent years, it was completely updated and re-formatted in 2018. The old version (2004) had each grade on a single page, with content arranged in four quadrants, around a central "characteristics of the student" list. With this revision, each grade takes two pages (larger font), and is arranged simply as a list with four subdivisions, and the characteristics listed at the end. The content is not radically different, but it has been thoroughly reviewed and updated. There is a more intentional tracking from year to year. That is, concepts normally do not appear in one year then disappear again. Instead, many topics will be introduced in one grade, then be developed in subsequent grades. The former document was less consistent in this regard. Second, verbs were carefully reviewed and sometimes revised to indicate an age-appropriate level of learning and to show progression of learning over the years. Hence, there are differences between being introduced to a concept, being familiar with or memorizing it, and understanding the concept.
