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DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dcn. Mike Chmielewski A few weeks ago, Archbishop Listecki called Deacon Dale Nees, Fr. Jerry Herda, and myself to begin a discussion on diaconal service and covenants. The main point of emphasis for the archbishop was to see if

we could better utilize the gifts and passions of our deacons in service beyond the walls

of the parish.

We all know that the foundation of our diaconal service comes in our ministry and participation within the parish, especially in the celebration of the Eucharist and other sacraments.

However, we also know that as deacons, we are called to extend our ministry beyond the walls of the parish. We are to go out to those in need as "Christ Servant." The diaconal covenant invites and commits the deacon to "Service of Justice and Charity." Nearly every deacon ministers and serves the needy outside the parish walls. We serve the sick, homebound, hospitalized. We reach out to the imprisoned, hungry, homeless, and unemployed. We are present as chaplains for first responders, those in hospice care, truckers, refugees, and the outcast. We guide SVDP Conferences and we work for the dignity of all life. We are called to be "Christ Present" in places that

the formal Church cannot enter.

Archbishop Listecki is asking us to ponder more ways to connect our deacons in ministry and service to those in need. He is asking us to look closely at the gifts, talents, and passions of individual men as they journey through formation. Then after ordination, he hopes deacons will expand their ministries by using these gifts and passions.

We have deacons who are formally covenanted to social ministries rather



than specific parishes: Dcn. Przedpelski '94 to Franciscan Peacemakers, Dcn. Niggemann '00 to prison ministry, and Dcn. Sommers '00 to the deaf community. However, all three

are also connected to parish ministry. We have multiple deacons whose ministries outside the parish are significant commitments including chaplain service to hospitals, hospices, and first responders, ministry to traveling shows, and extended service to the homeless, hungry, and neglected.

There is also a vision of deacons using their gifts to serve the Archdiocese of Milwaukee and parishes in very specific areas. Many of us have significant educational and life experiences that could serve the greater community. We have a number

COMING FULL CIRCLE




This September, it will be four years since I began in the role of Director of Diaconate Formation. At that time, the Ordination Class of 2022 were just

starting their Aspirant Path. They are the first class I have had the pleasure of personally accompanying, along with their wives, throughout their entire four-year initial formation. But proper accompaniment requires a whole team of people, including the formation staff, pastors/parish directors, spiritual directors, faculty, tutors, committee members, mentors, deacons, deacon wives, bishops, and archbishop. Thanks to everyone's efforts and God willing, there will soon be 16 more deacons serving the Archdiocese of Milwaukee.


But that very same week, the Diaconate Formation Program, as it does every two years, will again come full circle with a new group of men selected to begin as the Aspirant Class of 2022. This group having been selected prior to The National Directory for the Formation, Ministry, and Life of Permanent Deacons in the United States of America – Second Edition's effective date of June 9, 2022, will continue to follow a four-year footprint. I greatly appreciate the level



of collaboration that was necessary to complete the application process almost three months earlier than usual; it is a testament to what can be achieved with teamwork. This was especially true as we continue to support the 12 men who are advancing to their second year of candidacy.

The plan is that later this year, we will have a much clearer picture of what adjustments to our curriculum will be necessary in meeting the needs of those we serve, along with the spirit of the revised National Directory. As is always the case, we rely heavily on your prayerful support, especially as we prepare to come full circle with the Aspirant Class of 2024.

"OUR MINISTRY IS NOT OURS": ENCOUNTER DURING MISSION TRIP 2022

Our ministry is not ours; it is the ministry of the Church; it is Christ's ministry." With these words, Fr. Sandro, Director of Diaconate Formation for the Diocese of San Juan de la Maguana, Dominican Republic, encouraged our Candidates 2024 to live a ministry of service and reminded us that as deacons, we represent the Church.

In this encounter with Fr. Sandro Jimenez and our brother Deacon Domingo, our

candidates had the opportunity to learn about the diaconate in the Dominican Republic. They had the opportunity to share some experiences with Dcn. Domingo and learn from him about his ministries as a deacon for our sister parish of La Sagrada Familia. Here is a little bit of this encounter.

Fr. Sandro explained that he is new in this position as Director of Diaconate Formation and he is very happy for the opportunity to work and form deacons for the clergy and the Church ministry. There are 32 ordained deacons in the diocese and 22 in the formation program. Their program is different from ours in some processes and similar in others. Age, canonical impediments, married or single are similar criteria as we have in the United States. To become a deacon, the formation process and experiences are a little different. The man needs to be a "Presidente de Asamblea" (president of the assembly) for one to two years. Presidente de Asamblea is in charge of the faith community or communities. He organizes catechesis, baptism prep, evangelization and the Liturgy of the Word with Communion in the communities when the priest is not available. Then, after the man gets endorsed by his pastor, he goes into the diaconate formation program for three years. Also, in order to become President de Asamblea, the man goes to a three-year formation program. It takes approximately 8 years to become a deacon.

Dcn. Domingo shared his discernment/formation process. After the three years preparation as Presidente de Asamblea, he ministered in that role for 19 years. He tried to become a deacon a couple of times but did not find the support needed back then. Later with the encouragement of Fr. Juan Manuel and his support/endorsement, Dcn. Domingo started his formation to the diaconate and was ordained in 2018. Dcn. Domingo continues to express his love for the Church and the ministry of service to the people in need. His ministries as a deacon include catechesis, jail ministry, visiting the communities and "reaching out." He loves the opportunities to do Liturgy of the Word with Communion, preach as a way of catechesis and evangelization, and the sacraments of Baptism and Marriage.



For Dcn. Domingo, fidelity to the Church and faithfulness to the ministry are very important in his life and as a deacon. You cannot be a deacon without strong faith and a strong Bible foundation. He continues to say that our mission is also for the people outside the Church, attending to their needs as much as we can. Fr. Sandro continued the conversation, stating that "ustedes son hombres de Dios" (you are men of God). Pope Francis, Fr. Sandro mentioned, reminded us that we have to be men of God and Pope Francis is an example to follow. A true servant for all people, he goes to the people of God and serves them, "Church or no Church."

Fr. Sandro emphasized the importance of ministerial presence in the parish and in the community. He mentioned that part of the process of formation is doing ministry, being involved in ministry before diaconate formation, during formation, and after. This also includes the wives of the deacons. The wives are "required" to be in ministry with their husband, as part of the support and ministry of them as deacons. One of our candidates mentioned that in our program, we ask them to step out of ministries and parish commitments and Fr. Sandro said that is not what they do in the Dominican Republic. The best way to promote and learn about the diaconate is by doing ministry. The presence of a deacon candidate is the best catechesis and promotion to the ministry of a deacon. I needed to step in and explain why we ask to "step back" from some responsibilities; we talk about the ministerial experiences and placements that happened during formation and they understood that it is the same process with different approaches to be fulfilled.

There is more from this encounter with our brother Dcn. Domingo and Fr. Sandro and the Candidates 2024 that they will reflect on and remember for future ministries. At the end of this encounter, both Fr. Sandro and Dcn. Domingo reminded us that we represent the Church; that our ministry is not ours, it is Christ serving others and attending their needs. We received a "double blessing" as Fr. Sandro and Dcn. Domingo gave us their blessing at the same time. Truly, this encounter was inspirational and motivational. Let us pray for our brother deacons in the Dominican Republic and for an increase of vocations to the permanent diaconate.

LOVE & MARRIAGE

"Love is patient, Love is kind; Love is not jealous or boastful; It is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way, It is not irritable or resentful; It does not rejoice at wrong, But rejoices in the right. Love bears all things, Believes all things, Hopes all things, Endures all things". ~1 Corinthians 13:4-7

This Bible verse comes alive as I interview the wives of the men entering Diaconate Formation in Fall 2022. As you already know, the Discernment Process for the Diaconate Formation Program is quite intense — couples interested in learning more need to attend four discernment sessions with an already ordained deacon couple offered throughout the different parishes of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. As part of this discernment process, Dcn. Dale Nees, Director, follows up with them with a Deacon Perceiver Interview — he meets with future aspirant, and I meet with the wife. This is my first year doing wives' interviews and I was delighted by this experience. It gave me an opportunity to connect with them one-onone and learn a little bit about them, their families, children, hobbies, what they do for a living, their future plans, etc. One of the questions I ask as I interview them is if they are in support of their husband's vocation to the diaconate and why.

Based on my conversation with them, I want to say that most of the ladies' answer is "because they love him" even though they don't necessarily use these words. I am confident they are willing to sacrifice and support their husband out of their love for them. Pope Francis affirms that "Love is experienced and nurtured in the daily life of couples, and their children." (Amoris Laetitia, Apostolic Exhortation, Ch. 4, #90) The wives are willing not only to sacrifice but accompany their husbands throughout their four-year formation — they too are answering their call to their husband's vocation as well as the rest of the family.

This year, we have younger couples who amazed me by the fact that they already have a plan set in terms of their family support when they will be at an "All Day Wives' Day" with their husbands. They're being proactive and committed — ready to welcome and endure whatever the future brings in terms of their future formation. These ladies are courageous, confident, loyal, hard-working mothers, resilient, and self-giving, motivated merely out of LOVE.

I am so looking forward to getting to know them, and their children, teenagers, and/or young adults. It's exciting and motivating to see gentlemen and their families answering a vocation at a younger age and willing to make the necessary sacrifices to support their loved one.

Yet, the admission process is not done. They still need to complete the necessary requirements, and a C.O.A.S. interview, before they are presented and accepted by Archbishop Jerome Listecki to move forward as Aspirants in our Diaconate Formation Program of 2022.

DEACON SENATE

The Deacon Senate met on January 19 and March 16 via Zoom. While there was an across-the-board desire to meet in person, Covid-19 has taught us all the value of technology. For the time being, the meetings will continue to be via Zoom. However, there is strong consideration of going back to in-person in the fall. If anything, we learned over the last couple of years that predicting what the world will be next month is difficult, much less predicting 6 months from now. We have all begun to master the art of "Pivot." From a finance standpoint, the Senate account is in good shape as we come to the end of the fiscal year. The current balance is slightly over \$7,500 with only a couple smaller financial obligations anticipated. A \$100 memorial in the name of Fr. Tom Thibodeau, who died unexpectedly of Covid-19, was sent to the Redemptorist Retreat Center. Thank you Dcn. Scott Campbell for your efforts in tracking the Senate expenses.

WOMEN'S DAY OF REFLECTION

On Saturday, March 26th, 25 women of the diaconate gathered for a Women's Morning of Reflection at the Mary Mother of the Church Pastoral Center. It was the first planned formal gathering for the women of the diaconate since the April 2019 retreat – another casualty of the COVID pandemic.

In planning the event, I invited Maritza Espino of the Diaconate Formation Team to join me on a joint presentation. Maritza is very involved in formation programming with the wives of the Aspirants and Candidates. Her participation in this event just seemed very logical. As we reflected on a possible topic, we realized that March 26 was the day after the Church celebrated the Solemnity of the Annunciation which we decided would be the foundation of our spiritual reflection. Unfortunately, Maritza tested positive for COVID the week before the gathering and thus was not able to attend.

As we gathered, one of the women said it best: "It feels like we are coming out of hibernation!" The day was a marvelous opportunity for the women to renew and reconnect. We had a very diverse and beautiful group that included: 2 women whose husbands were ordained in the 70's, 2 in the 80's, and 7 in the 90's; 5 widows (including one widowed less than a year and one over 40 years ago); 4 ordained outside Milwaukee; 2 women who, with their husbands, moved to Milwaukee in the last 6 months; and for the class attendance award, 6 of 7 from the class of 2018.

We opened with Tai Chi morning prayer and then after introductions, the large group spent some time reflecting and praying with the Annunciation Gospel. The discussion was then narrowed to small groups at tables of 6 to ponder and reflect on snippets from the Gospel. Discussion topics were focused on: "The Lord is with you," "Do not be afraid...you have found favor with God," "Nothing is impossible with God," and "I am the handmaid of the Lord."

After some large group sharing of the table reflections, we





gathered for a box lunch or salad from Skyline Catering and more catching up. The women left written comments and suggestions for future gatherings. There was a very warm, joyful feeling in the air as the women departed. All seemed eager to resume a common spiritual journey with their spiritual sisters.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month

While 1 in 5 people will experience a mental illness during their lifetime, everyone faces challenges in life that can impact their mental health. About half of Americans will meet the criteria for a diagnosable mental health condition sometime in their life with symptoms starting by age 24 for the majority of people. The average delay between symptom onset and treatment is 11 years, meaning a lot of people spend months or years facing mental health challenges before getting a diagnosis. It is never too early to seek treatment for your mental health. Intervening effectively during early stages can save lives and is critically important for people living with mental health conditions.

There's often no one single cause for a mental health condition. Instead, there are many possible risk factors that can influence how likely a person is to experience a mental health condition or how serious the symptoms may be. Some risk factors for mental health conditions include trauma, which can be a one-time event or ongoing; the environment and how it impacts one's health and quality of life (also known as social determinants of health like financial stability and health care access); genetics; brain chemistry; and habits and lifestyle factors such as diet, exercise, sleep and stress management.

Faith communities are often the first place people turn to when they are hurting and in need. Do you feel prepared with how to respond and minster to those in your parishes who may be living with mental illness themselves or are supporting loved ones with mental illness? Are you concerned with how to respond to someone who is contemplating suicide? Is your parish community interested in forming a mental health ministry to provide education, support and outreach? I am happy to help with any and all of the above! Some resources to get started may

DEACON PERSONNEL BOARD

The Deacon Personnel Board met on 2/1/2022 via Zoom. Present: Dcns. Gulig, Campbell, Stanula, Schneider, and Chmielewski / Fr. Herda. Excused: Dcn. Nosacek (in Africa).

Dcn. Gulig opened the meeting with prayer followed by approval of the October 5, 2021 Meeting Minutes as submitted. Our usual formation discussion was set aside as we await the full Board's access to the Second Edition of the National Directory. The new books will be mailed out in the next week.

Deacon specific issues were then discussed including: 19 covenant renewals, 2 deacons moving into the Arch, 1 deacon moving out, and 4 deacons retiring. There are 16 deacons with overdue covenants but no major concerns beyond the need for the deacons to be more timely in the renewal process. There was one deacon of special concern. This deacon has historically been non-compliant with diaconal expectations. The Board has asked Dcn. Chmielewski to bring the deacon in for a face-to-face meeting about these serious issues. At least one Board member will be invited to attend that meeting.

We are anticipating 16 men to be ordained in September and Board members should anticipate attending the signing of initial covenants beginning in mid-July and extending to early September.

Fr. Herda told the Board there will up to 20 priest assignment changes this Spring. He also spoke of a meeting with the archbishop at which the archbishop talked about assigning deacons to specialized ministries in place of or in addition to the usual parish assignment. Fr. Herda will follow up with Dcns. Nees and Chmielewski on this issue.

Dcn. Gulig closed the meeting with a reminder of confidentiality and the continuing need to support our parishes and brother deacons as the current pandemic seems to be moving to more of an endemic. The meeting closed with prayer and a plan to meet again in May of 2022.
