Lay Parish Ministers in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee

A Study Conducted by the John Paul II Center Archdiocese of Milwaukee

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INTRODUCTION

Lay parish ministers provide a vital resource for the parishes of southeastern Wisconsin.

In order to better understand and respond to the formational needs of these individuals and of future lay parish ministers, the John Paul II Center conducted a study of the characteristics, roles, work experience and educational background of lay parish ministers in the archdiocese.

The survey was carried out during February 2012. Several electronic distribution lists were used to send an email request to lay parish ministers to complete a Survey Monkey questionnaire. 243 usable responses were received.

A report on those responses follows.

SUMMARY

The following summarizes key findings of the lay parish ministers survey.

Survey respondents

- The lay parish ministers survey was carried out during February of 2012. 243 usable responses were received.
- Directors of religious education and directors of administrative services were the largest categories of respondents.

Demographics

- 77% of the respondents were female.
- Almost one-third (30%) of the respondents were 60 years of age or older. With 40% of the respondents 50-59 years of age, 70% of the respondents were 50 years of age or older.
- 99% of the respondents were Roman Catholic.
- 4% of the respondents were religious sisters.
- 7% of the respondents said they were fluent in a language other than English.

Employment

- 75% of the respondents reported being employed by and serving one parish.
- 77% of the respondents reported holding full-time positions (defined as 30 hours or more a week).
- There were multiple respondents from every district in the archdiocese.
- 179 respondents reported 271 memberships in ministerial organizations, with the largest number (56) saying they were members of Mareda.
- 42% of the respondents had been in their current positions 5 years or less.
- 89 of the respondents held no prior parish position; 137 have held positions in multiple parishes.
- 82% of the respondents reported having worked in a field other than parish ministry.

Formation and education

- 37% of respondents reported having a master's degree as their highest level of school completed. This was followed closely by 35% with a bachelor's degree. 19% reported having no post-secondary degree.
- 37% of the post-secondary degrees were in religious studies, theology or ministry.
- The largest percentage of the respondents with bachelor's degrees in theology, ministry or religious studies reported Cardinal Stritch University as the degree-granting institution (26%).
- The largest percentage of the respondents with master's degrees in theology, ministry or religious studies reported St. Francis Seminary as the degree-granting institution (29%).
- About half of the respondents reported having non-degree education or certification. The largest number reported religious education certification and lay ministry formation.
- 18 respondents (7%) reported being currently in school, 6 in a certificate program and 12 in a degree program. 8 of the 18 reported being students at Cardinal Stritch University, 7 in lay ministry or religious studies.
- When asked about the need for additional formation, 51% of the respondents said their education was adequate or more than adequate and that additional education would be helpful. The three top areas for additional education were liturgy, theology and scripture.
- When asked about barriers to the pursuit of further education 57% of the respondents mentioned a combination of time and money.

SURVEY RESULTS

SURVEY RESPONDENTS

Position in parish

The positions of those surveyed included administrative services directors, adult and family ministers, child ministers, directors of religious education, liturgy directors, ministers of care, music directors, music and liturgy directors, parish directors, parish nurses, pastoral associates, social/human concerns ministers, and youth ministers. Of the 243 respondents, 23 reported they had "other" titles. A few of the titles were unique (Hispanic liturgy coordinator) but most combined two or three of the listed titles (such as DRE and youth minister; or pastoral associate, director of liturgy and social/human concerns minister).

Numbers of respondents from the various ministerial roles are shown in the table below. Directors of religious education were the largest category of respondents (23%), followed by directors of administrative services (16%). Minister of care, parish director, parish nurse and social/human concerns ministers were the smallest categories of respondents (.8% each).

Data from lay parish minister positions with fewer than 10 responses (i.e., adult and family minister, liturgy director, minister of care, parish director, parish nurse, and social/human concerns minister) will be reported in the tables but will not be described in the narrative.

DEMOGRAPHICS

Gender

Overall, 77% of lay parish minister respondents were female. In some positions, the proportion of women was even greater, for example, child minister (88%), youth minister (87%), and director of religious education (84%).

Gender by parish position

Age

Almost one-third (30%) of the lay parish ministers who responded to the survey were 60 years of age or older; another 40% were age 50-59. Only 13% of respondents were under the age of 40. The age distribution pattern is similar for many parish positions. Youth ministers deviate from the overall pattern as the youngest group, with 47% under the age of 40.

Age by parish position

Religious affiliation

By far the majority of respondents (241 or 99%) are Roman Catholic.

Ecclesial status

Of the 243 respondents, 10 (4%) reported they are religious sisters.

Language

Only 17 (7%) of all respondents are fluent in a language other than English. For those who do speak another language, the primary second language was Spanish (mentioned by 14 of the 17 respondents). Various other languages were also mentioned, including sign language.

EMPLOYMENT

Current employment situation

When asked to describe their current employment situation, 182 or 75% of the respondents said they were employed by and serve one parish. 24 or 10% are employed by two or more parishes.

Employment situation

Full-time/part-time employment

77% of the lay parish ministers reported that their positions are full-time (defined as 30 or more hours a week). A majority of all positions are full-time. Music director has the largest percentage of part-time positions (47%).

Respondents by district

Membership in ministerial organizations

When asked what ministerial organizations they belonged to, 179 respondents reported 271 memberships. Of the 271 memberships, 56 respondents said they were members of Mareda (the Association of Catechetical Leadership in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee), followed by 51 mentioning ALMA/NPM (Archdiocesan Liturgical Musicians Association) and 39 mentioning NPM (the National Association of Pastoral Musicians).

Total years in parish ministry (including current position)

17 responses were not usable for this analysis of total years in ministry.

A comparison between the number of years in current position compared to the total years of ministry suggests that there are a number of very experienced parish ministers who are in positions relatively new to them. 101 of our 243 respondents (42%) have been in their current positions for 5 years or less; while only 48 (20%) of our respondents have been in parish ministry for 5 years or less.

Work experience other than parish ministry

200 of the 243 respondents (82%) reported having worked in a field other than parish ministry and several reported having worked in more than one other field. The 200 respondents reported having 262 non-parish work experiences which explains why the percentages that follow total more than 100%. 44% reported working in a for-profit business; 28% in a church-based organization; 23% for a non-church-based non-profit; and 13% had been self employed.

FORMATION AND EDUCATION

Level and type of education

37% of respondents reported having a master's degree as their highest level of school completed. This was followed closely 35% with a bachelor's degree. 19% reported having no post-secondary degree.

Highest level of school completed

Respondents reported having a total of 283 post-secondary degrees. Of all cases (all 283 degrees reported), 12% of the degrees reported were bachelor's degrees with a major in religious studies or theology. 40% were "other" bachelor's degrees. 25% of the degrees reported were master's degrees in religious studies, theology or ministry compared with 15% in other fields. Of the 7 respondents reporting a doctorate as their highest degree, 1 reported a doctorate in ministry or theology and 6 in other fields. Over one-third (37%) of the degrees reported were in ministry, theology or religious studies.

Bachelor's degrees - degree-granting institutions

Not all of the 70 respondents with master's degrees in pastoral ministry, theology or religious studies provided the name of their degree-granting institutions, but the schools of the 54 who did are listed below. Saint Francis Seminary was the leading provider of graduate education among respondents, accounting for 29% of graduate degrees in ministry. The next most frequently mentioned institution was Cardinal Stritch University with 16%.

Master's degrees - degree-granting institutions

Non-degree education and certification

Respondents were asked to identify any non-degree education or certification they had received. Almost half of the respondents (117 or 48%) did not respond or reported "none." The 126 who did respond reported 197 forms of non-degree education or certification. Of these 197 responses, 55 have religious education certification and 54 reported lay ministry formation. 26 have a youth ministry certificate and 20 reported spiritual direction training. No one reported having a campus ministry certificate.

Providers of non-degree education

Respondents were asked from what organization they received their non-degree formation.

Of the 54 respondents reporting lay ministry formation, the top organizations mentioned were St. Francis Seminary (mentioned by 21 respondents); Cardinal Stritch University/St. Clare Center (12 respondents), and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee (7 respondents).

Of the 20 respondents reporting spiritual direction training, the top organizations mentioned were the Siena Center in Racine (mentioned by 4 respondents) and Creighton University (3 respondents).

Of the 26 respondents who reported having youth ministry certificates, the top organizations mentioned were Cardinal Stritch University (8 respondents), the Milwaukee Archdiocese (7 respondents) and the Center for Ministry Development (6 respondents).

Of the 55 respondents who reported having religious education certification, the Milwaukee Archdiocese was by far the top source of religious education certification, mentioned by 38 respondents.

Current students

18 respondents (7%) reported being currently in school, 6 in a certificate program and 12 in a degree program. Most of the degrees and schools were unique (one respondent reporting one program at one school). The exception is 8 of the 18 reported being students at Cardinal Stritch University, 7 in lay ministry or religious studies. Of the 7 in lay ministry or religious studies, 5 are in a degree program and 2 in the certificate program.

Desire for additional formation

Of those responding to a question about the need for additional formation, 39% respondents said their education is adequate or more than adequate; 9% said that additional education would be helpful, and 51% said their current education was adequate but additional education would be helpful.

Desire for additional formation

Additional formation - fields of study

Respondents indicated the fields of study of interest to them. Many of the respondents listed several fields of study--443 were mentioned. The top three choices were liturgy (12%), theology (10%) and scripture (10%). Several respondents who said their education was adequate or

more than adequate listed fields of interest for additional study; several respondents who said (a) and (b) were both true did not list fields of study.

Fields of study

The following two tables look at fields of study by years in parish ministry. Fields of study by current position is shown in the first table below. The respondents with the greatest number of fields of study were respondents with 1-5 years in their current position (211), and 6-10 years in their current position (116). The most mentioned fields of interest were liturgy (54 respondents), theology (46 respondents) and scripture (43 respondents).

Fields of study by years in current position

The number of respondents in each year category is shown parenthetically in the year boxes across the top of the table.

The following table looks at fields of study by total years in ministry. The total numbers in this table do not match the preceding two tables because respondents in the total years of ministry category only includes respondents who had worked in more than one parish. The preferred fields of study were the same: liturgy (40 respondents), scripture (28 respondents) and theology (26 respondents). The largest number of respondents interested in further study had been in parish ministry 11-15 years (68 respondents), 26 or more years (52 respondents) and 6-10 years (44 respondents). A comparison between these two tables suggests that those most interested in additional study are experienced parish ministers in relatively new positions.

CONCLUDING OBSERVATIONS

Lay parish ministers present a wealth of experience, education and abilities. Many of the ministers have years of parish experience, and some bring valuable professional experience from other fields. Many hold ministry-related degrees, and/or have completed a ministry formation program. Some have attained specialized certification in their field of ministry. And some are currently enrolled in an educational program.

However, many expressed an interest in/need for additional formation. The three areas of greatest interest were liturgy, scripture and theology.

70% of the respondents are age 50 and older. These older individuals, representing years of life experience, professional experience, and education are an invaluable resource for the church. However, most of these individuals will likely retire or withdraw from active ministry in the next ten to fifteen years. On the other hand, only 13% of the respondents are under 40, suggesting the need to explore ways to encourage younger individuals to consider parish ministry as a viable career option.

The Archdiocese of Milwaukee faces the challenges of providing formation for growing numbers of parish ministers, addressing the obstacles that individuals face in acquiring formation, and responding in a comprehensive way to ministers' need and desire for spiritual support, theological education, and professional development.
