Grades 9-12 Catechetical Program Inventory 2009-2010

The Office of Catechesis and Youth Ministry of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee conducted a survey of parish religious education programs during June-July 2010. The purpose of the survey was to gather information on what our parishes are doing in the way of catechesis, sacramental preparation and youth ministry. Information will be used to identify trends, to review and update policies, to plan resources and professional development, and to share with parishes for their own assessment and planning.

Two questionnaires were developed--one for programs for grades K-8 and one for programs for grades 9-12. This document reports on the responses to the 9-12 survey.¹

Responses to the surveys were received from 143 of 210 parishes--a 68 percent response rate.² 91 lay ecclesial ministers, several of whom serve more than one parish, responded to the 9-12 survey. They identified themselves by name, title, parish, and parish contact information. This document reports on their responses to the survey questions.³

Areas of responsibility

Over 90 percent of the respondents to the 9-12 questionnaire identified grades 9-12 and Confirmation preparation as their areas of responsibility. Respondents were asked to check all the areas that applied.

² This was an excellent response rate, particularly considering the timing of the survey, June and July, the time most parishes are ending or have ended their catechetical programs for the year.

The responses in this report will not all add to 91 for three reasons: because (1) non-responses are not recorded in this report; (2) many questions asked respondents to check all areas that applied; and (3) not all responded to all questions or all parts of a question. Responses are reported in order of magnitude, not necessarily in the order they were listed in the questionnaire.

Collaboration among parishes

Respondents were asked whether they were responsible for catechetical programs in one parish only or for joint or collaborative programs with more than one parish. Over 20 percent of those responding were involved in a collaborative program with more than one parish (with 80 percent of the respondents saying they were responsible for one parish only). Respondents could and did respond positively to both other alternatives. 21 respondents were responsible for the 26 collaborative responses.

Program collaboration

Of the 21 respondents involved in collaborative programs, 100 percent collaborated on Confirmation preparation programs; nearly three-quarters also collaborated on religious education for grades 9-12 and other youth ministry programs.

When asked if their position was full- or part-time, over two-thirds of the respondents reported holding full time positions.

Number of participants in religious education

Respondents were asked for a count of the number of participants in their catechetical programs, by grade level. Not all respondents answered this question and those who did respond did not report participants at every grade level. For each grade level, the numbers of catechetical participants, the program size, and the number of responses is shown in the chart below.

Models of religious education

When asked to indicate what models of religious education they used and to check all that applied, the top three models mentioned were service learning (58%), weekly catechetical programs (52%), and retreats (51%) Less than one-third of the respondents reported using any of the other models listed for their consideration.

Annual contact hours

When asked about the number of contact hours per year in each grade level, respondents reported an average of 28-34 annual contact hours for catechetical programs. Several respondents noted that the number of hours reported did not include retreat(s). The responses ranged from 12 hours to 48.75 hours; the mode (the number of hours that occurred most frequently) was 30 hours for grades 9, 10 and 11; and 45 hours for gr. 12.

Textbooks/resources used

Respondents were asked what textbook or series they used for their 9-12 grade level catechesis, and were asked to choose from a list of three textbooks/series, fill in the blank for "other," or check "none." Roughly two-thirds of the respondents answered "other." There was no consensus among the "other" textbooks--no text or resource was used by more than five respondents. Thus, although the numbers are small, the Catholic Faith Handbooks were the most used texts.⁴

Respondents were asked when they held classes and to check all that applied. The largest number held classes on weekday evening (49%), followed by Sunday evening (47%).

When asked how they involved parents, most said through take home materials. Special programs for parents and work with teens in the classroom were also mentioned by more than half the respondents.

Spiritual development opportunities

Respondents were asked what spiritual development opportunities their parish offered teens. Retreats (besides the confirmation retreat) was mentioned by 74 percent of those responding. Less than 50 percent of the respondents reported using any of the other spiritual development programs listed for their consideration.

Justice and service opportunities

Respondents were asked what service opportunities their parish offered teens. Service opportunities within the parish (such as committees, liturgical roles, catechist aide) were mentioned by 95 percent of those responding. Other opportunities mentioned by over 50 percent of those responding included direct service to the needy (82%), collecting/fundraising for a cause (77%) and summer mission trips (63%).

Leadership opportunities

Respondents were asked what leadership opportunities their parish offered teens. Youth serving on parish committees was mentioned by 62 percent of the respondents. Less than 50 percent of the respondents reported any of the other leadership development programs listed for their consideration.

Relationship between confirmation program and other catechetical programs

Respondents were asked about the relationship between their parish confirmation program and other catechetical programs. Over 60 percent of the respondents said the confirmation program corresponds to 11th grade and is the only catechetical program for 11th graders. All other responses received very few responses.

Number of confirmation candidates

Respondents were asked about the size of their confirmation class. 86 respondents answered this question. The total number of confirmation candidates reported was 2,909. The average class size was 34. Class sizes ranged from 2 to 115.

Confirmation program elements

Respondents were asked what program elements are included in their parish confirmation program. Over 70 percent responded positively to all program elements listed for their consideration. The top three were cited by 99 percent of the respondents: classes/presentation, service, and retreat.

Confirmation program contact hours

Respondents were asked about the approximate number of contact hours of their confirmation program (not including the retreat). Based on 86 responses, the average number of contact hours was 28 hours. The number of contact hours ranged from 4 to 72.

Confirmation textbook/program

Respondents were asked what textbook or program they used for confirmation preparation, and were asked to choose from a list of six textbooks/programs, fill in the blank for other or check none. Nearly half of the respondents answered other. Most of the respondents who said other listed a variety of sources. In the other category, only one text was mentioned more than three times. Six respondents said they used the *Catholic Faith Handbook for Youth* published by St. Mary's Press. The number of responses to the publications listed in the questionnaire are shown in the chart below.⁵

Confirmation sponsor involvement

Respondents were asked how sponsors were engaged in the confirmation preparation program. The largest number of respondents cited confirmation rehearsal (94%), followed by sponsor-candidate session(s) during the program (65%) and requiring candidates and sponsors to meet on their own (64%).

Length, location and leadership of confirmation retreat

Respondents were asked about the length, location and leadership of their confirmation retreat.

<u>Length of retreat</u>: 42% of the respondents said their confirmation retreat was held on a weekend with two overnights.

<u>Location</u>: In responding to the locations listed for their consideration, 34 (40 percent) of the respondents said their confirmation retreat was held at the TYME OUT center. The next largest number said other. Locations mentioned in the other category included Camp Whitcomb/Mason (8), Daniel Soref Retreat Center (4), Saint Francis Seminary (2) and a Salvation Army Camp (2).

Retreat Leadership: In responding to the leadership options listed for their consideration, 31 percent of the respondents said they used the TYME OUT staff for their confirmation retreat. If the categories of parish director of youth ministry and parish team are combined, the response rate for parish staff conducting the confirmation retreat is 41 percent.

Service component of Confirmation preparation

Respondents were asked what strategies were used to engage candidates in Christian service during their confirmation preparation. The largest number of responses were: discuss service during the confirmation interview (77%); involve candidates alongside adult parishioners (63%), require a certain number of service hours (61%) and offer a catalog of service opportunities for candidates (59%).

Catechists - demographics

Respondents were asked how many 9-12 catechists they have, how many have completed training for basic religious education certification, and their years of service. Because the numbers do not tally accurately, they should not be taken as exact. They are, however, valuable in getting a general picture of catechists in the archdiocese.

Catechists - formation

Respondents were asked what kind of formation they provide for their catechists. Individual orientation was most often mentioned (by 77 percent of the respondents). Over 50 percent said they used catechist group sharing, sharing reading materials and inservice training.

Adults serving in religious education program

Respondents were asked in what ways adults serve in their religious education program other than as catechists. Serving as confirmation sponsors was mentioned by 80 percent of the respondents. Other items mentioned by over 50 percent of the respondents include event chaperones, substitute catechists, presenters on special topics and group facilitators.
