Salt and Light

Archbishop Grob began his homily on June 10 by wondering if, perhaps, God had indeed planned from the beginning of time that *this* Gospel from Matthew (5:13-16) would be proclaimed on *this*



day, for *this* gathering of the Lay Initiative in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee in the year 2025?

Jesus said to his disciples: You are the salt of the earth...You are the light of the world.

Archbishop inquired, "What if I told you I was salt...or a lighted lamp? What would you expect of me then? Wouldn't you say that I bring flavor to the things with which I come into contact – that I preserve some things and purify others? Or that I cannot be hidden – and that I bring light to all in the room? But then, that is my nature as salt or light. My value is realized only when I mix with other things – my being added to something brings out the fullness of whatever with which I come into contact. And, what if I told you I was a Christian – what would you expect of me then?" He went on to help us understand our role as lay pastoral staff in the Church as being salt and light – and indeed, Christians – in everything we do and for all whom we encounter.

In his closing remarks for the Lay Initiative Inaugural Event later that morning, Archbishop Grob drew on his farming and agricultural background by sharing Jesus' words: "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." (Luke 9:62) He encouraged us to keep our eyes focused forward, with Christ as our guide. If we only look backwards, our furrow will not be straight, and our work will go astray. Archbishop Grob thanked those present for their work in their parishes and in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, offering his prayers and support.

Building a Framework for the Lay Initiative

To quote Ecclesiastes, there is nothing new under the sun! The initial building blocks of our framework will be very familiar to you. Yet, we can hold each one up to the light of 2025 to help us re-examine and re-imagine Lay Ministry according to the Signs of the Times.

<u>One Focus</u>: Those who serve on the pastoral staff of a parish

First, we sharpened the focus of our office to be: *Those who serve* on the pastoral staff of a parish.

In other words, those laity who are entrusted with a key ministry area in the parish, including school principals. These positions can be paid or volunteer, and include some permanent deacons **Building a Framework**

and religious. This initiative is focused on the imminent need for lay leaders to work with our parish priests to help build up our churches for the sake of our mission.

Two Essential Elements: Laity and Clergy

Our one focus then flows into our two essential elements of the Lay Initiative: *Laity and Clergy*. We celebrate the gifts that set us apart as Laity and Clergy, while also celebrating the oneness of Spirit into which we are all baptized.

Three Priorities: Call | Form | Support

As we continue to build our framework, we are highlighting three initial priorities: *Call | Form | Support* First, we will work on **calling** forth lay leaders to discern working in a parish. We will work with pastors and lay leaders on strategies of witness, discernment and call, which in time will help fill positions in our parishes with qualified lay leaders. Competence must follow the call, so secondly, we will work on **forming** lay leaders by providing lay parish staff with pathways to grow in their knowledge and understanding of the faith. Our third priority is to work on **supporting** lay leaders with ongoing spiritual and professional development.

Four Pillars:

Finally, I would like to share the four pillars that are informing our work with the Lay Initiative. Our **first** pillar is **Jesus Christ as our** *Cornerstone*. Of course, we place all that we do at the feet of Jesus. The **second** pillar is **Church Teaching and Documents**. The catechism, councils, recent popes, and US Bishops have written much on the topic of the laity, which provide a rich source of both tradition and innovation for us to draw from. The **third** pillar in our framework is **Collaboration with Offices**, **Groups and Institutions**. We are working on cultivating relationships with our Archdiocesan offices and groups, as well as Sacred Heart School of Theology and their Cor Unum program of theological studies, Marquette University, and the Priests of the Sacred Heart.

Our **fourth** pillar is that of **Lived Experience and Synodality.** A sense of synodality - listening, sharing our lived experiences and wisdom as lay pastoral staff, and discernment, is important. This last pillar in our developing framework for the Lay Initiative is therefore dedicated to all of US!

In this Jubilee Year, I am grateful for all the work that has been accomplished in lay ministry through the years in our Archdiocese. I know that so many of you are part of that history. I have much hope that we can all be a catalyst for the new Lay Initiative in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee!

The Results Are In

On April 8, 2025, we launched a survey to gain a deeper understanding of the lay ministry landscape in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. We invited lay pastoral staff, parish directors, deacons, and priests to participate—and we are pleased to share that we received 284 responses, surpassing our expectations.

As we developed the survey, we kept returning to one central question: *"What is at the heart of this?"*

Our goal was to craft thoughtful questions that would help us take the pulse of lay ministry today—identifying strengths, challenges, and emerging needs that we might begin to address together.

While it will take time to carefully review and reflect on all that was shared, we are profoundly grateful for your honesty, candor, and generosity in responding. The insights you've offered will play a vital role in guiding our discernment as we shape future programming and collaboration. Using the survey results below (page 6) will help shape our planning and future formation opportunities.

Brenda and I look forward to continued collaboration in building up lay pastoral staffs in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, which we entrust into the care of our Lord:






Areas of Human Formation (Human qualities critical to forming wholesome relationships and necessary to be apt instruments of God's love and compassion) 233 responses






Meet the Artist
